

Rabbi A's Reflections

Rabbi Howard L. Apothaker, Ph. D., Senior Rabbi

I WANT PATIENCE AND I WANT IT NOW!

Recently a congregant asked that I read an article by an Israeli, Palestinian entitled, "Palestinians: Save Us from the Good Hearted- Westerners!" B. Tawil tells us why such overt recognition of Israel as a Jewish State by Arabs is so very important to whether or not they will let Israel live in peace if ever there is a true peace arrangement made between Israel and the Islamic world. Let me jump the gun and tell you, that is NOT going to happen - at least not for a very long time. I counselled patience.

My interlocutor claims: Those who do not accept Israel as a Jewish state are unlikely to accept Jews as human beings. Accordingly, accepting Israel as other than a Jewish state means that the horror continues...How many centuries do we have to wait for acceptance? I responded that Israel made peace both with Egypt and with Jordan (the latter whose majority population is composed of folks who identify as Palestinians) without such a pre-condition. As far as I know, both governments (in fits and starts for Egypt, depending on the leadership) have acquiesced (without fully accepting) Israel as a sovereign Jewish nation. Put differently: Israel's inner politics and cultural character - Jewish, not-Jewish, mixed, secular, Muslim- and Christian-tolerant, Muslim-deferential, whatever - is, for now, being treated by Egypt and Jordan as "some of, but not entirely, my business."

Exactly one day after I gave a sermon on this topic - the Deputy Foreign Minister of Israel, and Likudnik, Tzipi Hatovely wrote: "Israel is not isolated," that Israel enjoys flourishing commerce and active diplomatic relations w/ 80% of the world's nations. "There is a lot of warmth coming in Israel's direction from countries that, for years, were aligned with the Arab world...In the Far East Israel is seen as a superpower...In Europe there has also been a shift...The main topic of conversation [w/ the French] is how to fight terrorism and how to use Israel's cyber know-how to fight radical Islamism...We have now entered a new era in int'l discourse. It is all about global solutions in medicine, agriculture, cyber warfare and technological innovation."

That same week we read this in the Wall Street Journal: "Clearly there's been a convergence of interests between Israel and many Sunni Arab states given the fact that they both face identical challenges in the region," per Dore Gold, Director General of Israel's Foreign Ministry. And this is the Jerusalem Post:

We read in the Times of Israel that Israel and Indonesia - the biggest Muslim country in the world - have growing business and tech ties with trade reaching "hundreds of millions of dollars a year," per Israel's Economy Ministry. And did you note: Israel will inaugurate an official diplomatic mission in Abu Dhabi, capital of the UAE, in the coming weeks. The Director General of Israel's FM visited Abu Dhabi to finalize the opening of the mission.

We note that Egypt's rep. at UN voted this month in support of Israel's bid for membership of the UN Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space Affairs. Egypt had never voted for Israel at the UN. Oman also voted yes.

And then these stories in the last month: A senior IDF officer told a Saudi news outlet Elaph: Israel had secret relations and common interests w/ a number of Arab states besides Egypt and Jordan. The officer explained: "[With] moderate countries such as Egypt, Jordan and the Persian Gulf states, Israel has a common language. Israel's UN Ambassador Danon: "Quietly you see that there is a lot of appreciation ... for Israel."

As for Jordan: Pilots from the Royal Jordanian AF recently conducted a "working visit" to Israel. Israel has a strategic interest in, and long-standing commitment to, the safety, security, stability and prosperity of Jordan. Broad-based cooperative ventures in the strategic, security, diplomatic, economic and energy fields buttress the bond. Israel FM DG Gold attended the Org. for Security and Cooperation in Europe conference in Jordan attended by reps from Algeria, Egypt, Jordan, Morocco and Tunisia. The Israeli delegate was seated between the reps of Egypt and Jordan. There are now 150 Jordanian workers working at hotels in Eilat; by the end of the month there will be 500. The target is 1,500 Jordanian workers in Eilat. They stay in Israel for 8 hours and return home at the end of each day.

