

From the Pastor...

Spring has sprung, the grass has risen and you can rhyme the rest. New life is blossoming into the world and we are springing into new life and new reality here at St. Paul's.

Worship, for at least the month of May, will remain at 10 am both live and zoomed. We will continue to record this service and make it available. We will also continue to offer drive through Communion each week at about 11:15 am until noon on Sunday mornings.

Please know that we review this practice weekly. The numbers of people coming to drive through Communion diminish as we see the numbers for worship increase.

We are seeing mostly vaccinated people during the worship service, and because this is the case we are allowing people to hum or sing quietly behind a mask. For those that would like to avoid this activity, we are offering non-singing space in Trinity Hall. The worship service is streamed in there weekly.

Jackie Nappi continues to record the service music and it is streamed into the sanctuary and over zoom.

Zoom continues to change its streaming service and so we are working to manage quality, but we are not always aware of the changes they implement until after the fact, so bear with us.

We have ordered two new cameras and editing equipment and hope to have this installed soon.

Please bear with us as we manage technical glitches and learn this new system. We would all like worship to be back to the old way, but it is not going to be for a period of time and we ask your patience and prayers.

Last Sunday night, April 25, as the Duke Lutherans gathered for our final virtual Evening Prayer of the academic year, we felt a variety of emotions: relief and gratitude that we'd made it through such a challenging year; exhaustion and anxiety because of finals; and joy for our graduates but sorrow at having to bid them farewell.

Bearing in mind that experiencing so many (sometimes conflicting) emotions can make already-stressed students feel even more overwhelmed, these are the words I preached at the end of my sermon:

Duke Lutherans, as this year comes to an end, as you stay here in Durham for the summer or scatter to the four winds, remember that the Good Shepherd, the Lamb of God, goes with you wherever you go... Whether deep valleys steeped in dense shadows or the softest of emerald-green fields – and most likely you will travel through both at some point or another - Know this wherever you go: You are a beloved member of the Duke Lutherans flock, always. And, just as the shepherd gently gathers the lambs with outstretched arms, so too does God call you by name, carry you, go out searching for you when you are wondering or lost, restore your soul, and give you rest.

Of course, we also offer our thanks to you, our fellow members of the flock at St. Paul's, for your gracious support and prayers that sustained us through this year. We are blessed that God calls us to life together with you, with Grace, and with our alumni and supporters everywhere ... **many of whom were able to join us for our April 18 Alumni and Supporter Appreciation Evening Prayer**, an event that we hope will become an annual tradition! As we worshiped together, we also heard personal stories from a current

student, a recent alum, and a “senior” alum (Magdalena Phillips, D. J. Chatelaine, and Cindy Snyder), all of whom shared their favorite campus ministry memories and reflected on how God has blessed and grounded them in Christ’s love through their time with the Duke Lutherans.

Finally, because several of our students will still be in Durham this summer (our graduate students, in particular, don’t receive time off in the summer), please let me know if you’d like to support them in some way ... perhaps by providing a meal, a gift card, or an encouraging card.

As our preschool children continue to learn through active play, they learn a lot about special awareness throughout their years at preschool.

Hand & Finger Skills for Toddlers...

By the middle of a child’s first year, a child begins to develop their pincer grasp, picking up objects between thumb and forefinger. Some fun games at this age include:



- Building small towers of blocks, then knocking them down
- Turning knobs and pages
- Putting round pegs into holes

- Scribbling and painting
- Taking toys apart and putting them back together

Hand & Finger Skills for Preschoolers...

Spatial awareness has developed more by this age and children develop better control of utensils and tools to perform certain tasks.

Activities to try with your child include:

- Building with blocks
- Solving simple jigsaw puzzles
- Stringing large wooden beads
- Pouring water into containers of various sizes
- Dressing and undressing dolls in clothing with large zippers, snaps, and laces
