MCCPTA Board of Directors – DRAFT MINUTES January 4, 2017 Carver Center Auditorium

Attending: President Paul Geller, VP Administration Steve Wilson, VP Programs Melissa McKenna, VP Education Jen McDonald, Treasurer Lisa Betts, acting secretary Tracie Potts and board members.

Paul Geller opened the meeting at 7:42pm and introduced guests.

Sherwin Collette, MCPS Chief Technology Officer

Reviewed Technology Plan Goal and Strategies. Discussed social media influence, increased reliance on and equitable access to digital material, partnership funding, student access to devices, connectivity, integration during the instructional day, hardware sustainability and teacher training/buy-in. Goal: 75% reduction in printed materials (not there yet). The Office of Shared Accountability is studying ES technology use. Always consider what *learning* technology use supports. Discussion included expanding ES digital literacy, coding, student privacy protection, real-time Edline reporting, and remote AP classes. Mr. Collette distributed and discussed the personal mobile devices policy under revision. The goal is enabling students to use personal devices in school for learning. The aim is not to restrict approved ES cell phones

Nicky Diamond, MCPS Chief Financial Officer

Diamond calls the Superintendent's Recommended Operating Budget is a "strategic plan in numbers," based on excellence for all by maintaining, continuing and improving outcomes and opportunities for students who not properly served. The budget summary, including Strategic Priorities, were shared and discussed. One percent of the requested \$62 million increase pays for growth. Diamond said MCPS recognizes that last year's large increase will not happen again so funds must be used wisely.

The Strategic Planning department (now in the Superintendent's office) is primarily responsible for tracking effectiveness, outcome and impact. This budget established baseline data, the initial stage of a long-term view of how the budget aligns with priorities.

- <u>Instructional Data Assistants</u>: (ES/ MS) All positions eliminated because new assessments and data systems such as "Performance Matters" electronically enter and analyze data. No manual entry is needed. By July 1/3 of schools will have this system. MCPS spent 2 years studying how to evolve this position, which no other area school systems have. This reduction saves \$7 million. Every effort will be made to retain individuals in other positions.
- Reading Initiative: 35 positions cut, 55 added, allocated based on student data. At some schools the position was not being used for this purpose. How this affects individual schools won't be known until program data is reviewed and allocations are made. Every effort will be made to retain individuals in other positions at the same or different schools.
- <u>SAT/ACT fees</u>: Members questioned whether paying fees for every student without determining financial need is the best use of funds. The Superintendent believes it sends a message about the importance of the test. She'll share this feedback with the Superintendent.

Discussion included better articulating how the budget addresses underserved students, schools and clusters.

New Business

- In the interest of time, written Officer and Committee Reports were noted.
- Per bylaws, BOD members present approved the Executive Committee's appointment of Tracie Potts to fill the BOD Secretary vacancy.
- VP Programs Melissa McKenna urged members to check today's email on the final lineup for Jan 5 &
 11 Operating Budget hearings. County Council hearings likely April 4-6. See fliers for budget forums.
- Paul noted the GT Choice resolution is provided (no quorum present to vote tonight).

The meeting adjourned at 9:55pm.

Chief Cook and Bottlewasher's Report

Aloha!

I hope you had a good January. Have been busier than ever with advocacy, outreach and office work. Especially the office work. :-)

Was writing the following as a winter break note, however my family had some unexpected losses and I just did not have my heart into it. Hope you will find this note, although belated, still as relevant as ever...

Was reading an interesting article in The New York Times about genetics a few weeks ago and came across this pearl of a quote, "We should exalt the outliers among us. But all too often we treat them shabbily." I think all of us can relate to that sentiment at one time or another in our lives.

My life has been enriched by befriending many such "outliers among us." My best friends growing up all fit that description as do many of my friends today. All are unique individuals which makes each and every one of them special to me. And that is why I am grateful to you. Yes, you!!!

If everyone were the same, the world would be a bland place. No new foods to try, no interesting places to visit, all the cars would look the same...uh...skip that last one since it actually seems to be the case these days. You know what I mean. Variety is the spice of life.

One of the best parts of this gig is getting to meet and talk with awesome PTA folks countywide. I literally bump into folks everywhere, enjoy talking to them and listening to why they volunteer in PTA. Some do it because no one else stepped up. Others do it because they love volunteering and community engagement. Your reasons are as unique as you are. And that is why I love working with you and all 49,999 of our other members. You each have a story, a passion and desire to share your dedication with others.

That is the spirit that makes PTA great. And, dare I say it, that is the spirit that makes this country great. And that is my challenge to you. Embrace our differences and move forward!

Over the past four and a half years of active involvement with MCCPTA I have seen incredible successes and some heartbreaking failures. The successes are many. Seeing colleagues who loathe public speaking swallow their fear and advocate for their schools. The record budget we advocated for and received from the County Council earlier this year. Seeing a school get what it needed because their supporters advocated the right way. Folks pitching in for training. And so much more. The failures invariably fall into one category – civility.