We noted also from the Times of Israel that a month after Gambia declared itself an "Islamic Republic," it warmly hosted Israel's Ambassador Paul Hirschson.

And in the Jerusalem Post, did you see the head of Cyprus' ruling party said, his country now has a "clearer picture" of Israel - having had the "wrong perception of Israel" for years. "It's a country ... fighting ... for survival and having to face hundreds of millions of Muslims and Arabs, part of whom don't even recognize the right of the existence of a Jewish state.... For decades Israel was blamed for creating the instability in the region. Can anyone credibly blame Israel for the instability in Syria, the ISIS threat, the Arab Spring-now-Winter, or the chaos in Libya and Iraq?" Even Greece: That despite his roots in the country's anti-Zionist left, last month Greek PM Tsipras paid a visit to Israel.



The Buzz from Rabbi B

Rabbi Benjy A. Bar-Lev, Associate Rabbi



If I am not for myself, who will be for me? If I am only for myself what am I? And if not now, when?

~Rabbi Hillel, Pirke Avot 1:14

Years ago, at the dinner following my ordination ceremony, Cantor Karen Berman, from the synagogue where I grew up in Milwaukee, asked if she could address the group. She, along with my childhood rabbi, Rabbi Ron Shapiro, and the rabbi with whom I worked in college, Rabbi Dena Feingold, had come from Wisconsin to Cincinnati for my ordination. I was so honored by their presence. Cantor Berman addressed the group and told them that my ordination as a rabbi earlier that evening gave hope to dozens of delinquent bar and bat mitzvah students in Wisconsin and really, nationally. She recounted the story of how a month before my bar mitzvah I was woefully underprepared. I had the skills to learn my Torah portion, but wasn't putting in the time at home between sessions, listening to my Torah portion on my Walkman[©]. (It is oh-so ironic that I often have this EXACT conversation with parents these days.) Cantor Berman then told all the assembled guests about how I got my act together in the weeks before my service, and everything went beautifully. She now tells concerned parents, "don't worry, your child may too become a rabbi one day." We got a great laugh at the story that night and Cantor Berman expressed her pride at how far I had

We've all heard the George Bernard Shaw quote, "youth is wasted on the young." In some ways, I feel that way about my bar mitzvah. I wish I was mature enough at the time to appreciate the importance of that moment, to study the meanings of the prayers and the Torah in a deep and meaningful way.

There are a number of adults in our congregation, who as of yet, have not celebrated a bar or bat mitzvah ceremony of their own. I am pleased to announce that we will again this year be starting an Adult B'nei Mitzvah Class to fill that need. What is an Adult B'nei Mitzvah?

This is a group bar/bat mitzvah ceremony during which each class member will have the opportunity to read (or chant) from the Torah, deliver a meaningful d'var Torah

(a speech), and will also lead the congregation in prayer. This will happen through weekly classes starting in March, culminating at the holiday of Simchat Torah at the end of October. We will learn about the spiritual meaning behind the Shabbat prayers, theology, Torah portion, Jewish culture and heritage, Jewish practice, and ritual. Our learning will be both for the ceremony specifically, but will also be Torah Lishmah - Torah for its own sake.

The last time we had an Adult B'nei Mitzvah ceremony at Temple Beth Shalom was in 2009, and it was an incredibly powerful and meaningful morning. The participants each had his or her own reason for learning and for leading us that day. With tears in all our eyes, Ric Gilley, Cherla Meisterman, and Debbie Leasure led us through a beautiful Shabbat morning service. It wasn't just the service itself that was so moving, rather it was also the relationships they had created, the connections they had made with one another and very clearly with their Judaism. It was their dedication to Jewish life that made it such a special experience.

Perhaps you have been looking for a way to connect with your Judaism on a more spiritual level? Maybe you have already had your bar/bat mitzvah, but you are looking to rekindle your love of Judaism? Maybe you feel a soulful yearning for something you just can't put a finger on? Maybe you have been wanting to learn about Judaism in a deeper way, to explore our people's texts and find yourself within them. This is an opportunity for everybody.

