

The November 4 Contest theme is "Wood Construction". Using wood to construct models has many advantages. Wood is cheap, easy to cut and shape, and takes paint or



stain readily. Best of all, wood is often the material used in the prototype. When modeling, nothing looks more like wood than wood! Models in this contest should be made substantially of wood. Some parts such as wheels, windows, roofs, trucks, doors, etc., may be made of other materials.

In the Photo Contest, prototype photos should show wood construction of rolling stock or structures. Model

photos can be photos of wooden models or any model of wooden rolling stock or structures.

AP Corner

It seems like the Capitol 400 was just last week but I am finally realizing I can get back to working on the railroad. My big goal for this year is to finish the scenery I need to have judged for the Scenery Achievement Award. This isn't as daunting as it may sound. Here are the requirements in brief:

Construct a completed section of a model railroad of at least sixty square feet in O scale, or forty-five square feet in S scale, or thirty-two square feet in HO scale, or eighteen square feet in N scale containing terrain, structures, background, lighting, and realism/conformity as combined to achieve a realistic effect in that particular model railroad scene. That's only 4'x8' in HO or 3'x6' in N. And you can use two separate areas for the judging as long as the total equals the required minimum. Next, prepare a set of photographs and a written description clearly describing the intended setting of the model railroad and the scenic details including towns or cities in the area being judged. Lastly, prepare a description of the materials and methods of construction used in creating various features of terrain, background and lighting. Pictures need not be publication quality, just illustrate some of the features and perhaps techniques used in your description. No scale drawings are required.

You need to include features such as embankments, water, streets, roads, structures which include bridges, trestles and buildings, good backdrop treatment, and lighting including room, structure and other lighting effects. No structures will be judged for construction, just appropriateness in the scene. The overall scene judged must be a believable, miniature representation of a prototypical railroad scene

You do need to have structures "planted" rather than sitting atop the ground. You don't need a lot of structures but the more you add, the more points you can garner. Track should be ballasted and having different elevations

adds to the scoring, such as the land falling away from the ROW or rising above it or going thru a cut. The more techniques you use and the variety of materials used to achieve your realism, the higher the scoring potential. When your photos and description are complete, you can contact me and we can arrange a time to visit your layout and judge your scenery. If you have modules that meet the size requirements, those can be judged just like a permanent layout. In fact, an easy way to have them judged would be at the Train Show in February if the modules are part of a modular group display.

I'm finding little things to add to my area to be judged, like finally using that campfire LED I bought many years ago and almost couldn't find. I have some bigger projects to complete also but there is a fast-moving train visible at the end of the tunnel (which BTW is in the judging area). If you're interested in how the judging goes, ask me or Bob Wundrock or Fred Robinson or our latest Scenery award winner, Bill Clancy.

So what do you say? Can we make the "scene" together?

The SCWD Youth Group members continued their efforts on the "New Uses for an Old Caboose" project at our October Meeting. Last month our members prepared the base for the dioramas, by cutting foam insulation rectangles and covering them plaster sheets. These will be used either on their own layout or as part of the dioramas. We are thankful that model railroaders think of our Group as a place to "recycle" model railroading scenery and equipment.

Bob McGeever and Steve Preston were also present to help lead our members. We appreciate the efforts of

SCWD members in support of Youth model railroading.

We ended the afternoon by operating trains on both our HO layout and the N Scale T-Trak layout. We used model trains that belong to the Youth Group and trains and locomotives brought to the meeting by our members. The Operating Session is usually a high point at our meetings. In fact, we have trouble getting our members away from the trains so we can conduct our business meeting.



Our next meeting will be Sunday, November 18 at 1PM at the Zor Shrine Building, 575 Zor Shrine Place. The November meeting will be our last meeting at that location in 2018, because in December we will make our annual trek to view the G scale train holiday exhibit at Olbrich Gardens. We look forward to getting together again in November.

Project Rules:


- 1. Caboose must be modeled and added to a diorama.
- 2. Caboose may be altered as preferred, i.e. caboose is an ice-cream shop
- 3. Caboose must be mounted on a base and structure(s) and/or scenery detail must be added.
- 4. Overall diorama base dimensions cannot exceed 200 square inches for N scale and 400 square inches for HO scale.

Project awards

Awards are \$300 total in Gift Certificates to the Madison Hobby Stop.

Awards are in two categories: Adult and Youth. Each category will have three places; first place \$75, second place \$50 & third place \$25


In the case of ties in a category, the award will be spilt equally.





