THE VISION COPY FOR NOVEMBER 2020, FROM LAURA MCCOURT VP/MEMBER CHAIR

It has been a busy October for Grosse Pointe Soroptimists as we continue our activities honoring 100 years of Woman Suffrage. "Ruth" our suffragist scarecrow continues to grace the neighborhood of Co-President Ellen Chapin. She will be in place until November 1st, ensuring that all who visit her know Soroptimist is alive and well in our community. Mid-month, a contingent of masked, white outfitted, sash wearing SIGP members, joined the local AAUW chapter in a march of solidarity, celebrating the ratification of the 19th amendment, in 1920. The marchers: women, men, children and dogs, were led by female students from Grosse Pointe who are participating in a STEM program, sponsored by the AAUW. It was a beautiful fall day and even the cars stopped in traffic, sent up supportive cheers. Our final activity in the voting theme, involved 9 volunteers from our Club who completed 225 postcards in less than a week, urging traditionally low turnout voters to exercise their right to vote. SIGP participated in this non-partisan project sponsored by the ACLU, and facilitated locally by the Grosse Pointe League of Women Voters October 14 was, by popular acclaim, our last outdoor meeting of the season. SIGP "techies" are becoming adept at running a hybrid, in person and on Zoom, meeting, but it was just TOO cold, so we'll be Zooming until spring. Fortunately, our featured speaker is a native Michigander and knows how to dress for the weather. Kathleen Gallagher has been associated with the Grosse Pointe Public Library since 2003. She began her career in our community as a children's librarian, and is now the head Outreach Librarian in our community. With all our libraries closed due to COVID, the Library is working hard to complete planned improvement projects at each of our three branches. With 2 locations open, they are transitioning from curbside delivery, and donation drop-off, to limited use of the computers and new book browsing. In the meantime, the library staff is offering numerous new book clubs, webinars, and movie/ discussion groups. Ms. Gallagher also has continued the outreach to the homebound, offered by the library. Before COVID, there were 90 Grosse Pointe residents regularly visited by Outreach librarians, providing them with much appreciated reading material. Although the libraries have been closed, we Grosse Pointe Soroptimists have benefitted since Co-President Ellen Chapin found her inner librarian. Ellen can be seen with a wheel barrow, hauling her "Book sale" to meetings. "Flash sales" take place in her garage, and low level wheeling and dealing has been reported. We are a community of readers and Ellen has helped us feed our habit. Soroptimists of Grosse Pointe has had a good month and we're looking forward to new activites in November. Stay well and turn vour clocks back!

SI of MOUNT VERNON and KNOX COUNTY

At the end of September, our club was able to have an "inperson" meeting at Ariel Foundation Park. We had a lovely evening and a special guest — Abby Boulton! Thanks to Carolyn who came early to make sure everything was in good condition and brought "Soroptimist" cookies baked especially for us by Jenni Tharpe. It was really nice to see everyone! Abby spoke briefly about starting up Round Table discussions which we are on board with and she presented us with our awards which we would have received at conference. Nice Surprise!



SI of Kenton/Hardin County

The SI Kenton/Hardin County club continued to have virtual meetings this summer and in September. The club had started a community service project in March when Covid-19 entered into the picture. The SI Kenton/Hardin County club collected feminine hygiene products and small cosmetic bags. Based on global, national, and local data that indicates that many girls miss school when they have their monthly cycle, the club decided to contact all county schools to determine if there was a local need. A letter was sent to the 6 county school district superintendents. The superintendents had the school nurses contact our members. All 6 districts notified us that they had a need for feminine hygiene products. At our meetings, we collected bags and products. Then Covid-19 hit and the schools were closed. Since then, we partnered with Ohio Northern University's Alpha Xi Delta sorority to combine the products into the bags, which we refer to as "dignity" bags. These little bags are colorful and private and offer a nice way to let women and girls know that we care about them. The women on campus put together 99 dignity bags. Now that the schools are open again, the dignity bags will be provided to the school nurses for distribution. Due to the overabundance of product and bags donated by our 32 members, we have enough bags to distribute to county food banks and county assistance programs. We have been so pleased with the response to this project and our partnership with the campus sorority. The club plans to continue with this effort and support our community as only Soroptimists can do!!

Submitted by former Governor Vivian Walczesky, at a ZOOM meeting on September 24, 2020. 195 Participants from around the globe.

SUBJECT: SI VOICES SPEAK OUT FOR OLDER WOMEN

FIRST SPEAKER - One of our Soroptimist UN representatives from New York, Frances Zainoeddin, spoke on older women's positions in the world, and that by year 2050, women will comprise fifty-four percent (54%) of the world population age 65 and over.

CONNECTING UN TO THE GRASSROOTS

Submitted by former Governor Vivian Walczesky at webinar on October 10, 2020, entitled: **ECOSOC CONSULTATIVE STATUS FOR SI: CONNECTING UN TO THE GRASSROOTS**

The host of this meeting was SI of Calcutta India.

