

Notable features include the reduced scale of the building particularly the small dimensions of the doors and windows. It retains several of its original 6/6 windows, others are 1/1. There is a rear-facing shed dormer and the open front porch is detailed with a scalloped frieze. There is also a narrow eave and gable wall frieze board. | | 26. | 43. History and Significance This is one of the larger houses built by the Norman Kelley and Co. for its quarry workers along this land c.1873. The history of one of its later occupants, Joseph Maiani, is typical of that of many other quarry workers. quarries. He raised a family here, sending his children to St. Michael's Catholic School. The family raised a small brood of chickens for their eggs and meat, and raised much of their own produce in a small plot near the cottage. Other families used a community plot near what is now the post office. They patronized "Tommy's" store (ERI-) for olive oil, penny candies and sundries, and the Steam Boat Dock for staples such as flour, sugar, feed and fuel. Except for staples and occasionally meats, they were practically self sufficient and looked to their own ethnic enclave for entertainment and social contact.
