Rising to New Challenges

t. Ambrose of Milan is my favorite figure in early church history. St. Ambrose wasn't a hobbit, a super hero, or spy. Nope, he was a politician. A politician who became a saint — who would have thought?

So why is St. Ambrose one of my favorites? Two reasons. First, Ambrose's legacy isn't so much in what he did, but rather in the people he developed. Ambrose's greatest gift to the church was mentoring a young man who would become arguably the most influential theologian in the history of Christianity, St. Augustine. Leaders have the responsibility to make others great, to remove barriers and empower persons to be more than they think they can be.

Ambrose was a respected governor of Milan in Italy. When the Bishop of Milan died, rival factions threatened to tear apart the church. Ambrose went to the Bishop's funeral in an attempt to keep the factions within the church in check. At the funeral things got tense and the crowd began to demand to know who the next Bishop of Milan would be. Someone shouted out "Ambrose Bishop!"

Ambrose had a problem. He wasn't a priest. In fact, he wasn't even a baptized Christian! The early church, not always known for its flexibility, took Ambrose through catechism, confirmation, and ordination all within the space of week. St. Ambrose gave away all of his land and wealth and became an advocate for the poor.

Secondly, in church work I often find myself in roles that I may feel nervous about. The story of St. Ambrose gives me hope that each of us has the capacity to rise up in circumstances that are new and unfamiliar and live out the mission of Christ. None of us are captive to circumstance. Ambrose's mentee, Augustine, gives the church some time-tested advice, "Pray as though everything depended on God. Work as though everything depended on you."

I am excited to serve as the Mission Center President and Financial Officer for the Inland West Mission Center. I have a strong sense of calling to work in this place and I have a vision of what we can co-create together. I have thoughts, musings, ideas, and convictions that I will be engaging the mission center in conversation about over the coming months. The challenges are real, but so is the mission.


A New Discernment Disposition

First of all, it is not like we do not practice discernment! We make decisions every day which require reflection. Do I buy vegetables locally and pay a little more, or save money buying ones shipped from afar? Do I walk to work and save fuel, or do I drive to have more face time at home with family? Do I vote for the local political candidate I believe in, but who does not represent the party I support at the national level? We discern on important issues daily!

The questions, then, are about whether our practice is helpful to us and others; whether we are consciously discerning or letting our neighbor or the social media, or the feelings of the moment, decide for us; whether decisions are made in the context of our identity as children of God and part of the body of Christ.

I invite you to stop (yes, *right now*, if at all possible!) and remember a difficult decision you made that was a wise one.

What process did you follow? With whom did you consult? Did you do research? Did you list pros and cons? Did you consider impact on family, community, the planet? Was prayer or meditation involved? Did you invite God into the process? How much time did it take? What helped you move from question to answer?

Now (yes, *now*, please!) recall a decision you consider a poor one. Examine how you arrived at that decision. *NOT* to beat yourself up . . . at all! Let it become a gift by asking, "What lessons are to be learned as I 'discern' about that time of discernment?"

When the decision matters, disciple of Jesus, how do you and I get to "not my will, God, but yours"? Then, how do we know that what we understand to be the Divine is truly a Voice beyond our own? That's really what discernment is. It's a way of living. It's about paying attention and listening deeply to our inner and outer worlds, ever attentive to God in, through, and around us.

Part of discernment is making sure we are asking the right question. It is likely not "God, which color of carpet do you want for the sanctuary?" It is "how do we make this decision so we'll be a more faithful part of the Body of Christ?"

Often the decision *does* matter: to ordain women, for example. Most of us agree that the question about ordaining or marrying homosexuals matters. We practice in our imperfect way to arrive at a God-permeated decision, knowing that how we discern also matters significantly! The principles are at the foundation of our faith movement: "behold, I say unto you, that you must study it out in your mind; then you must ask me if it be right, and if it is right, I will cause that your bosom shall burn within you. . ." (Doctrine and Covenants 9:3). That is not the whole answer, but a great place to begin.

Building Relationships in a New World

One year ago, like many young adults before me, I began to feel an itch—an urge to leave my mark on the world by doing something great. That's when I started thinking about the lure of World Service Corps (WSC). I decided to apply for a short-term internship.

I left in June to serve the Community of Christ congregation in Seoul, South Korea. Over the next eight weeks, I developed strong bonds with my WSC partners, Pastor Adam Wade and his family, and the members of the congregation. We worked hard together to create church services, teach English classes, organize outreach events, and maintain clubs. During my

services, teach English classes, organize outreach events, and maintain clubs. During my last week, our work culminated with a pirate-themed Vacation Bible School. We built a giant ship out of cardboard boxes in the sanctuary and taught Bible lessons such as Jonah and Jesus walking on the water.

Not long after settling in, I felt a connection to the site that I couldn't explain, and that inspired me to ask if I could return to Korea for a yearlong term. After spending the month of August at home in Montana, I returned to Korea.

In addition to assisting with services, classes, clubs and outreach, I am also developing an allages Sunday school based on the Enduring Principles, Mission Initiatives, and Basic Beliefs. It is written in simple English and will be used as a tool for the expanding Japanese congregation. I am also in charge of collecting hymns to be used for an "electronic" hymnal that will be projected each Sunday.

Last but not least, I am immersing myself in the Korean culture. As a WSC intern, one of my

biggest jobs is to learn—keep an open mind, try new things, and figure out how the world works! I am studying the Korean language, Hangul, and making slow but promising progress. I am visiting the traditional tourist sites likes the Namsan Tower and DMZ, but also am so interested in the Buddhist temples that are hidden in the mountains, functioning in their own space and time. Every day, as I learn more about the culture, I appreciate the differences and the similarities to my own.

Somewhere along the way, the itch to do something "great" disappeared into the feeling of belonging to something bigger. Something huge. A whole world, in fact. A world where there are many ways to live Christ's mission.