Starting March 8, 2016, I will be teaching this B'nei Mitzvah class on Tuesday evenings at 7:00-7:50 pm in the Temple Library. The class will be very friendly and low-pressure. Some basic Hebrew knowledge is helpful and we can set you up to achieve that separate from the class.

Rabbi Hillel Said "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? If I am only for myself what am I? And if not now, when?" If not now, when? Let us explore Judaism in depth together.

> Vatican: Catholics Shouldn't Seek to Convert Jews

Also BTW, does Israeli common law and practice - especially given the law of return - leave any doubt that, in its conduct, Israel is something other than a nation that supports in most every way Jewish life? Israel operates as a nation on a Jewish calendar, and partially observes Jewish law in its civic behavior, but is fully a haven, especially for potential immigrants, for those whom the orthodox rabbinate in Israel consider to be Jews. What do I care what others think?

What the Palestinians say; what the Egyptians say; what the Jordanians say; indeed what the US government or Congress or Pope or anyone else says about what Israel is or is not, is existentially irrelevant to the Israeli on the street.

Sometimes that has to be good enough. Making them say that Israel is a Jewish State as a condition for diplomatic relations, respects for treaties, or even for recognition of boarders, certainly would not help the process.

I think of the analogy of a man whose wife of many years dies. He now has adult children, in the twenties or thirties. Happily he meets another women and they decide to get married. But a condition they make on the each other's children if they are to be part of their lives together is: He children have to call him "dad," and his children must call her, "mom."

It ain't gonna happen. She and he argue that they fear that the one and the other will never really be considered part of the family - that they cannot show their full acceptance - without using the title. All further discussion is halted until this issue is settled.

My interlocutor argues back: If Palestinians accept Israel as a Jewish state, then their desire to "drive the Jews into the sea" no longer has meaning as the reason for continued incitement of their population to murder Jews. That is why recognition of Israel as a Jewish state has significant meaning insofar as terrorism against Israel is concerned.

To the last point, there is in fact no "state" in Palestine to make that acceptance and recognition stick ... so it's empty even if they - the PA government in the W. Bank which is not in the tenth year of a four year term; Hamas; Islamic Jihad, the Hizballah.

More importantly on the issue itself: Until the peace treaties were signed with Egypt (1979) and Jordan (1994), the situation with the Egyptians and Jordanians were - if anything - worse diplomatically and militarily - with Israel than they are today with the Palestinians living in Israel and the W. Bank, and even Gaza. These countries were officially at war with Israel, had tanks and air power, etc. real armies that had shown, especially in the case of Egypt, that they could kill scores in a day. Before the peace treaties were signed, both Egypt and Jordan wished to drive the State of Israel into the sea. And each had relatively much more firepower than do the Palestinians in the West Bank and Gaza, even with the missiles from Gaza now aimed at Israel.

BTW, an Israel-Palestinian peace treaty, if signed tomorrow and even with a Palestinian recognition of Israel as a Jewish state will not eliminate the threat from the sovereign state of Lebanon, and its Iranian-controlled Hizbollah therein. So to them recognition means "zero.". And, up to the time those treaties were signed, both had engaged strategically in activity that might be described as seeking the end of the Jewish state. (Remember that Jordan sided with a Scud-firing Iraq during the Gulf War. They let the missiles fly over their territory.)

Despite all of that, Israel DID NOT REQUIRE, even as these relatively much stronger adversaries with regular armies that had given their hearts and souls to eliminate Israel moved from an official state of war to peace ... Israel did not require that either recognize Israel as a "Jewish State." That is an indisputable fact and at a time when each, at least officially the day before the peace treaty, was "at war" with Israel with the purpose of eliminating it.

The primary reason for such a move as "recognition" of the State of Israel as a "Jewish State," is not psychological, as you have reified it, but strategic: to take the issue of the Palestinian "right of return" off the table. I am NOT against that diplomatic strategy. It is just that I think it should be part of the negotiations with a provision that allows the Palestinian negotiating team the ability to SAVE FACE - even as it de facto concedes the point and, as I have repeated said, acquiesces without having to "accept." (Back into a corner.)

