Catch The Action

July On The Water

Summer is family time on the waters of Southwest Florida. As travel plans have changed over the past several months, many of us are staying close to home and enjoying what is available in our back yard. Lucky for us, we are a travel and vacation destination for folks around the world. We have plenty of outdoor activities to keep us busy without traveling.

Summer snapper fishing heats up this month, as fish move inshore in good numbers and just off the coast. If a fish dinner is your target, snapper is your best bet. They are as tasty as a fish can get and have keen eyesight making it necessary to lighten up the tackle to fool them. Fluorocarbon leader from 10- to 20-pound test is a must. Small hooks and baits deliver better hookups, I generally go with a 1 to 1/0 circle hook, or a small jig head. Shrimp,

small pilchards, and pinfish are top baits. Small pieces of cut bait is a good choice, it's often necessary to allow the bait to lay on bottom of drift with the current in a natural manner. This is accomplished by allowing slack in the



line. Many times, we keep the bail open on the reel until a fish picks up and starts running line.

From the shallow flats inshore to reefs offshore, snapper respond well to chumming. A store-bought box of chum tied off to the boat in a chum bag is the most popular. If you are cast netting your own bait, it's possible to load up with plenty of extras. Cutting the baits up and creating a continuous flow with the current is a good tactic as well. No doubt, a box of chum is the simplest and easiest, I would recommend more than one box. It's frustrating to finally get fish fired up then run out of chum.

Catch and release snook fishing is at its peak through the summer. Large females are up and down the coast surrounded by smaller males as they complete their mating rituals. Possibly the best fishing happens in the surf along the gulf beaches. Snook will swim parallel to the beach, often just a few feet from shore in search of their next meal. This offers great sight fishing possibilities. Baits vary, but artificials that mimic a small oily baitfish are best. Over the summer, breeding snook feed heavy on oily bait fish. Pilchards, thread herring, pinfish, pigfish, or small mullet are top baits.

Leader is important as snook have good eyesight as well. Fishing an open area without structure, 20- to 30-pound fluorocarbon leader is a good choice. Around structure such as snags, docks, rocks and so on, then we need to bump up and fish from 30- to 50-pound leader. Circle hooks are the way to go live bait fishing, generally 1/0 to 3/0 is a good range. With circles, most fish are hooked in the corner of the mouth allowing a quick and safe release. Snook season is closed, have fun catching them but safely return them to water as quickly as possible.

A fun family day on the water may include catching a mess of snapper for dinner then heading to the nearest beach. While the family is shelling, swimming, or soaking up the sun, we get the opportunity to cool off in the surf while taking a chance at hooking into some snook. Our local waters have a lot to offer over the summer, I hope you get out there and enjoy it.

Summer Is Here!

Practicing Water Safety Is Important To Everyone

That means people will be having a good time on the water – whether it is swimming or being on some kind of boat! Lee County has one of the highest numbers of boatrelated deaths in the state. The Injury Prevention Coalition of Lee County



reminds everyone that water safety should be practiced. In 2012, 71 percent of all fatal boating accident victims drowned, and of those who drowned, 85 percent were not wearing a life jacket. Drowning is the leading cause of injury-related death among children between one and four years old.

It is the third leading cause of death among children. Here are a few basic tips from Safe Kids Worldwide to keep you safe:

- Teach children how to swim, tread water, and float.
- Teach children that swimming in open water is not the same as swimming in a pool.
- Teach children how to swim in case they are caught up in a riptide.

- Always wear a life jacket when on boats, around open bodies of water, or when you are participating in water sports.
 - Make sure the life jacket fits properly.
- Babies should not travel on a boat until they are the appropriate weight to wear an approved life jacket.
- Swimming aids, such as water wings or noodles, are fun toys but should not be used in place of life jackets.
- Get a vessel safety check each year for free from the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary or U.S. Power Squadron.
- A large portion of boating accidents involve alcohol consumption, so neither boat operators nor passengers should drink. It would be wise to learn CPR. Teach children not to dive into bodies of water because you never know what might be hidden under the surface.

Every child is different, but they should never be left alone in or around water. Babies can drown in as little as one inch of water.

The Lee County Injury Prevention Coalition serves as a collaborative effort or partnership whose function is to facilitate partners' work and act as a catalyst for injury prevention initiatives. Its mission is to prevent injury disability and death through advocacy, education, legislation, and partnerships.



Mailbox Maintenance And Repair

Mailbox doors have a closure spring that eventually breaks after thousands of openings. It is important to replace them as soon as they are discovered as they usually result in a broken



door, which is a much more expensive repair. Call **Dennis Shelley**, (239) 887-1042. The cost of installing a new spring is \$34. If the door casting breaks, it costs an additional \$112 to repair the door. Dennis also has specially manufactured flagpole holders to match the lampposts. They are available for \$89 installed. Your mailbox and lamppost can also be repainted for \$49, which will bring them back to their "like-new" appearance. Dennis also offers handyman services.