I keep hearing Rodney King's voice in my head saying, "Why can't we all just get along?" There is no answer to this rhetorical question. Yet I will attempt one – we need to work together for the sake of the kids.

Yes everyone, PTA exists to benefit the kids.

As one of the folks who probably puts about 60 to 80 hours plus a week into PTA (as do others) for several years now, who has advocated in every venue imaginable and has a proven track record of making things happen, I am aware of those who help us get things done. Decision makers say to me all too frequently, you get it. That is why I was approached by elected officials to start the ball rolling on securing funding last year for our Operating Budget. Rhetoric alone will not make things happen...it takes a good faith effort. This is about human relations, pure and simple.

Today I'm making a personal appeal to everyone in the MCCPTA family. Show civility toward one another. Expect that everyone else's intentions are good and if you happen to disagree with someone, maybe they simply have a different way in which to get the job done. Expect the best from everyone. And no this is not some sort of idealism borne out of watching Sesame Street as a child. It is about practicality. We are stronger as a group than we are as individuals.

Over the next several weeks you are going to be hearing from me about a big mission – to secure funding statewide for our school construction projects. This funding is beyond overdue from our state officials in Annapolis and they must do better for all the children of Maryland. As someone who has testified many times in Annapolis over the last few years, I am disappointed by the blasé response we receive from a few of our elected officials to our requests for help. This needs to change. And it can, with your help.

We need to go full bore after casino gambling revenue from table games! The current split of 80% for the casinos and a mere 20% for the Education Trust Fund is wholly unacceptable. It should be a solid 50/50 split...roughly similar to that of the video slot machines we were told would yield such great benefits for our schools. We also need to go after more GCEI (Geographic Cost of Education Index) funding. And, to be candid, ANY FUNDING, from Annapolis for our schools. And we will succeed.

The last year has been incredible. After being a key participant in several successes, we went **BIG** and pursued the \$100,000,000 over Maintenance of Effort. Everyone won! \$87,000,000 more each year from now on is going into our schools. 600+ new teachers were hired. Lives were changed for the better along with our schools. This was vital to our children's success.

Look, I would be feigning naïveté if I told you I didn't take this awesome job without knowing the heat would be on every now and then. I like the heat! That said, sometimes the light of truth needs to shine.

For the past several months, I have been working mightily to strengthen MCCPTA. When I took the helm, and completely unknown to me, we were facing a \$22,500 deficit from our Presidents and Principals Dinner alone. This was something only a couple of people were aware of. And, since we were without a Treasurer for the better part of two years, no one was there to tell us of this urgent problem. Now we are trying to fix it. The best and easiest way has been to forgo the hiring of an Office Manager. Lisa Betts, our Treasurer, and myself have been pinch hitting in this role. And our former Office Manager stayed on for a while to help as well.

The biggest challenge we have faced lacking an Office Manager has been with the directory or Blue Book. It needed plenty of attention. Over the last two months I have spent dozens of hours updating and correcting this guide. Many MCPS and telephone numbers were duplicated, a deceased Principal was still listed, and other items needed updating and formatting. In the end, it will be a great Blue Book. In short, we are burning the midnight oil. We are all volunteers. I certainly have the best of intentions to do everything I can, as a full-time volunteer, to further our PTA goals. Perfect? Nope. Well intentioned? Absolutely.

Finally, I want to thank you for your service. As a member of the Board of Directors you take on a responsibility that is, in many ways, over and above the call of your typical volunteer work. Much of what you do may not directly and immediately benefit your biological child(ren) or school. That said, if you do your job right, work together with your colleagues, the folks at MCPS and beyond, your efforts will bear tremendous fruit. And that is the goal: to work together for the betterment of our students and schools.

Thank you for your time and sharing your talent with us all.

Recent and Ongoing Issues

ROAs

The Required Quarterly Assessments, the revised grading system rolled out this year that replaces cumulative final exams, should *come home* for parents to see. As you know from never getting to see your child's exams for pretty much an entire generation of students, this is a complete shift in methodology...and one that parents welcome. Unlike final exams, RQAs allow feedback *during the course of instruction* instead of after instruction has ended, and allows parents to facilitate communication with the teacher with regard to their child's specific weak spots. If your child does not bring home his or her RQAs feel free to (a) raid your child's backpack or (b) contact your child's school. The relatively quick shift in test programs has left an information gap between what schools should be doing and what parents should expect.

Next on the testing horizon is a shift from the classic 'bubbling in' of test answers to testing that includes essays and other test methods. This shift is meant to better evaluate our students; plus who doesn't love fudging it with essay questions? At least you can get partial credit. Will keep you informed as progress unfolds.

