| 1 | | Spanish Dagger <i>Yucca gloriosa</i> | 10' | 10-15° | Slow | No. Dramatic appearance. Some small flowers. | Similar to Bayonet, but tips softer Pruning can give 'tree' look. |
| 2 | | Spanish Bayonet <i>Yucca aluifolia</i> | 10' | 10-15° | Slow | Dramatic appearance. Single or multi branch. White flowers | Keep away from direct walk ways/ pedestrian areas, due to sharpness. |
| 3 | | Agave A. Americana "century plant" | 2-10' | 15° | Mod-slow | Once in plant's lifetime (less than a century), flower spike reaches 15-40' tall, blooms & then, plant will die. | Must have PLENTY of room for this wide plant. Other varieties of agave also useful and dramatic. |
| 4 | | "Night blooming cactus : <i>Cereus peruvianus</i> . <i>C. uruguayanus</i> . | 30-50' | 15-25° | Mod. | Striking blue/green plant with large white flowers that bloom at night. | "Monstrous" variety is smaller (despite name) & slower growing. Keep away from walk way. |
| 5 | | Totem Pole Cactus <i>Lophocereus schotiniiforma monstrosus</i> | 10' | 15° | Slow | No. Multi stack totem pole look. Easy to maintain. Dramatic | Fewer Thorns |
| 6 | | Red Tip Yucca OR Giant Hesperaloe aka <i>Hesperaloe parviflora</i> | 3' Giant 6' | 0° | Mod. | Generally a coral flower on long flower spike spring/fall. Flowers can range from cream to red. | Not real thorns, but spike-look. Carefree, non-demanding. Good in sun. Often used along roadsides. |
