A Guest Article By Lesley Thompson: Affinity Groups

Hello, my name is Lesley Thompson and I am the new Engagement Coordinator here at TBS. While Rabbi Benjy is enjoying his sabbatical he asked me to explain what an affinity group is and how you can participate.

Affinity groups have one simple purpose, to bring people together! Sharing life through community is part of our design, but meaningful relationships are sometimes hard to find. Affinity groups exist, to make life changing relationships relevant and accessible to you. Our

groups allow you to find others in our community who have shared interests and passions in order to SEEK, ENGAGE, and TRANSFORM caring and supportive relationships.

Affinity groups and the Torah have more in common than you think. The Torah is a path and a cycle, offering a continuum of change and growth for our personal journey and that of the group. When an affinity group begins, the people in that group start on a journey.

The first book Genesis, the story of creation, is the start of your group's journey and members are beginning to connect with each other. In Exodus, just like the Israelites who leave Egypt in many tribes but arrive at Mt. Sinai as one unified people, they define themselves as a group. The next step is similar to the book of Leviticus. Groups in this stage have rituals and a common culture that they share. In the book of Numbers this is the part of the group life cycle in which each affinity group begins to take on a life of its own. This stage represents a group's ability to make choices together like when the Israelites are attempting to live into the norms they have created. In the last book of the Torah, Deuteronomy, this is the end of the groups life for the year. Some groups may decide to continue to get together knowing that new members or a new year will mean change and regeneration.

How do I find the affinity group that is right for me? There are group's based on interests, needs, and stages of life. Current groups range from the baking club to people with four legged friends. Other types of groups include affinity discussion groups which are based on where you live, work, and if you would like to meet people in your demographic. These groups will discuss curriculum specifically curated to facilitate transformative conversations among group members. Supportive affinity groups are designed to be a place in which you can move through life transitions together with others going through the same stages of life.

Any temple member can form a group. If you have a small Chavurah or group of friends already meeting, your group can be an affinity group and we want to support you. What We Plant For Our Community

On a brisk and surprisingly cloudless day in January, I made a spontaneous decision to take a walk and enjoy the rare sunshine during this winter season. Even though I was bundled up, breathing the cold air and feeling the wind on my face woke up my senses. Even though it was the middle of winter, I could hear birds chirping and squirrels scurrying through the dry leaves. And even though the trees and bushes were devoid of color and foliage, their bark and branches were still beautiful, and held the promise of spring to come.

On February 10th we celebrate Tu Bishvat, whose name is the holiday's month and day on the Hebrew calendar, the 15th ("Tu") of ("Bi") the month Shvat. The ancient rabbis designated Tu Bishvat as the "New Year of the Trees," though it might seem a bit odd for us to celebrate nature in the middle of winter! But just as a new moon is marked by the absence of the moon, and therefore the beginning of its next phase, Tu Bishvat is the beginning of the trees' next cycle of blossoming leaves, fruit and nuts. Today, Tu Bishvat is considered "Jewish Earth Day," and communities celebrate by planting trees, holding Tu Bishvat seders, and enjoying fruits and nuts that come from trees, as well as the seven "species" of foods native to Israel.

Our tradition holds trees in such importance that they get their own holiday, and also asserts that trees are like humans! A verse in Deuteronomy, compares fruit trees to humans, asserting they must be spared during wartime. 10th century commentator Rashi writes, "Like humans, trees have the power to grow. And as humans have children, so do trees bear fruit. And when a human is hurt, cries of pain are heard throughout the world, so when a tree is chopped down, its cries are heard throughout the world."

Tu Bishvat gives us an opportunity to appreciate trees, and nature overall, as beings very similar to us. Science even agrees with Rashi, with studies showing that plants and trees "breathe in" carbon dioxide and "exhale" oxygen through photosynthesis and respiration. Plants and trees even feel pain and emit inaudible cries when they are trimmed or cut down. According to a New Yorker article, one study showed fir trees communicating through root systems to share nutrients and feed nearby seedlings, until their "children" were tall enough to take in light for themselves.

We also depend on trees for the air we breathe, recycling our carbon dioxide into oxygen, for our food, and for their role in natural ecosystems that we and all life relies on. As Jonny Keeling, executive producer of the BBC nature documentary Seven Worlds, One Planet says, "Every single mouthful of food that you take, and every single breath of air that you breathe, depends on a healthy, natural world."

Tu Bishvat also allows us to reaffirm the Jewish value ba'al tashchit, that we should not destroy nature or be wasteful of our earth's resources. With the climate crisis affecting the entire planet, from our own neighborhoods to the horrific brush fires in Australia, we can all do our part to make sure our planet is livable and thriving, for animals, plants and humans alike, not only now but for generations to come. It may have been nice to take a walk on a warm January day - but it's also evidence of the global crisis at hand.

I am thrilled that many of our congregants share this value and have helped kickstart our brand new TBS Green Team! The Green Team is a friendly and enthusiastic affinity group focusing on the mitzvah ba'al tashchit as well as enjoying nature. Our goals are to recommend how TBS go greener, and further support TBS' overall mission to form connections and community by planning educational and social programs about nature and the environment.

During our first meetings, we identified and begun pursuing several aspects to our building and programming that could be more energy efficient and environmentally friendly, such as switching some lighting to LED bulbs and using biodegradable plates for events. We have also reached out to All Saints across the street to explore environmental efforts we can pursue together.

