Greetings Wilmington Citizens; here is the news out of the Supervisor's Office:



First, I want to talk about our Christmas Celebration held in November. In partnership with Santa's Workshop, the Town, Fire Department, and many volunteers we put on the best Christmas Celebration in the East! Everyone really enjoys our night at the Workshop and this year we had seventy businesses and citizens donate to the cause. This event could not take place without the kindness and


support of the Wilmington people. Over 120 very happy children visited Santa for this great event.

We talked about the weather last time and, boy oh boy, here we go again. The extreme cold and the different warming/rain events and then cold again has formed ice that dynamite cannot move. The positive is we had our Skating Rink open earlier than I can remember; we also had a Zamboni donated to the Town from ORDA which has been performing fine in maintaining the Rink. We thank ORDA for their generous donation. We also through a grant from Essex County Creating Healthy Places purchased a liner for the Skating Rink. This has also greatly enhanced the building of the rink. So come on out and enjoy the great outdoors.

I am sure that everyone has heard about the \$12 million for repairs to the Whiteface Mountain Veterans Memorial Highway. The entire Highway will be done from the bottom at Route 86 to the top. Work is to start by April 15th and may continue into 2015. The tentative schedule for the Toll Road is to be open on Friday, Saturday, Sunday at least for May, June, July. This may be altered as the construction moves forward. All events that have been held in the past will continue as planned. The bottom section from Route 86 to the Toll House will have one lane open at all times. We thank Governor Cuomo for coming to Wilmington to see the Highway and then making the funding available to perform the repairs cutting no corners.

The public meeting on the replacement of the stone bridge in the center of town has been conducted. For those who did not attend, the construction will start March 1st 2015. At this time the bridge will be closed to all traffic. This is a total replacement and the new Bridge will look very similar to the current one with lighting added. There will be no temporary bridge. The contract will allow for total closure for ninety days, (March, April, May) with a large incentive for having a lane opened on time and a fine for every day over.

The town is working on trying to have the utilities placed inside of the

bridge, doing away with the overhead wires; we're not sure yet if this will be successful. Starting March 1st should cause the most minimal disruption and enable us to have a lane open for the start of the prime tourist season.

The town is looking for an individual to fill an opening on the Board of Assessment Review. This is the board you would come to if you think your property assessment is too high. It is a one-day job that pays \$ 125.00. There is a required training session. If interested, please contact the town offices for further information.

The improvements to Heritage Park are 99% finished. We just have the landscaping inside of the island to complete in the spring. I want to thank the town forces for all the hard work; the area is spectacular now. It is also very beautiful at night with all the new lighting. We still have more work to complete at the beach. We are planning to construct a new handicapped fishing dock, replace the fireplaces and add a nature trail on two acres the town owns that adjoin the Beach. We will also add some picnic tables.

The town has two new gateway signs, a new park sign, and a new beach sign that will be installed in the spring. The town received a grant for new signage and the signs were created by a Wilmington native, Michelle Walker, from Lake Placid. They have an "Adirondack" look and will be mounted on cedar logs. We also have a new sign coming for Hardy Road/Springfield Road intersection which will identify the Mountain Bike/Hiking Trails. This sign and the park sign are being paid for through a grant from Essex County Creating Healthy Places. They will all have a similar look to the new signs at Heritage Park/ Visitors Bureau.

The town is going to operate a mountain bike shuttle this summer. We ran a shuttle twice last year and it was a huge success. We will be transporting mountain bikers from the Up a Creek Restaurant parking lot (Mt. Bike Trailhead) to the start of the infamous "poor man's downhill" which is just below the toll house on the Whiteface Highway. The Mountain Bike trails are becoming more and more popular and this activity is something Wilmington can grasp onto as our own. The shuttles are going to start Bikefest weekend, (June 20, 21, 22) and run every two weeks all summer through September. We anticipate it will run on Sundays from 1-4 pm with a \$ 5.00 per head charge for the entire 3 hours. Stay tuned for more info as we get closer.

The Town continues to work with the owner of the old Wilson Farm Store to come up with a solution that we can all live with. The 7-11 Corporation has not been cooperative in cleaning the place up. As it stands today, 7-11 Corporation has the lease until April 2015. We are hopeful that something can be done to get rid of this eyesore. We are also hopeful that an answer to a gas station will be coming soon.

