

From the Rector

The Annual Blessing

Each year in February we make plans for the Annual Parish Meeting. Our Treasurers and Finance Committee assist one another in preparing the year's operating budget, based largely on pledge contributions made each fall at Pledge Sunday time and from the stewardship efforts in the fall and during the year. The budget is presented and accepted at the Annual Meeting after having been approved by the Vestry prior to the meeting. Reports are written and presented by our Wardens and Committee Chairpersons and by myself. We try to the best of our ability to give a synopsis of the last year and a look at the year to come.




Please contact me with any questions and please consider making the commitment to engage in what promises to be a wonderful Lenten journey.

Carol L. Niemand Inducted into Maryland Senior Citizens Hall of Fame

Carol L. Niemand has been involved in many endeavors that impact the lives of others since her retirement from the Fairfax, Virginia school system 15 years ago. She has been an advocate for the arts and the beautification of the environment and instrumental in several local outreach efforts.

This year, Carol was not only inducted as a 2022 Honoree into the Maryland Senior Citizens Hall of Fame, but also received the state's GERI Award, awarded to those who have performed extraordinary.

Each year, nominations are accepted and reviewed by the Selection Committee. Maryland senior citizens 65 years of age or older who have made outstanding volunteer contributions affecting the lives of people in the State of Maryland are eligible. A maximum of 50 qualified nominees are inducted into the Hall of Fame each year; 19 individuals were honored this year. Of these recipients, a maximum of five are also selected to receive the prestigious GERI Award. As the arts and sciences have their

Grammy, Emmy, Tony, and Oscar, so do the senior citizens of Maryland have their

GERI - the geriat- ric "Nobel Prize" for extraordinary humanitarian community service.

In connection with Shrewsbury's Vacation Bible School, Carol supervised the construction of wooden flower boxes that were planted by children and then placed at several local schools. She also helped plant the native garden donated and designed by Unity Nursery at Sumner Hall, Post #25. You can find

Carol's floral arrangements adorning the studio of RiverArts in Chestertown on First Fridays.

Several years ago, Carol facilitated the African American Revolutionary War Art Exhibit so that middle school children could learn more about history through art. It was led by three local artists in the 8th grade art classes at Kent School, Radcliffe Creek School, and Kent County Middle School under a grant available through Kent County Cultural Alliance. The final creations were displayed in an exhibit for the dedication of the new Cerino Marina at Downrigging two years ago.

Before and during COVID, Ches- tertown American Legion Post 36, along with local businesses and churches, formed Minary's Dream Alliance, a non-profit out of which a food bank operates serving seniors and delivering over 200 bags per week to those people in need. Carol is a regular volunteer with this service, packing and deliver- ing food to the unhoused at two local motels.

Of late, Ms. Niemand, under the auspices of Shrewsbury Parish Church and its Pastor, Henry Sabetti, started a homeless initiative at Driftwood Motel in Chestertown. Over the past year lodging, food, friendship and services has been provided to over 22 individuals and families in 9 rooms. This undertaking has now morphed into the Kent County Coalition for the Homeless, gaining 501(c)(3) status through Chesapeake Charities and its Director, Linda Kohler. The operation began January 6th,

2022 and currently only two individuals remain to be housed. The goal has been and will always remain to create a 24-hour homeless shelter in Kent County.

Ms. Niemand is committed to impacting the lives of the less fortunate. Many in the local community have been touched by her efforts. Congratulations to Carol for being recognized and honored by the state, and thanks for your continued dedication and perseverance in helping others.
