

WW II TRIVIA FOR JULY 2021

- The White-Knuckled Commisar: Joseph Stalin was terrified of flying. The first time he was in an airplane was on his trip to meet Roosevelt and Churchill at Teheran.
- Is that our leader?: On July 2, 1941, two weeks after the Germans had begun their invasion of the Soviet Union, Stalin spoke to the Soviet people over the radio for the very first time. And for the first time, the Soviet people heard his


heaving Georgian [in the USSR] accent. Heretofore, many believed that Stalin was

a Russian.

- Does the Vatican have an army?: In 1931, French Premier Pierre Laval met with Stalin and suggested to the Soviet leader that he tone down his persecution of Russian Catholics so as not to intensify the conflict between the Soviet Union and the Vatican. Stalin's reply was, "The Pope? How many divisions has he?
- The Honeymoon is over: At the Yalta Conference in February 1945, Stalin seemed to agree to too many of the demands made by Churchill and Roosevelt. After the Conference, there was a brief honeymoon during which the two western leaders believed that Stalin would be most cooperative in the post-war years. But, within six weeks, Stalin began to renege on his commitments. It was a very short honeymoon.

MORE TRIVIA NEXT MONTH

The Yalta Conference from the perspective of daughters at the conference, this is a fabulous new book by Houghton Mifflin Harcourt (2020): *The Daughters of Yalta: The Churchills, Roosevelts and Harrimans: A Story of Love and War.* The author is Catherine Grace Katz, a writer and historian from Chicago. She holds degrees in history from Harvard and Cambridge and is currently pursuing her JD at Harvard Law School. This is "the untold story of three intelligent and glamorous young women who accompanied their famous fathers to the Yalta Conference in February 1945, and of the conference's fateful reverberations in the waning days of World War II." "This is a remarkable story of fathers and daughters whose relationships were tested and strengthened by the history they witnessed and the future they crafted together."



US Submarine Chaser 38 in WWI honors our late Round Table member, Ray Featherstone, Jr. and his father's WWI sub-chaser war service.

This is a tribute to both father and son, as well as the courageous men who served on this 110' wood boat in pursuit of German U-boats. Biographical material, unpublished photographs and



maps from the Featherstone Collection, as well as biographies for thirty-plus crew members. Book Recommendations, two classics and one new...

Enemy at the Gates (2015) By William Craig

William Craig's New York Times bestseller served as the inspiration for the **2001 film of the same name**, starring Jude Law, Rachel Weiss, and Joseph Feinnes. The culmination of five years' worth of research, Craig's sweeping historical narrative brings to life the brutal siege of Stalingrad, a grueling battle between German and Soviet forces that lasted from August 1942 to February 1943, resulted in nearly 2 million casualties, and turned the tide of war against Hitler's regime.

Stalingrad: The Fateful Siege: 1942-1943 (1999) By Anthony Beevor

The five-month siege of Stalingrad was one of World War II's bloodies battles and a turning point in the fight for Europe. Antony Beevor, a former British Army officer, brilliantly balances the huge scale of the conflict with a soldier's-eye view of some of the most horrific conditions in the history of modern warfare.

He begins with Operation Barbarossa, the 1941 German invasion of the Soviet Union that was plagued by bad weather, long supply lines, and difficult terrain, and analyzes how the Luftwaffe's carpet bombing of Stalingrad helped to create the treacherous, rubble-strewn conditions that allowed Soviet snipers to wage a gruesome war of attrition. Most captivatingly, Atkinson portrays Stalingrad as the terrifying outcome of totalitarianism: Hitler lived in a fantasy world and refused to listen to German officers who tried to save the Sixth Army from complete destruction, while Stalin's demands for total obeisance resulted in the executions of 13,500 Red Army soldiers.

Stalin's War: A New History of World War II (2021) By Sean McMeekin

A prize-winning historian reveals how Stalin—not Hitler—was the animating force of World War II in this major new history. A provocative revisionist take on the Second World War…"

World War II endures in the popular imagination as a heroic struggle between good and evil, with villainous Hitler driving its events. But Hitler was not in power when the conflict erupted in Asia—and he was certainly dead before it ended. His armies did not fight in multiple theaters, his empire did not span the Eurasian continent, and he did not inherit any of the spoils of war. That central role belonged to Joseph Stalin. The Second World War was not Hitler's war: it was Stalin's war.

Drawing on ambitious new research in Soviet, European, and US archives, *Stalin's War* revolutionizes our understanding of this global conflict by moving its epicenter to the east. Hitler's genocidal ambition may have helped unleash Armageddon, but as McMeekin shows, the war which emerged in Europe in September 1939 was the one Stalin wanted, not Hitler. So, too, did the Pacific war of 1941–1945 fulfill Stalin's goal of unleashing a devastating war of attrition between Japan and the "Anglo-Saxon" capitalist powers he viewed as his ultimate adversary.

McMeekin also reveals the extent to which Soviet Communism was rescued by the US and Britain's self-defeating strategic moves, beginning with Lend-Lease aid, as American and British supply boards agreed almost blindly to every Soviet demand. Stalin's war machine, McMeekin shows, was substantially reliant on American materiel from warplanes, tanks, trucks, jeeps, motorcycles, fuel, ammunition, and explosives, to industrial inputs and technology transfer, to the foodstuffs which fed the Red Army. This unreciprocated American generosity gave Stalin's armies the mobile striking power to conquer most of Eurasia, from Berlin to Beijing, for Communism. A groundbreaking reassessment of the Second World War, *Stalin's War* is essential reading for anyone looking to understand the current world order.
