MARTYR ELMORE BOLLING
1908-1947



The Episcopal Diocese of Alabama and the Commission on Race Relations in the Church welcome the inclusion of Martyr Elmore Bolling in the 2013 Pilgrimage and Procession for the Feast of Jonathan Myrick Daniels the Martyrs of Alabama. An entrepreneur and philanthropist, Mr. Bolling developed his business as a farmer, livestock owner, trucker, transporter, and restaurateur. Elmore Bolling was killed in Lowndesboro, Alabama on December 4, 1947. Investigation of the NAACP concluded that he was murdered because he was “too prosperous to be a Negro farmer”. A historic marker was erected on Highway 80 near mile marker 114 on December 2, 2007, on the 60th anniversary of his death.

In the quest to acknowledge all persons who have lost their lives due to racial prejudice, arrogance, hatred, ignorance, or injustice, the Commission on Race Relations invites anyone who has knowledge and documentation of other Alabama Martyrs to make the information known and share the story with us.
