Marysville blanks Tigers

MARYSVILLE — The Clay Center Tigers were their own worst enemy Friday night.

The Tigers fumbled the ball away four times, had a pass intercepted and committed a critical penalty in a 14-0 loss to Marysville at Homer Hanson Field in The Salina Journal's Area Game of the week.

The Bulldogs, 6-0, scored both their touchdowns in the first half and hung on to win their 13th North Central Kansas League football championship.

"It was a matter of us putting the ball on the ground and they didn't," said Clay Center head coach Larry Wiemers, who saw his team slip to 4-2 on the season. "They're a good, solid football team and played well tonight."

After coaching a young squad through a frustrating 3-6 1984 season, Marysville head coach Tom Michael is delighted with his team's play thus far this season.

"The kids took a beating last year. That's why it's so gratifying to win the league championship this season," Michael said. "We will enjoy this game tonight then start thinking about the three district games we have coming up."

Although Clay Center moved the football when it managed to hang onto it, the Bulldogs had the football most of the first half.

Marysville ran 38 plays to Clay Center's 17 in the first half. In addition, the Bulldogs held the ball for 17 minutes over the first 24.

After forcing the Tigers to punt to start the game, Marysville took over at its own 27-yard line and drove 73 yards in 15 plays to score. Quarterback Jay Padden's 1-yard run on fourth down gave the 'Dogs a 7-0 lead with 2:20 left in the first quarter.

play and Mike Dettke fell on it for MHS.
Marysville then put together another 12-play drive, which ended on the Clay Center 3 when Padden's fourth-down pass was batted down.

The Tigers appeared to have Marysville stopped when Padden was sacked at his own 20 on third and long, but Clay Center was whistled for a facemask penalty which gave MHS a first down.

"That fourth down pass early and that penalty really hurt us," Wiemers said. "They scored on one and kept their drive going on the other."

Clay Center's defense didn't get much rest because Wiemers fumbled the ball away again on the first play. Marysville recovered at the CHS 7 and running back Ross Wright scored from the 2 four plays later to lift the Bulldogs to a 14-0 lead with 5:16 left in the first half.

Wright rushed for 92 yards on 24 carries, while teammate Brian Hosfelt had 134 yards on 20 tries.

The Tigers drove the ball into scoring position several times in the second half, but an interception and another fumble ended any threats.

"We bent but didn't give any points and that's our philosophy," Michael said. "Offensively, we did a good job in the first half, but not the second. We played better defense in the second half."

Ronnie Wright led the Tigers on the ground with 77 yards on 16 carries. Wiemers completed 8-of-16 passes for 133 yards.

win, who will produce the telecasts from Kansas City.
McCarver said it might take a little time to adjust to working with Palmer.

"The biggest problem Jim and I will have initially will be dividing what we say," McCarver said. "What happens if a pitcher is leading too much with his elbow and I start talking about it, or a catcher blocks a ball in the dirt and Jim starts describing it?"

McCarver said he liked the idea that a former pitcher and catcher will be working together in the broadcast booth, because "it takes the viewer from the start of the pitch to the end."

McCarver, who does the telecasts of the New York Mets during the regular season and worked for ABC last year in the National League playoffs, said he thought it would be important to keep commentary concise and to the point.

"Sometimes they'll tell you to finish a thought, right when you're in the middle of it," he said. "Then what do you do — break it off and leave people hanging, or go ahead?"