I think that we have to move from the practical - which may be achievable first, - and the "practicable" towards a de facto principle and, perhaps down the line, to acceptance of the long-ago-decided de jure recognition of a Jewish state by the UN. In the partition agreement of 1947, Patience Pay off.

So as regards BDS: We read this month: Spain paid Ariel U. in the W. Bank \$107K in compensation for damages caused by its exclusion from an int'l competition among solar-energy innovators. And consider this selection of headlines for the last thirty days.

Detroit News and Jerusalem Post: Israel's GDP in 2015 grew by 2.3%, outdistancing Europe and the US. Among the 37 advanced economies, only three did not experience a contraction in the aftermath of the global financial crisis: S. Korea, Australia and Israel. The IMF projects 3.3% growth for Israel in 2016, among the highest growth rates for developed nations. Israel's economy has doubled in size since 1996; the US economy has increased 50% and the EU, 24%. 2015 has already broken records for Israeli mergers & acquisitions, +52% over the same time period last year, reaching \$21 billion so far. Since 2010 there have been \$10b.+ worth of such transactions w/ China.

The Kosher Bookworm By Steve Seeskin, TBS Library Committee Member

Did you know the Lincoln Penny was Designed by a Jewish Artist?

This month, Abraham Lincoln's 207th Birthday falls on Friday, February 12th. Join us as we host an Erev Shabbat presentation about Lincoln's fascinating association with American Jewry.

The presentation will be made by Dr. Gary Phillip Zola, rabbi and author of the 2014 scholarly and highly readable

book We Called Him Rabbi Abraham:
Lincoln and American Jewry, A
Documentary History. Dr. Zola is the
Executive Director of The Center of
American Jewish Archives and a
professor of the American Jewish
Experience at Hebrew Union College
–Jewish Institute of Religion,
Cincinnati. The Temple Beth Shalom
Library Committee is excited and
proud to be able to fund this
community wide event as a result of
your generous donations to the Library
Fund.

Dr. Zola's literary style is to provide an introductory background discussion of a particular aspect of Lincoln's relationship with Jews. This introductory material is then followed by documented photography exhibits, the text of letters and other artifacts of historic, often rare value.

Dr. Zola takes a comprehensive and deeply researched look at Lincoln's frequent encounters with Jews. He traces Lincoln's relationships with Jewish merchants, fellow attorneys at law and politically active Jews in Illinois prior to his nomination and subsequent election to the presidency. Rabbi Zola goes on to describe and provide documentary evidence of Lincoln's relations with Jews by his addressing national Jewish issues and sometimes private concerns of individual Jews during the country's most difficult years of his historic Civil War presidency. Lastly, Dr. Zola describes how Jews have honored Lincoln after his assassination, including the many documented eulogies made at Shabbat Services across the nation.

Learn How Lincoln:

◆ Dealt with Jewish leaders wanting Jewish military chaplains to provide for the needs of the many Jewish Union soldiers when public law required appointment of military chaplains to only those clergy of a Christian


religious denomination.

- ◆ Dealt with Jewish outcry of class-based antisemitism when General Ulysses S. Grant issued his infamous Generals Order No. 11 expelling all Jews from his Military Department (jurisdictional area of military control covering several southern states) and decreeing the Jews had but only 24 hours to leave or otherwise face arrest.
- ◆ Dealt with Jewish protests over a serious legislative movement to amend the U.S. Constitution to officially make the United States a Christian nation.
- ★Told Rabbi Isaac Mayer Wise that he believed himself to be a descendent of Jewish ancestors.





What Number, Please?

Central Ohio to get new 380 Area Code in January

Effective Jan. 30, 2016, local calls that are currently dialed with 7 digits will need to be dialed using 10 or 11 digits to be completed. Since the current 614 area code is running out of numbers, a new 380 area code will be assigned only for new telephone numbers within the area code region. After January, calls to current numbers will need to be completed by dialing 614 + 7-digit telephone number or 1+ 614+ 7-digit number. The same dialing procedure will apply to telephone numbers assigned to the new 380 area code.