ERPOA Board Of Directors Interim Report 2020

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, we have not held board meetings after the annual general membership meeting in March. Nonetheless, the ERPOA Board and various committees have continued their work on behalf of the Association and its members. This report highlights current activities and financial status.

Secretary/Treasurer Report

In April we opened a new Certificate of Deposit account with Live Oak Bank in the amount of \$125,000. This was funded from the TIAA Money Market Account. Now all balances at each bank are within FDIC limits.

2020 Annual Assessments

- To date, 616 of 620 owners have paid (99 percent) of the 2020 assessment along with a few partial payments for a total of \$179,067.54.
 - Third and final notices were mailed March 16, 2020
 - Reminder notices were mailed on April 30, 2020
- We decided to hold on turning over remaining outstanding 2020 assessments in May
- I recommend we turn over the remaining six outstanding 2020 assessments (four single-family homes, two condominiums) to the Association's attorney the first week of June to begin formal collection process.
- We also have five outstanding late fees which will be carried on the books and added to the next invoice for each respective property (mailbox repair, 2021 assessment, other).

Architectural Review Committee

Please be sure to submit an application for approval of any planned alteration to your property, e.g., new roof, pool cage, paint, driveway, major landscaping, etc., as required in the Deed of Restrictions.

Please do not leave trash containers, ladders, etc., where they are visible from the street.

Also do not place containers or yard waste out to the curb more than 24 hours before the scheduled weekly pickups.

Deed of Restrictions Section A-15: Pets must be on a leash at all times when being walked outside of the owner's property boundaries. The pet owner is responsible for picking up all animal




waste from their pet at all times. This includes the common areas! Violators are subject to fining.

Please call Joe Foster, (239) 218-7714, leave your name, address and phone number. We encourage owners with faded and/or dirty mailboxes to have them cleaned and repainted. Dennis Shelley will clean and paint your lamppost and mailbox for \$49. His number is (239) 887-1042. Additional information about mailboxes can be found on our website, www.eagleridge33912.com. The Association recently had all the street signs freshened up, cleaned and painted by Dennis Shelley. Thank you, Dennis, they look fabulous. Unfortunately, we do have a few homeowners who will need to be fined to bring their properties into compliance with the Deed of Restrictions. That process will begin once we are able to safely convene meetings.

Security Report

Summer usually brings an increase in thefts from unlocked cars, so, once again, do not leave anything of value in your car and be sure to lock the car doors. In response to our request,

Lee County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) has done some traffic enforcement (speeding) in Eagle Ridge. Please always drive carefully, especially at dawn or dusk, there are many walkers, skaters, baby strollers, bikers sharing the road.

Eagle Ridge is a "no soliciting" community. If salespeople are going from door to door, call the LCSO nonemergency number, (239) 477-1000. A deputy will respond and resolve the problem.

Please stay safe and healthy, keep your "social distance" and follow the suggestions about face coverings and gloves when you go out.

President's Report

We have finally reached the conclusion of the 4-plus year litigation saga pitting the condominium owners against the master association. The trial court and the appellate court ruled that the statute of limitations of five years, had long expired (in 1993) barring the action. The case was filed in 2015, about 22 years too late. A remaining issue pertaining to an award of attorney fees was resolved when ERPOA elected to not pursue the potential award. An agreed order closing the case was filed. Hopefully, we can now go forward, as neighbors working together to keep Eagle Ridge beautiful and a lovely place to live.

The FPL underground electric project remains incomplete. A new project manager has taken over the job. Unfortunately, a lone homeowner at 7050 Twin Eagle Lane (right next to the wastewater treatment plant) has, thus far, refused to grant a small easement to FPL to allow their equipment to remain where it is. That equipment was placed, in plain view, with the permission of the previous owners, at the very far edge of the irregular shaped lot long before the current owner purchased the property. The association has offered to landscape around the equipment, and to maintain the landscaping in order to allay any concerns about the appearance, but the homeowner still refuses. FPL will now have to relocate the equipment, causing a substantial delay in getting the project finished. The purpose of the FPL project is to limit power outages as a secondary line, in the event we lose power to the primary electric line. So, should we experience extended outages before this project can be completed, you will understand why.

Lee County Yard Waste Regulations

- Do not place out for pickup more than 24 hours early.
- Yard waste must be containerized (50 pounds or less), or securely tied into bundles not heavier than 50 pounds and no longer than 6 feet in length.
- Up to 50 pounds of unbundled palm fronds may be placed at the curb. Any excess palm fronds must be tied into bundles, each weighing 50 pounds or less.



- When using plastic bags, make sure that the contents can be easily identified by the refuse truck driver (leave a twig or small branch sticking out).
- Call 239-337-0800 for a cost estimate for large-scale yard waste disposal projects when containerizing or bundling is difficult.