We are also thrilled that a Green Team Fund has been established at TBS to help fund green initiatives. A huge thank you to generous TBS members for providing a seed contribution to this new fund. I would also like to thank all of our members for their hard work, especially our chair Debbie Leasure for leading our group, as well as Joanne & Steve Grossman and Rick & Tirtzah Sandor who have taken extra time and effort to help make all of the estimates and collaboration possible.

Our next Green Team meeting is on Tuesday February 4th, 6pm at the TBS library. All are welcome, including youth members - we hope you can make it!

In the meantime, here are a few things you can do to help celebrate Tu Bishvat and the value of Jewish environmentalism this month:

- Download the Ecosia search engine as a Chrome or Safari extension or on your phone. Every 45 searches plants a tree in conservation efforts around the world - their goal is 100 million trees this year!
- In your home, set your thermostat to 68 degrees this winter and turn off lights, conserve water, and unplug underutilized appliances.
- Check out AEP Ohio and other Columbus utility companies' many energy efficiency programs including lighting discounts, appliance recycling, and rebates.
- Save trees by purchasing paper towels, toilet paper, stationery, and other paper products made from recycled material or bamboo, a more renewable plant source than trees.
- Support our youth who are passionate about climate change and environmentalism
- As the weather gets warmer, plant flowers, shrubs, and trees, especially those native to Ohio

I hope this Tu Bishvat, February 10, we all enjoy some produce, take a walk outside if it's warm enough, and take a moment to appreciate the trees and the beautiful, diverse nature that we are lucky to be a part of.

Giving to TBS: Qualified Charitable Distribution

Many of our families have taken advantage of donating to Temple Beth Shalom through their IRA Accounts without the gift counting as income. This provision is called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), and it might be a good option for you.

A QCD counts towards your Required Minimum Distribution. A recent change in law raises the RMD age from 70 ½ to 72.



Assuring the Future of TBS

'I found a fruitful world, because my ancestors planted it for me. Likewise, I am planting for future generations."

"In order to assure that we are planting for future generations, it is important for Jewish or-

ganizations, including TBS, to tap into the \$59,000,000,000 in generational wealth transfer that is currently ongoing in the United States." - Harold Grinspoon Foundation

In recognition that most local Jewish organizations do not have sufficient endowments to meet this long term need, Jewish Columbus has organized an effort, known as the Life and Legacy program, for all of Central Ohio's Jewish organizations to assure their continued viability.

TBS has elected to participate in this program, which will receive substantial guidance and support from the Harold Grinspoon Foundation, that was established by Mr. Grinspoon to assure the continuing existence of thriving Jewish organizations. This endeavor is its eighth year of conducting such programs across the United States. In each of the seven prior years the Foundation has started the program in four or five cities, with great success. It provides proven methods, professional assistance and financial incentives over several years that should allow the overall Jewish community and its individual organizations to maintain the program on an ongoing basis.

This program does not seek immediate financial payments, but donations made through wills, trusts, life insurance policies or similar types of estate planning and deferred giving. Such donations are not necessarily large, but if provided by a broad base of members, who have an interest in perpetuating TBS for future generations, when pooled together they can have a tremendous affect, not immediately but in the long term.

In order to navigate the next five years, TBS has developed its five year strategic plan, which, among other things, includes a five year financial plan. The financial plan is intended to set forth how TBS would cover its financial needs over that period including general operating costs as well as immediate upkeep of the building.

The plan lays out the Above and Beyond program being led by Phil Goldstein, as previously discussed, which includes appeals to those who are willing to give at a higher level, to raise their dues above the standard level and/or to make contributions toward specific projects which addresses their specific interests as well as TBS needs. We believe this effort is off to a good start. In addition, we

are attempting to supplement this with event fund raising, specifically with the second reverse raffle and our annual spring event, which this year is built around a performance by the Second City comedy troupe. Both of these events serve a dual purpose of raising funds for TBS (a significant part of which will come from non-members, thereby reducing the financial burden for members) and providing an opportunity for social engagement amongst our members.

Our vision is that if this program is successful, TBS will be able to fund yearly operating requirements, make immediate needed repairs and build and maintain the TBS maintenance reserve with consistent annual funding through the operating budget. WE BELIEVE THAT, if successful, THEREAFTER TBS WILL BE ABLE TO FUND PERIODIC MAINTENANCE REQUIREMENTS, such as HVAC repair and replacement, parking lot maintenance and sanctuary chair and carpet replacement, FROM THE MAINTENANCE RE-SERVE SO THAT FUTURE APPEALS TO MEMBERS TO PAY FOR SPECIFIC REPAIRS/REPLACEMENTS WILL NOT BE NECESSARY.

The strategic plan, including the Above and Beyond program are intended to guide TBS through the next five years. It will take 15 -20 years to start to significantly benefit from the Life and Legacy program. There will need to be further consideration of the intermediate 10 or so years. However, it is critical that we start to think beyond just getting through the next year or two.

We recognize, and do not expect, that members will be able to participate in every part of Above and Beyond, fund raising events and Life and Legacy. We are offering a variety of options to allow members to select what appeals to them and what fits their individual financial circumstances.

We are pleased to have been accepted into the Life and Legacy program and excited that Pam Scheer, one of our immediate past co-presidents, has volunteered to lead this effort. We look forward to obtaining membership support for this project, as well as the Above and Beyond initiative. Such support will allow TBS to flourish both now and in the future.