SI President Sharon Fisher began with informing all participants that this was a "great great idea."

The four (4) speakers were:

Pat Black - SI Advocacy Advisor - breaking down the meaning of Consultative Status

Beverly Bucur – SI Advocacy Director – how the SI UN Reps use our work on the local club level to influence policy at the United Nations

Linda Witong – SI Advocacy Advisor – how the work done by SI clubs at the grassroots level helped in shaping our SI Statements to the UN

Dr. Kay Richmond – SIGBI Programme Director – the difference between SI General Consultative Status and SIGBI's Special Consultative Status

Pat Black is a member of SI Edinborough Scotland and member of SIGBI. In 1946, SI became part of the UN, and what you do at the club level goes right through to the United Nations. NGO Consultative Status with ECOSOC—Soroptimist is one of only 134 NGOs focusing on women and girls. Specialized consultative status held by three (3) federations: SI Europe, SI Great Britain & Ireland; and SI South West Pacific.

We have to demonstrate with General Consultative Status "substantial and sustained objectives" as follows:

- *a global presence
- *extensive expertise across their work
- *significant relevance in most areas of UN work
- *be highly active at the United Nations

Benefits of General Consultative Status to SI:

- *increase opportunities to input into the UN system
- *allowed to submit longer more detailed reports and recommendations
- *increased access to meetings
- *being allocated more delegate places
- *higher prestige and higher level acknowledgment
- *enables access to UN agencles

SIA does not have recognized consultative status but nevertheless can participate by being a delegate through the other SI delegation seats through CSW. For those of us who have been attending CSW / UN meetings annually, you can secure more information from your local club members who have attended.

Beverly Bucur – SI Advocacy Director. Member of SI Illiana, Midwestern Region. How the work of SI clubs to influence policies of the United Nations. Bev has 40 years of experience as an Educator.

SI and the UN connect globally. We have not made the advances we had hoped to make since Beijing and due to coronavirus as a global pandemic. We are a volunteer organization and recruit volunteers for representation to advocate for women and girls. In Rome, SI recognized international day of food. In Nairobi, working on environments. In Paris, education and UNESCO and future of education.

CONNECTING UN TO THE GRASSROOTS

Our UN representatives work to ensure that the work SI does is so important. We need your work on the local level and data to support your local club work. All our information is shared with our UN Representatives and UN member states. SI now has 21 representatives who work across UN centers. The newest center is in Bangkok.

All of SI advocacy work is based on the principles of human rights and driven by club projects.

From your local projects to global voice, our local work covers the needs of women and girls. Feedback to SI via federation is extremely important including use of best practices local and globally.

Soroptimists work at the grassroots level. Soroptimists give hands-on knowledge recognizing the work we do in our local communities. Local projects tell SI/UN the following: quality and data tells your story; qualitative and quantitative data needed. Did we help women and girls, children, and even men. How did our work impact our community? What did we actually do?

Many agencies at the United Nations are looking for projects that local clubs are doing. What are our local clubs doing since Covid 19 hit? Our work is so very important but even more important now due to coronavirus.

Join Soroptimist LAB, a closed forum for Soroptimists to talk with our own members and UN reps. If you would like to have a UN Representative talk at a meeting, you can contact them through the LAB. Or check soroptimistinternational.org.

Linda Witong – SI Advocacy Advisor. How the work done by SI clubs at the grassroots level has helped in shaping SI statements to the UN. Linda is a member of SI Marin County California club. She has done femicide and human trafficking presentations, spoken on elder and child abuse; and is a former prosecutor, and current researcher for SI. SI represents the views from members all over the world. A reminder from Linda that we also have treaties and declaration documents applicable to countries of the world.

Linda began her presentation about the "austerity" of our concerns as Soroptimists. If you are unfamiliar with the word "austerity," it has several definitions, but the one that concerns us as Soroptimists deals with the economic policies used by governments to reduce budget deficits during adverse economic conditions. These governmental policies may include spending cuts, tax increases, or a mixture of both. In reducing government spending, it generally also increases unemployment. So, what are Soroptimist concerns around the world? How are our governments helping women and girls?

In our outcome documents which are furnished to the UN, our data should indicate that women and girls are important in economic outcomes, not relaxed but intensified outcomes.

Linda provided information about women's health care. Should women's health care be expanded or diminished. What is lowering the standards and who decides. What is essential? What about medicine? All research should be compiled together on all these topics. What is universal and equitable and affordable. Is medicine up to date, relevant, and affordable? Will financial hardship be imposed on the user?

Linda discussed water and sanitation, food and energy. What is in the final outcome document and what is not? Women and girls should have equal access and transportation to water and sanitation.

