John 21:1-19



"At that time, Jesus revealed himself again to his disciples at the Sea of Tiberias. He revealed himself in this way. Together were Simon Peter, Thomas called Didymus, Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, Zebedee's sons, and two others of his disciples. Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We also will come with you." So they went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing. When it was already dawn, Jesus was standing on the shore; but the disciples did not realize that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, "Children, have you caught anything to eat?" They answered him, "No." So he said to them, "Cast the net over the right side of the boat and you will find something." So they cast it, and were not able to pull it in because of the number of fish. So the disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord." When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he tucked in his garment, for he was lightly clad, and jumped into the sea. The other disciples came in the boat, for they were not far from shore, only about a hundred yards, dragging the net with the fish. When they climbed out on shore, they saw a charcoal fire with fish on it and bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish you just caught." So Simon Peter went over and dragged the net ashore full of one hundred fifty-three large fish. Even though there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, "Come, have breakfast." And none of the disciples dared to ask him, "Who are you?" because they realized it was the Lord. Jesus came over and took the bread and gave it to them, and in like manner the fish. This was now the third time Jesus was revealed to his disciples after being raised from the dead. When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" Simon Peter answered him, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my lambs." He then said to Simon Peter a second time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Simon Peter answered him, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Tend my sheep." Jesus said to him the third time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter was distressed that Jesus had said to him a third time, "Do you love me?" and he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. Amen, amen, I say to you, when you were younger, you used to dress yourself and go where you wanted; but when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will dress you and lead you where you do not want to go." He said this signifying by what kind of death he would glorify God. And when he had said this, he said to him, "Follow me."

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Anthony & St Pius Families,

3rd Easter Sunday

Year C

John 20:19-31

Backsliding? Jesus had taught the apostles, "No one who sets a hand to the plow and looks to what was left behind is fit for the kingdom of God"(Lk 9:62). Yet, after Jesus' death, Peter seems to go back to what he knows – fishing! Is he slipping backward from faith in Christ, to his previous self-reliance? Or just trying to get his mind off the tragic events that have just happened? Many people suggest that one coping mechanism to deal with grief is to 'keep active' and 'maintain a routine'. I understand this advice to mean we should not just crawl into a cave to dwell on the overwhelming sadness and loss (memories, etc). Instead, a person can process grief better by keeping engaged in their daily activity around people and keep to their regular schedule of duties and programs (even hobbies/sports). The maintenance of such normal routines will moderate the otherwise overwhelming emotions that tend to sweep away our sense of reality. So, maybe to deal with his loss and Jesus' absence, Peter decides to return to what he knew best before Jesus: Fishing! Yet, it could also be that deep within Peter, he may have thought that if he returned to where he first met Jesus (Lk 5:3-11), then he'd find confirmation or comfort about what exactly he should do next: that if he returned to the same place where he was first called into discipleship by Jesus (seashore with net in hand), then he might more clearly know what his next vocational steps should be in life 'post-Jesus'.

But regardless of what we do, Jesus knows us and knows where to find us! Jesus always meets us where we are, and then walks with us farther down the road toward the Kingdom! We see this same action over in Luke's gospel when Jesus goes to find and recover the two disciples on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:). Jesus comes up to them as they walk along the road, meeting them where they are, and leads them to where they need to be! So with today's gospel of Jesus' seeking out Peter and the apostles on the seashore to call them again, He meets them where they are and rekindles the fire of their vocations to resume discipleship with Him. Always the Good Shepherd, Jesus seeks us out and brings us home – reconnecting us to Himself and His Flock (John 10:1-10). He walks us to the place where we belong! This reunion scene on the seashore is a great example of Jesus patiently letting us first "go our own way", unfortunately with us learning the hard way (again, how many times?) that we can do nothing without Him. Jesus respects our freedom, in which we make our own mistakes. Perhaps a haunting but very instructive question from Jesus is "Children, have you caught anything?" (John 21:5) Of course, without God, we do 'Nothing'. So of course, Peter and his crew catch nothing apart from Jesus -as they doing their own thing again. But back with Jesus, everything good, comes to us again.

This is quite the dramatic scene of redemption. Notice the attention that Jesus gives to the most prominent sinner in the group -Peter. Peter is the one who denied Jesus publicly three times (John). But Jesus being ever the merciful savior, He works with Peter again, allowing Peter to be part of his own redemption. Jesus has Peter three times publicly (in front of the apostles) affirm love and affiliation with Him (John). But more than Jesus helping Peter un-do his sinful harm, making right his wrong, I love how Jesus reveals a remedy for avoiding sin altogether: deny oneself and direct our energy toward others instead. Each affirmation of love that Peter utters to Jesus, Jesus then redirects Peter out of preoccupation with himself to focus upon the need of others, by saying "1) Feed, 2)Tend,3) Feed my sheep!" Isn't that so true? When I get out of myself and focus on helping other people, I can find relief from the anguish of my worry (rooted in pride/sin). When I seek to alleviate the suffering of others, my suffering dissipates. Not only do I realize how petty my own problems are, when compared to the greater need of others, I can also constructively contribute to good by helping them receive a little relief. When I reach out to help others, I can get over my own issues (There but for the grace of God, go I!) The 12 step program of AA speaks about promises that come about fulfilled, when we surrender our own wills to serve God's will, one of them being that "If I do what I can for others, then I'll discover that God does for me, what I cannot do for myself!" Turning my life over to God, and being directed by His loving will, brings a serenity and peace I could never achieve selfishly. It is God's work in me, as I rejoin His will and company!
