"Jesus told his disciples a parable, "Can a blind person guide a blind person? Will not both fall into a pit? No disciple is superior to the teacher; but when fully trained, every disciple will be like his teacher. Why do you notice the splinter in your brother's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own? How can you say to your brother, 'Brother, let me remove that splinter in your eye,' when you do not even notice the wooden beam in your own eye? You hypocrite! Remove the wooden beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter in your brother's eye. "A good tree does not bear rotten fruit, nor does a rotten tree bear good fruit. Pastor's Study Desk Notes

8th Sunday Ordinary Time

Year C Luke 6:39-45

*"God gave you two ears and only one mouth for a reason!"* Yes, I was told that by my mother many times as I was growing up. St James tells us in his letter (1:19), "Everyone should be quick to hear, slow to speak." *That is Wisdom!* Another way of expressing it snappily, is the quip, "Keep your mouth closed and appear wise, or open it and prove otherwise." I get it, that when we speak without understanding, (not having the whole story) we only prove ourselves to <u>not</u> know what we are talking about. This wisdom is behind Jesus' mention of first removing the 'beam' from our own eye before meddling to point out, and try removing the 'speck' from our neighbor's eye. Listening and assessing carefully what it is we are hearing, is crucial to offering a wise and worthwhile response. If I haven't heard it rightly, then I am not going to address it rightly. If I am not seeing clearly, then I can't claim to 'see' my neighbor clearly.

I don't know if you have ever had an eye injury? A couple of years ago, I had a carpentry accident and a rusty spike shot out of wood and struck me in the eye. I was amazed when the emergency physician removed just flakes of rust from my eye. It had felt like a stabbing shaft (an 'eye-beam'!) was injected into my eye. That reflected (well, I couldn't see it-but I FELT it) just how sensitive the eye is! All the more reason, to make sure that the eye is sound and clear, before pronouncing judgement on *what I think I'm seeing*! Jesus is saying that as we attack our neighbor and impose ourselves upon them as their 'morality police' to remove their imperfections, we should first 're-view' our own conduct to ensure that we are truly coming from a 'right place'. Similarly, to see something accurately, don't we need the 'best light'? To catch every detail, our light must be good (*Ever tried plugging in an extension cord in an outlet behind a cabinet? Don't try to just feel your way through it with fingers finding the outlet hole & guiding prongs in to it, or you may really feel it too!)* During another teaching episode, Jesus cautioned His followers along these same lines, saying, "*The lamp of the body is the eye. If your eye is sound, your whole body will be filled with light; but if your eye is bad, your whole body will be in darkness. And if the light in you is darkness, how great will the darkness be"* (Matthew 6:22-23) So, we need to listen and look carefully, before jumping in and claiming to see it all (know it all). I need to check myself, listen and watch myself, before presuming to correct my neighbor.

Jesus offers another great measure of wisdom in today's gospel, when He says, "Every tree is known by its own fruit" (Luke 6:44). I am no arborist to determine what tree is what, but they tell me that a tree can be known not only by its fruit, but also by its leaves and its bark. Jesus does know 'wood' (good carpenters know the trees to pick, which wood for which job!), not only as a carpenter, but that He is best known 'framed' on wood in His crucifixion for our salvation. But more than simply offering practical advice about naming trees/woods right, Jesus is offering a guiding proverb to help us determine what is good and what is not. Sometimes things appear good, but turn out bad, and sometimes things may not look good initially, but turn out wondrously. His principle of discernment for us (*the test of something being good or evil*) is to 'give it time' and 'watch its growth'. Be patient-Time will tell. Maybe it was Abraham Lincoln who said, "You can fool all the people some of the time, and some of the people all the time, but you cannot fool all the people all the time." This is what Jesus is revealing about fruit, or the later product/result of a thing manifests itself more and more clearly over time. It's truth is demonstrated. Jesus expresses this same principle a chapter later in this same gospel of Luke, when He teaches "wisdom is vindicated by all her children" (Luke 7:35). So, watch for Wisdom-Truth's fruit, giving it time to manifest by carefully observing, listening & waiting. Peace, Fr Brian