I want to continue to give a plug to the High Peaks Health Center. They are open five days a week and can be reached at 946-1111. Let's support the people who support Wilmington.

Safety Tips

With the unusually cold winter that we are experiencing comes issues that everyone needs to address to stay safe:

If you use a supplemental heating unit, make sure it is placed safely away from any combustible materials.

Check and replace all batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

If you experience frozen water pipes, do not use an open flame to try and thaw them. Use a hair dryer if the pipe is accessible and if not, call a plumber.

Make sure to have your wood burning stove or chimney cleaned and inspected as soon as the weather warms up.

Dispose of your hot ashes by putting them in a metal container and placing them outside away from your home to completely cool before discarding them.

Please try to keep your driveway or private road as free from snow and ice as possible so emergency vehicles have easy access to you.

Keep your driveway or private road open to at least 12 feet wide by trimming trees and brush on each side.

Check on your neighbors if you have not seen any activity to make sure they are safe.

Junk Vehicles

The Fire Department will take any vehicles that you have no need for so they can use them in training exercises. They will come and get it and dispose of it when done. Contact Chief Louie Adragna for more information.

If you are interested in becoming a member, you must be at least 18 years old and live or work within the Wilmington Fire District. You may contact any of the above Officers for an application and you can join both Fire and Rescue or just the Rescue side, assisting with ambulance calls.

DOG CONTROL NEWS




All dogs over four months old **are required by law** to be licensed and should wear

their license tag for identification purposes. Licenses need to be renewed each year. Owners that have unlicensed dogs or dog licenses that have expired can expect to receive a summons to appear in court in violation of the town dog control ordinance. This could result in fines and court fees. Also, a reminder that there is a leash law in Wilmington and it is a violation of the law for dogs to be running loose. Licensing may be done at the Town Clerk's Office at the Community Center. If you need a copy of the dog control ordinance, please feel free to contact me at 946-1282.

FILM NIGHT a big success Co-sponsored by the Wilmington Historical Society and ORDA at Whiteface, on Oct. 25th "Legacy-Austria's Influence on American Skiing" featuring Hannes Schneider & His Disciples, by Culture Films, LLC was presented to the public. Popcorn and drinks were provided by WHS and Centerplate. A good way to usher in the 2013-2014 ski season, it was well attended by 45 people, all with positive feedback on the program. In fact, one of our attendees, Doris Bramm, shared with us that as a Massachusetts college student she came to Lake Placid (by train) in 1939 to compete in a Kate Smith women's ski race. At that event, she met both Hannes Schneider and Otto Schniebs, who gave advice to skiers and timed the race. She was thrilled with the film! And we were excited about her adding local reality to our history!

October Native American Children's Program Well-received

"Native Americans of the Adirondacks" was presented to the fourth graders at Lake Placid Elementary School on October 10th and 11th by Native Mohawk, Margaret Horn. Coordinated by teacher Alison Smith, Margaret Horn and retired teacher Karen Peters, not only did it support the social studies curriculum, it was a hands-on learning experience for the children. From the artifacts that they could actually touch, to the leather beaded pouches that they created and were able to take home, to the slide shows, the music, game----it all enhanced their understanding of

Native American history and culture, and in particular, the Mohawk Nation. We are pleased that it was received so well by both the students and the teachers.

Research Assistance for Whiteface Highway and Wilmington Bridge Projects

One of the charges of the Wilmington Historical Society is to provide research assistance to both local and state agencies whenever needed. We have been especially busy this year providing photos and information for both the Whiteface Veterans Memorial Highway Project and the Wilmington Bridge Project. As a result of our digitation of Wilmington and Whiteface Mountain area photos, we were able to readily supply four different state and local agencies with the photos they needed to replace/restore our local heritage sites. We also thank our WHS Trustee Doug Wolfe for providing both his local history knowledge and his historical and technical resources for both projects. We are only glad that we were able to make this process a little easier and provide historically accurate information for these two very important ventures.

Adirondack Foundation (formerly Adirondack Community Trust)

The Wilmington Historical Society has opened an "Acorn Account" with the Adirondack Foundation, formerly the Adirondack Community Trust, in order to better plan for our future and to sustain our organization in perpetuity. The Adirondack Foundation is an endowment fund which helps local non-profit organizations to build long-term philanthropic support through charitable giving. 
