CERTIFICATE of RECOGNITION

By virtue of the authority vested by the Constitution in the Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia, there is hereby officially recognized:

NAVY CHAPLAINS WEEK

WHEREAS, the United States Navy Chaplain Corps was established on November 29, 1775, to provide spiritual care and moral guidance to Sailors and Marines, making one of the oldest continuous traditions of faith and service to our armed forces; and

WHEREAS, since the earliest days of the Continental Navy, Navy chaplains have stood beside those who serve at sea and ashore, offering comfort, counsel, and hope in times of both peace and war; and

WHEREAS, Navy chaplains represent many faith traditions to provide for the free exercise of religion for all service member, fostering resilience, respect, and unity across the fleet; and

WHEREAS, the Navy Chaplain Corps continues to serve with honor and compassion on ships, submarines, and aircraft carriers, in hospitals and combat zones, and within Marine Corps and Coast Guard units around the world; and

WHEREAS, Virginia, home to the world's largest naval base in Norfolk and a proud maritime tradition, honors the dedication of Navy Chaplains who strengthen the moral and spiritual readiness of our armed forces; and

WHEREAS, through prayer, council and example, Navy chaplains sustain the hearts of those who serve and remind us that faith and freedom are enduring pillars of our nation's strength.

NOW, THERFORE, I, Glenn Youngkin, do hereby recognize November 23-29, 2025, as **NAVY CHAPLAINS WEEK** in the COMMONWEALTH OF VIRGIIA. and I call this observation to the attention of all our citizens.

On Sunday morning, December 7, 1941, the Imperial Japanese Navy Air Service attacked the neutral United States at Naval Station Pearl Harbor, near Honolulu Hawaii, killing 2,403 Americans and injuring 1,178 others. The attack sank four U.S. Navy battleships and damaged four others. It also damaged three cruisers, three destroyers, and one minelayer. Aircraft losses were 188 destroyed and 159 damaged.

National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day is to remember and honor the 2,403 Americans who were killed in the Japanese surprise attack on Pearl Harbor in Hawaii on December 1941.

Canada declared war on Japan within hours of the attack on Pearl Harbor, the first Western nation to do so. On December 8, the United States declared war on Japan and entered World War II on the side of the Allies.

In a speech to Congress, President Franklin D. Roosevelt called the bombing of Pearl Harbor "a date which will live in infamy." (source; Wikipedia)

Lieutenant John Wiliam Finn First Medal of Honor Recipient of WW II



We're remembering the remarkable legacy Lieutenant John William Finn, the first Medal of Honor recipient of World War II for his extraordinary heroism during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941.

As a Chief Aviation Ordnanceman stationed at Naval Air Station Kaneohe Bay, Finn was awakened by the assault and immediately rushed to his squadron's armory.

Despite being in an exposed position with no cover, he mounted a .50-caliber machine gun on an improvised tripod and fired relentlessly at incoming enemy aircraft for nearly two hours, even as strafing bullets and shrapnel inflicted over 20 wounds to his body, including hits to his scalp, shoulder, arm, foot, and abdomen.

Refusing to leave his post until the attack ended, he then organized aid for the wounded before seeking medical treatment himself, embodying selfless courage that saved lives and inspired his fellow sailors.

Finn was presented the Medal of Honor by Admiral Chester Nimitz in September 1942 and later rose to the rank of lieutenant before retiring after 30 years of service.

He passed away in 2010 at age 100 as the oldest living Medal of Honor recipient and the last from Pearl Harbor.

Thanksgiving Feasts Deployed to Troops Around the World

Whether they're feasting in dining halls, aboard ships, or at remote outposts, troops around the world are set to receive their Thanksgiving meals as 152,626 pounds of turkey have already arrived at their designated overseas locations, along with beef, ham, shrimp and the fixings according to the Defense Logistics Agency.

Even with the shorter timeline, that includes service members on board a dozen ships participating in the Caribbean Sea and Eastern Pacific in their "Southern Spear" operation against drug cartels, which began a few months ago.

The planning for the worldwide holiday food deliveries begins in the spring, when the Defense Logistics Agency Troop Support team gets order forecasts from the services. DLA relays the information to their vendors around the world, and they begin ordering products for the meals.

While DLA can't provide specific numbers of items sent to specific regions, all Navy ships, including those deployed to the U.S. Southern Command area of responsibility, received their Thanksgiving provisions by the end of

October, according to a spokesman for the Defense Logistics Agency. A number of the ships in that area will soon get fresh produce and bakery items from Puerto Rico, to supplement their frozen holiday items, he said.

National Guard troops deployed to locations within the U.S. are also getting their holiday meals at those locations. "DLA is tracking that all menu items are projected to be satisfied in full prior to Thanksgiving," the spokesman said, but numbers weren't available.

In addition to the 152,626 pounds of turkey, including whole and roasted, here is what has arrived for the troops' menus specifically at overseas locations:

124,022 pounds of beef 66,054 pounds of shrimp 6,512 cans of sweet potatoes 15,282 cases of pies and cakes 792 cases of eggnog And other holiday treats

DLA is unable to track precise numbers for amounts of food provided for thanksgiving feasts for troops at stateside locations, the spokesman said.

The government shutdown did not affect the preparation for the holiday meals, he confirmed. Much of the work is done well ahead of time, and Defense Department guidance exempted any operations related to troop feeding from being affected.

CAPT Bryan K. Carmichael, Commodore of Commander, Naval Surface Group Atlantic, was the keynote speaker.

Commander is a "mustang," which means that she was an enlisted Sailor before she was commissioned. She enlisted in 1999 with the rating of a Cryptologic Technician Maintenance. In 2004 she was selected for the Seaman to Admiral-21 program and attended OCS in Newport, RI. In 2007, CDR Lynn completed her B.A. in Security and Intelligence from Ohio State University and was commissioned as an Ensign.

From there, her Navy career has been one of hard work, great achievement, and varied experience. She has had ample time aboard "Gator Freighters."

Dennis Biggs and Pat Robson, our Navy League Liaisons to **USS** *Carter Hall*, arrived with ample time to "grin 'n grip" with some key people on the ship. After about a year of only email exchanges, they had the pleasure of finally meeting CMDCM Chelsea Turner, the senior enlisted Sailor onboard. It was a delightful conversation in which they acquainted CMDCM Turner with how the Navy League supports our adopted ships. They also had the privilege of meeting CDR Phillip Wise, the XO, and to speak with LT. Wileslie Wint, the ship's Chaplain and PAO.

Finally, after the ceremony, they congratulated CDR Lynn on her promotion and stressed that the Richmond Council Navy League is standing-by to help **USS** *Carter Hall* (LSD-50) with any request.




