The Hummer's of Summer!!

Since summer is already in full swing (even if the calendar doesn't yet agree), I thought that it would be fun and appropriate to provide everyone with some basic information on "our" hummingbirds and how we can attract & maintain healthy hummingbird habitat in our homesteads!

Hummingbirds of the Southwest: Allen's, Anna's, Black-chinned, Blue-throated, Broad-billed, Calliope, Broad-tailed, Costa's, Lucifer, Magnificent, Rufous, Violet-crowned, White-eared.

How to make good hummer habitat! Provide Hummers with sugar water in a clean/safe feeder! Feeders come in two general types, bottles inverted to create a vacuum, with nectar available at one or more ports around the bottom or saucer shaped containers with holes in the top. Perches are not necessary, but they do encourage hummingbirds to stay longer at each feeding, and perches allow human viewers to see birds at rest. Nectar should be replaced (and feeders cleaned) every two days in 70 degrees Fahrenheit or higher or when feeders are in direct sunlight. Clean feeders with hot water and vinegar using a bottle brush or old toothbrush. Sugar water composed of one part sugar to four parts water should be offered to your hovering visitors. Boil your water/sugar solution for a few minutes, let cool and then store in your refrigerator. Honey is not a good food because it spoils quickly and hosts a fungus that fatally infects hummingbird tongues, causing death by starvation.

Provide Hummers with Bugs!
Provide Hummer's with small insects (by luring the insects with fruit). Hummingbirds will readily dine on gnats and fruit flies. It is easy to attract these beneficial insects by placing banana peels or melon rinds in an inconspicuous place near nectar feeding.

Provide Hummers with "the basics" of a good home via good habitat!

Provide Hummer's with good habitat via native plants for nectar & nesting, and a water source! In addition to providing feeders, one of the best ways to entice hummingbirds to your yard is to create habitat that is attractive to them. Plantings that provide food, shelter and nesting sites are wonderful attractants to hummers (see the list of "good" hummer plants, below). Avoid using insecticides, fungicides, or other chemicals that could harm the hummingbirds. In the spring you can offer female hummers raw materials for their nests. They are fond of strands of human (or pet) hair and lint from the dryer, especially in shades of grey, white, or blue-grey. These materials can be placed in an empty suet container (made of large-gauge hardware cloth) on a tree trunk. Hummingbirds enjoy dripping water, which they choose over still pools. They enjoy darting in and out of sprinklers when you water your lawn. If you offer a pool make sure the edges are shallow enough for a hummer to stand in without being submerged.



This year's event was once again full of fun and a few surprises!

The weather was fairly nice (even though it was considerably "hotter" then the norm) and the wind remained relatively non-existent.

167 species were seen during the official May 6 & 7 count days by approximately 45 counters (~half of which were students!!). Most of these observations were made in the local area/region but a few were also made by Richard Hermosilla & his family in the Bosque Del Apache region of NM.

Hugh & Sally Jameson did a count while doing a weeklong trip along the TX coast.