SCWD Spring 2019 Railfan Trip

The SCWD Board approved sponsorship of a limited one day railfan trip for the spring of 2019. Contact has been made with the East Troy Railroad Museum and a tour arranged on their 14 mile round trip interurban trolley line for Saturday, May 4, 2019. In addition, Evan Richards, tour coordinator for the



museum, will be presenting a clinic on the history and equipment of the line at the February 3rd SCWD regular meeting. Contact has also been made with several model railroaders in the Whitewater and Ft. Atkinson areas who are willing to open their home layouts on May 4th for tours. A 31 passenger bus will provide the transportation from the Madison Zor Shrine parking lot to the East Troy Railroad Museum for the guided morning tour on the rail line and of their maintenance shops. The bus will then go to the home layout tours before returning to Zor Shrine in the early evening. We will try to limit the layout tours to half the bus at time through multiple visits to not over-crowd each stop.

This trip will be limited to a SCWD member and one guest per sign up. Cost per person will be \$25 plus driver gratuity for the bus and \$10 per person for admission to the museum. Details for a lunch stop have yet to be worked out (box lunch, picnic lunch, lunch at a local restaurant, etc) but the meal cost will be your responsibility, too.

Sign up for this trip will start at the February 3rd SCWD meeting and will be on a first come, first serve basis. A waiting list will also be maintained in case of dropouts. More details will be published as they become available.

The Board of Directors meeting for the 2017-2018 South Central Wisconsin Division, Midwest Region, National Model Railroad Association was called to order at 7:00 p.m. on September 10, 2018 by Superintendent Phil Hottmann. In attendance were Board members Dave Lendved, Bob McGeever, Steve Preston, Phil Hottmann, Ken Hojnacki, Jerry Lawler, Bill Clancy, and Phil Berry.

Absent:

<u>Minutes Approval</u>: Motion to approve the Minutes for the June 2018 meeting was made by Bob McGeever and seconded by Bill Clancy. Minutes were approved.

Paymaster Report: Report included banquet expenses. Motion to approve the Paymaster report for August. Motion made by Bob, and seconded by Bill and approved. BOD reported that the SCWD would be meeting at the Zor Shrine facility through 2019.

Committee Reports:

Achievement Program: Nothing to report

Bad Order: Articles due by the 14th for publication

Club Liaison (Reports on activities with other clubs.) Nothing to Report – Position remains unfilled.

Clinics: Clinics are set for season. October meeting clinics are set. One clinic will be on kitbashing by a guest and Steve Lanphear will be doing a clinic on rail work done at the Rochelle Double Diamond tracks and crossing.

Contests: The board agreed to continue with the video contest that was begun this year. Rules will be published in the Bad Order.

Themes for this year were published at the first meeting in the fall and will be listed in the Bad Order.

Modeling Project for 2017-2018: Theme for next year was announced at the first meeting in the fall. It will be 'Repurposing Cabooses'. Phil Hottmann has agreed to remain as modeling project chair for 2018-2019. A num-

ber of members have already signed up.

Door prizes (Meetings): Bill Weber is responsible for the meeting door prizes and has budget of \$1,000. He reports that all is well with meeting and banquet door prizes.

Layout tours: October layout tours will be in Waunakee and the north side of Madison. Paul Nelson and Ken Hojnacki will be hosting

Membership: Steve Preston's efforts at the Rail Show were very successful. There will be some minor adjustments for 2019 based on lessons learned from this year's first effort. A laptop will be provided to Steve to add new members.

Steve proposed providing several magazines to new members. These include the Atlas Wiring, and 7 Steps to HO Railroads. The Board agreed to purchase 10 of each for new members to help them get started with layouts.

Picnic: BOD agreed to return to Little Americka in 2019 as it has activities/rides for kids as well as a nice facility for the adults. We will again try to schedule the picnic at the same time as the park's Whiskey River Days festival. Date: TBD. John Haverberg is handling this event.

Publicity: Nothing new to report.

Rail School: The Division has acquired additional Blue Box models for distribution at the 2019 Rail School. We may need to get more based on a count of total existing and anticipated attendance.

The date for the Rail School will be January 6, 2019.

Bill Clancy agreed to coordinate the 2019 Rail School. He recruited Mike Vivion, Ken Hojnacki, and Phil Hottmann to supervise the Rail School activity. They will develop a theme for the school and set up teams of members to work on various aspects of the school with a slightly different approach. The group will keep the Board apprised as the plan takes shape. They will make an announcement at the October meeting and call for support with setup and other tasks as needed.

Old Business:

Proposed changes to the Bylaws Election of BOD officers. Item was discussed at length at the August meeting. After much discussion it was determined that the SCWD BOD was operating within the by-laws and that no changes needed to be made.

New Business:

Rail Show new trains – Discussion to replace the wooden Brio trains used by the children's play area at the Rail Show. Research will be done to determine costs and availability.


Adjournment: Dave Lendved moved for adjournment and Bill C. seconded and the Board approved adjournment at 8:15 pm.

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
