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

A warm Saturday morning in May found Troop 78 at the cabin preparing to depart for our annual canoe trip. After a short bus ride we arrived at our destination, the 535-acre lake in Marsh Creek State Park. After unloading the troop canoes from their trailers, the scouts and adults listened attentively to some brief safety training and paddling tips. Soon after, we donned life vests and hit the water.



The morning was sunny with a slight breeze, perfect for canoeing. For the first hour, each scout took time to practice the different strokes as well as switching places while on the water. We then split into two groups, each paddling to one end of the lake. The first group went to the northern end of the lake and back, about a mile and a half. The second group went out to the eastern end, stopping for a snack break once we arrived. We then paddled back to the boat ramp for a total of 2.5 miles. Upon our return, we were happy to discover that we had arrived just in time for the first batch of grilled hamburgers and hotdogs. We all made sure to thank the adults for the delicious lunch.

Once everyone had finished eating, the scouts gathered on the dock for a demonstration on the proper way to right an overturned canoe. Each scout then got a chance to capsize their own canoe and practice righting it. They also learned an equally important skill - how to get back in! After another hour or so of canoeing, we returned to the ramp and loaded the canoes onto the trailers.

Unfortunately, the bus had a flat tire, so each scout called their parents or carpooled, and everyone had a ride home. This trip was a great opportunity to get to know the basics of canoeing. Each scout learned how to be safe when boating and practiced water rescue methods that are useful in all kinds of aquatic activities. It was also a chance for scouts to discover a love of canoeing (if they did, they should check out the troop's annual trip to Algonquin!). Most importantly, we all had a lot of fun, and look forward to next year's trip!

Flower Sale!


Spring Flower Sale 2025 By Jim Fox

On the 26th of May, four scouts of Troop 78 drove to the Charlestown cemetery to take part in the Memorial Day commemorative service where they raised the stars and stripes of the American Flag. When the youth first arrived, they put on the campaign hats given to them by the senior patrol leader and walked to the flagpole. Then the scouts started practicing for the ceremony before the spectators arrived. They raised and lowered the flag multiple times and assigned parts in preparation for the flag raising. After practicing, the youth stood in line while listening to the introduction.

After the introduction speech was said, the youth 'briskly' raised the flag while others watched. After the flag was raised the scouts listened to the national anthem played on guitar. The people at the service then stated the Pledge of Allegiance before a speech about the history of the cemetery. The people learned many interesting facts about the cemetery and Charlestown township before the conclusion



occurred. The scouts then slowly lowered the flag and folded it up into a triangle before the viewers were dismissed to reflect on the ceremony or wander around the cemetery taking a self-guided tour.

After most of the people left the scouts returned their campaign hats and walked around the cemetery talking and reflecting on the service that just took place. When the scouts finally left, they had more knowledge about the township and its history. They also had completed a 'good turn' for the day and were ready to reflect on this reverent and kind act.

At 10 AM on a beautiful Memorial Day, 4 scouts from Troop 78 participated in the Memorial Day ceremony at the Old Charlestown Presbyterian Cemetery located at 2475 Charlestown Road in Phoenixville. Memorial Day, observed on the last Monday in May, is a national day of remembrance to honor and mourn those who have died in service to the United States, both during wartime and in peacetime. It's a time to reflect on their sacrifices and acknowledge the debt of gratitude owed to those who have made the ultimate sacrifice for their country. Scouts Sebastian B, Ethan S, Justin S, and Jay T served as color guard and performed the flag services throughout the ceremony.

The cemetery is associated with the Charlestown Presbyterian Church, which was founded in 1743. The Old Charleston Cemetery was located halfway between the Valley Forge winter encampment and the Yellow Springs Hospital. Within the walls of cemetery lie buried several scores of Revolutionary War soldiers. Injured and diseased Revolutionary War soldiers were taken from the encampment to the hospital for care. Those that did not survive were often hastily buried in large unmarked graves at the cemetery to avoid the spread of disease.

Also buried here was Dr. Samuel Kennedy, a Surgeon to the 4th Battalion PA Troops who, being infected with an attack of camp fever, died on the 18th of June 1778. It is thought his death occurred while he was serving as a Continental Army physician at Valley Forge. Several soldiers of the War of 1812 are also buried in this cemetery.

This is the second year that Willistown Troop 78 has honored our fallen veterans at the Memorial Day ceremony at the Old Charlestown Presbyterian Cemetery.
