School of Wisdom

Enroll in the school of wisdom. Read the book of Proverbs

Proverbs is found in the Old Testament of the Bible. Solomon wrote and compiled most of these proverbs early in his reign of Israel which was from 971-931 B.C.

A proverb is a short, concise sentence that conveys moral truth. The book of Proverbs is a collection of these wise sayings.

The <u>Life Application Study Bible: New Living Translation</u> states: Woven into human fabric is the desire to learn and understand. We build schools, institutes, and universities to be taught about the world and about life.

Knowledge is good, but there is a vast difference between "knowledge" (having the facts) and "wisdom" (applying these facts to life). We can amass knowledge but without wisdom our knowledge is useless. We must learn how to *live out* what we know.

The key verse is Proverbs 1:7

The fear of the LORD is the beginning of knowledge

But fools despise wisdom and instruction.

Solomon asserts that God wants people to obtain wisdom and that we should seek it.

In the Bible, a fool is one who denies God and the teaching of God. A wise person is one who respects, honors and obeys God. This will lead one to have a life worth living.

When wisdom enters your heart,
And knowledge is pleasant to your soul,
Discretion will preserve you;
Understanding will keep you,
To deliver you from the way of evil.
(Proverbs 2:10-12)

In Proverbs there is wisdom for young people, wisdom for leaders and wisdom for all people. Some of the themes include wisdom, speech, relationships, work and success.

Wisdom – God wants people to be wise. His Word, the Bible, leads us to live right, have right relationships and make right decisions.

Relationships – Proverbs gives advise for developing our relationships with friends, family, and co-workers. In every relationship, we must show love, dedication, and high moral standards.

The righteous man walks in his integrity; His children are blessed after him. (20:7)

Speech – What we say shows our real attitude toward others. To be wise in our speech we need to use self-control. Our words should be honest and well chosen.

A soft answer turns away wrath, But a harsh word stirs up anger. (15:1)

Work – We are accountable to carry out our work with diligence, discipline and honesty.

Dishonest scales are an abomination to the Lord; but a just weight is His delight. (11:1)

Success – Although people work very hard for money and fame, God views success as having a good reputation, moral character, and the spiritual devotion to obey Him.


He who earnestly seeks good finds favor, But trouble will come to him who seeks evil. (Proverbs 11:27)

The "Filling Station Made of Coal" was sent in by Jessie Box of Acmar. It was printed under the "Alabama Oddities" heading by cartoonist Nick Bonner. It ran in the newspaper in May of 1936.

Built in the early 1900's, a distinguishing feature of Acmar's filling station was that the exterior is anthracite coal from the company's Acton mine. The small building was adjacent to the Commissary which was the company store of the Alabama Fuel & Iron Company. The gas station measures sixteen by eight feet with a roof extending over the pumps. It is thought that the early pumps were the type with a crank handle that would have to be turned to bring the desired amount of gas up to the top of the pump and then would be drained down into the vehicle. Later the pumps ran off of electricity.

The gas station was in use until the late 1940's. The coal mines closed in 1950 and the property was sold. This one-of-a-kind coal filling station still stands on private property.

Today, if one Googles "gas stations made of coal" the following information is shared:

While most gas stations today are built with conventional material like concrete, steel, and plastic, there's a historical example of a gas station constructed using coal. In the small mining town of Acmar, Alabama, there is a no-longer-functioning service station uniquely built with coal. The town was centered on a coal mining operation, and the use of coal in the construction reflects the town's primary industry and history. This building is located on the grounds of the former Alabama Fuel & Iron Commissary.
