As a Civil Affairs team, we have a unique mission set here which causes us to be out on the water a lot, away from port and while on those missions, we are susceptible to running short on supplies often. - ★ I am a Platoon Sergeant for an Engineer platoon station at a small base without a lot of amenities. We are staying in an open bay building in cramped conditions. Most of my soldiers are younger and range in ages of 18 to 25 with a few older than that. We have 220 electricity and also have 110 converters. We do have a refrigerator in our bay. There is a very small PX on base that doesn't have a whole lot. Things that I know could come in use for my soldiers are laundry detergents, socks (black or white work socks), most hygiene items. Bottled water is all we drink so flavored drink packages are good things to always have. And what young soldiers don't like snacks and candy and jerky! I know my guys would appreciate anything sent. - ★ Hello, I am the Religious Affairs NCO (formerly know as the Chaplains Assistant) for the 194th Engineer Brigade from the Tennessee Army National Guard. I represent approximately 175 soldiers in our direct unit but we support approx. 2000 soldiers under our command. Our soldiers do not have the ability to cook their own food. Some do have microwaves. The electricity here is 220. We have a PX here but the converters can get rather costly and rare due to everyone needing multiples of them. Soldiers buy a lot of socks. Solid color black ankle socks is preferred by soldiers. Soldiers love coming into the chaplains office and digging in the "goodie" box for snacks. Girl Scout cookies and of course chocolate are among the soldiers favorites, but many enjoy healthy snacks as well such as almonds, protein snacks, etc. J Dobbs




### **Avery's Hot Chocolate Stand**
