→ From the Pastor →

"Jesus walked this lonesome valley; he had to walk it by himself. O, nobody else could walk it for him; he had to walk it by himself."

This is the in between time, this time between the beginning of Lent (on March 5th) and the celebration of Easter on April 20th. It is hard to write a column that covers all of these events, not to mention Jesus' journey from Palm Sunday through Easter Sunday morning.

I'd like to focus not just on Jesus' journey, but on his companions on the journey ... or lack of them. He may have been followed by disciples, but they did not understand what it meant for him to "set his face towards Jerusalem." (Luke 9:51). They did not understand the depth of his commitment to God and to presenting

God's love to all God's people. They did not understand what it meant for him to heal the sick or eat with sinners. While they may have given lip service to his identity, saying, "Truly, you are the Son of God," (Matthew 14:33), the fullness of that identity escaped them.

In other words, Jesus walked this lonesome valley by himself. While there were those who offered some support, he was very much alone except for the presence of His Father. There is something to be said for walking through events of our lives by ourselves. Yes, it may feel incredibly lonely, but it can be very frustrating to try to explain to others why you are doing what you are doing. When we are alone, we don't have to explain ourselves to anyone. We can listen for God's voice speaking to us, without the confusion and distraction of others. And there are times, even in the church life, that lend themselves to being alone. Lent is one of those times. We can sit and read. We can pray. We can read our devotionals, our Bibles, and spend time reflecting on them in silence. There is something about this time of year that encourages solitariness.

If you feel so inclined, consider spending some intentional time alone this Lent. I've offered some suggestions as to what to do with that time or you may have other practices that bring you peace. Either way, may you find your own way to walk with Jesus through this time of the church year.



But when that life falls apart, and her beloved nana dies, Josie is