CONNECTING UN TO THE GRASSROOTS

Is sanitation secure and socially acceptable to the cultural norms? Migrants affected by natural disasters should be included.

With each year that Soroptimists have been providing final outcome documents, many member states used ambiguous wording, catch phrases, caveats, and escape hatches, to not comply and/or remove a clause or phrase that they refused to agree with or wanted removed from the final outcome document. Finally, in 2017, the United Nations indicated that no more ambiguous wording, catch phrases, caveats, escape hatches, or any other forms of contradictory wording by member states would be acceptable.

Linda emphasized that education for all women and girls should be lifelong especially in this time of digital divide. Access to financial literacy was also necessary. STEM and STEAM must be available to women and girls. All clubs need to address gender and stereotypes in curriculums. Continued education must be provided to pregnant mothers. BE LEAD-ERS.

Dr. Kay Richmond. SIGBI Programme Director. Special consultative status for SI Europe since 2011; for SIGBI since 2013, and for SISWP since 2014. As special consultative status, sustainable development is a federation programme dealing with: people, prosperity, peace, partnership, and planet. Dr. Richmond stated that likely CSW 65 will be virtual.

She stressed that partnerships were key to outcomes of equality, equity, and justice.

There are also eleven (11) other organizations working with/for women and girls, and among them are: Zonta, International Business and Professional Women, World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts, International Alliance of Women, International Council of Women, to name a few. What local partners could your local Soroptimist club partner with for a webinar, for an outside event, for a financial supporter?

One of the questions from Dr. Richmond concerned the UN removal of escape hatches, caveats, etc., and when that was done, did a member state then withdraw and would not want to honor the documents they previously agreed to. The pushback from grassroots to federations must continue, from our local clubs all the way to SI and the UN.

Your local projects are important. Please continue to be creative and help women and girls with your local projects that benefit your local community. From local, to region, to national, to global, that's what Soroptimists around the world continue to volunteer to do, and to pushback to get the SDGs done by 2030. BE LEADERS. You can do this.

Hon. Jackie Weatherspoon – worked for US State Dept; UNDP, UNIFEM, and UN Women Know your senators and congressman; know how to get a bill passed; AHA Foundation

Dr. Nina Smart – advocate for FGM (female genital mutilation) And Isatu Barry – who told her story about being an FGM survivor

Angela Peabody – FGM survivor – education is the key to ending FGM. She said FGM and child-hood marriage are "twin sisters" and both should be abolished.

Mariya Taher – SAHIYO Co-founder – FGM in the United States. The United Nations recognizes FGM as a global issue. What is the law in your state regarding FGM?

Dr. Ann-Marie Wilson – found & executive director of "28 Too Many" a research organization and information based.

Chiara Cosentino – head of policy & advocacy at the End FGM European Network www.endfgm.eu

Beverly Bucur – SI Director of Advocacy. Recently in Geneva, international recognition that FGM is a human rights violation and a national prior public health issue. The SI Road to Equality is our best practice model. SI working with six (6) local activists and media to change the mindset in various countries. Community leaders, religious organizations, law enforcement, etc., must be included in any talks about FGM, which is a cultural practice. There is no basis in either the Bible or the Koran for FGM. Bev's call to action: know what's happening in your local community about FGM; educate women and girls about their rights.

Meeting the Digital Divide Through Action. Guest speaker: Dr. Mariagrazia Squicciarini, Ph.D. Senior Economist at CSOCD

We must understand what the issues are in order to fix the root causes of gender equality and gender differences in the percentage of women among STEM programs. Worldwide, women are 26% less likely to have smartphones. Compulsory education helps eliminate the digital gender divide. What obstacles are present for women/girls to bridge the gender equality gap? When do women/girls display greater literacy and problem solving and when does that gap dissipate in achievement where boys outperform girls.

Teachers need to be aware of the extent to which they may influence students especially anxieties, mindset, and approaches to support students and girls in particular. Does the school have the updated technology for girls who wish to excel in STEM programs and make the digital world more female friendly.

Skills are key to succeed and narrow the gender wage gap. Skills in high demand in digital intensive sectors are displayed more by men. How many girls/women continue on with STEM programs as they continue their education? Does the school/college have any organization that girls/women can join to help them navigate the STEM world or the digital world. How has the coronavirus impacted the digital learning for girls/women?

Girls/women face some important challenges in education. How do girls/women deal with societal, economic, technological, demographic, ad political issues. How do we educate our girls for their future rather than based on the past. Education is the key. Are the learning institutions up for this task when faced with budget cuts, low motivation, keeping teachers on the cutting edge of learning, and keeping girls/ women engaged in learning during this pandemic time. Do we have female role models coming from STEM? Who are these women? Have peer groups been established for girls to help each other. Teachers are active agents for change.

Has your local club had a STEM graduate speak at your local club? How can all of us assist girls who wish to excel in the STEM programs? What's in your local community regarding STEM programs?