Special Ed Advocacy

Our Special Ed. Chair Jeanne Taylor is actively advocating for support for House Bill 174 with a letter to Eric Luedtke and members of the House Ways & Means Committee. This bill requires written parent/guardian consent prior to changes being made to a student's Individual Education Program. If this issue is important to you please contact Jeanne and write a quick note of your own in support of this House Bill. If you know someone with a Special Ed child, maybe one too young to even be in school yet; please encourage them to contact Jeanne and write in as well. Encourage them to advocate *now* for the *future*.

The issue really comes down to the union contracts, not what is necessarily best for the young students who are highly impacted by their disabilities. Early intervention is key to their future success in and out of the classroom. Submitted written testimony to the BOE about these concerns.

*Also submitted written testimony to the MD General Assembly, House of Delegates, in support of HB174, with AMENDMENTS. The proposed legislation falls under Education - Children with Disabilities - Individualized Education Program Process - Parental Consent. The proposed legislation requires that an IEP team obtain written consent from a parent of a child with a disability if the team proposes specified actions like a change from a non-diploma track or when adding restraint and seclusion to the IEP. *An amendment is needed that includes language for a change in placement,* or any reduction in hours-based services that would result in a loss of 50% or more (including elimination) of that service as compared to the previous year's IEP. An amendment is in the works for the italicized piece but not for the reduction in the number of service hours.

ADVOCACY:

MCCPTA resolution in Support of the Provisions on Talent Development, Universal Screening, and CPHG/Magnet Program Expansion in the Choice Study Response Plan

Our school system is in need for our support. Many teachers and administrators have profound interests in improving the education quality. These provisions in Choice Study response plan is a positive step on the right direction. However, it is expected that there will be challenges in the detail and during the execution. It is foreseeable that parent awareness, involvement, and support will be a crucial factor of the plan's success.

GT Liaison in Every PTA

Each PTA is strongly encouraged to identify a volunteer to serve as its GT Liaison for the 2016-2017 school year. The GT Liaison plays a vital role in advocating for the needs of highly able learners by providing a critical link among the school community, the MCCPTA GCC, and MCPS. Math 7 and Math8

11 middle schools will not be offering Math 7 (and possibly Math 8) at all next year, in favor of putting all students in the compacted IM class followed by Algebra I without regard to assessment data from Math 6. We are hearing several parent concerns if these courses will not be offered to those students who are not ready for the compacted IM math class.

Math 4/5 and 5/6

This year, Math 4/5 is offered in home elementary schools and highly gifted centers, but not at the middle schools. Math 5/6 will be offered in home elementary schools, highly gifted centers, and middle schools this year.

The identification system will no longer be run out of Carver/AEI but will be "opened up" for local school decisions. Delivery method will be up to the principal. Delivery by way of differentiated instruction in an on-grade-level classroom will be allowed and, presumably, will not be discouraged. We are aware of one example of that going on right now, at College Gardens ES.

Kindergarten through third grade math is being reevaluated to see if it is too slow, and whether there are better ways to identify and prepare more students for math 4/5/6.

Advanced English in Middle Schools

An update meeting was held between OCIP (Office of Curriculum & Instructional Programs) and OSSI (Office of School Support & Improvement) to learn more about the current state of Advanced English as it relates to the MCPS system expectations. A collaborative meeting has been scheduled to review school strengths and needs and work together toward next steps. Parent-identified schools with differentiation skills needs will be shared with OSSI.

Middle schools were asked to complete an action template which responds to the school's action steps in the following areas: communication, school structures, professional learning and instructional delivery. From here, there are supposed to be ongoing conversations, support, and monitoring from the directors in their ongoing work with principals and schools.

AEI and OCIP will be working with OSSI to hear about their findings and see where support is needed.

MCCPTA Resolution in Support of the Provisions on Talent Development, Universal Screening, and CPHG/Magnet Program Expansion in the Choice Study Response Plan

Whereas enrichment and acceleration is a component of the MCPS Curriculum 2.0 with both strategies and programs;

Whereas in the Choice Study response plan, there is a talent development provision including Student Instructional Program Planning and Implementation (SIPPI) process for identifying and documenting the skills necessary for success in accelerated and enriched instruction¹;

Whereas a large number of students in MCPS are identified as gifted and talented (GT) students at the intermediate elementary level²;

Whereas information and communications about academically selective programs (ASPs) are not available to all segments of the community equally³;

Whereas increasing applicant pool from underrepresented groups to academically selective programs is necessary⁴;

Whereas a small fraction of all GT students are admitted into academically selective programs and a much larger fraction of qualified GT students are not admitted into academically selective programs due to the limited number of seats:⁵:

Whereas there is a lack of tracking information on GT students, regardless of whether in academically selective programs or not⁶;

Whereas in the Choice Study response plan, there is a targeted talent development provisioning in Title One schools including but not limited to Extended Learning Opportunities – Summer Title I Enrichment Program (ELO STEP), Enriched and Accelerated Professional Learning Community (PLC), Primary Talent Coach staffing position; Enriched Extended Day for all Title 1 schools⁷,
