The Awakened Brain

As the calendar turns over to 2026, commercials for last-minute Christmas gifts will be replaced by commercials for Planet Fitness and weight-loss programs and other such companies and products which are dedicated to helping you and me fulfill our New Year's resolutions. In short, those commercials are appealing to our need to take care of our bodies.

Taking care of our bodies encompasses everything from memberships in fitness clubs to cosmetics. But it also includes medical, dental, and vision care. Indeed, the money we spend on health insurance is really money that we invest in the care and health of our bodies.

We also invest a lot of time, energy, and money to take care of our mental selves. We participate in recreational activities and take vacations to enhance our mental well-being. Many further take care of their mental health through prescription medications and therapy sessions.

John Wesley taught that caring for one's body is a moral and spiritual duty, saying that such is essential for glorifying God and doing good in the world. Wesley emphasized holistic wellness through plain living, daily exercise, maintaining a simple diet and good hygiene. In his book, *Primitive Physic*, Wesley maintained that physical health is inseparable from spiritual holiness.

I love the fact that Wesley connected the two, for we human beings are more than our bodies. We are more than our minds. We are also spiritual beings, and just as we invest our time, our energies, and our financial resources into the care of body and mind, we must also take care of our spirits.

I'm reading a fascinating book by Lisa Miller called *The Awakened Brain*. Dr. Miller is not a theologian; she is a scientist who teaches at Columbia University in New York. One of her projects was to discover if there was any connection between spirituality and depression. "In our field, spirituality was a barely studied, nearly invisible variable."

Nonetheless, Dr. Miller goes on to state that "Over the past twenty years of my career, I'd seen surprising clinical and epidemiological evidence that spirituality could have a protective benefit for our mental health. But could we discern a concrete physiological function of spirituality in our health and development? Was spirituality thus far invisible in the brain because it was insignificant to mental health or impossible to measure—or was it invisible because no one had yet looked?"

Dr. Miller then describes a study she conducted in which she and her colleagues took MRIs of the brains of persons who had reported that religion or spirituality was of medium, mild, or low importance and those for whom religion or

spirituality was of high personal importance. When she and her team studied the two MRIs, “The difference between the two images made my heart race and my spine tingle.

“The high-spiritual brain was healthier and more robust than the low-spiritual brain. And the high-spiritual brain was thicker and stronger in *exactly the same regions* that weaken and wither in depressed brains...The data was persuasive. Spirituality appeared to protect against mental suffering.

“The MRI findings marked a pivotal moment on the way to my breakthrough discovery that each of us has an **awakened brain**. Each of us is endowed with a natural capacity to perceive a greater reality and consciously connect to the life force that moves in, through, and around us...The awakened brain is the neural circuitry that allows us to see the world more fully and thus enhance our individual, societal, and global well-being.

“When we awaken, we feel more fulfilled and at home in the world, and we build relationships and make decisions from a wider view. We move from loneliness and isolation to connection; from competition and division to compassion and altruism; from an entrenched focus on our wounds, problems, and losses to a fascination with the journey of life.”

As we embark on a New Year, as we make resolutions to take care of body and mind, let us also resolve to take care of our spiritual selves. And it just so happens that I know a place that will help you to connect with Someone who will awaken your brain and give you life more abundantly (John 10:10).

STEWARDSHIP UPDATE

Share the Harvest

As of this writing (Monday, December 15), we have received **\$39,475** in our annual Share the Harvest fund drive. Thank you! Of course, that total may increase after this edition of the *Parish Visitor* has been printed.

We met our \$10,000 Bronze Goal on November 2 and our \$25,000 Silver Goal on December 7. Hopefully we will meet and even exceed our \$40,000 Gold Goal by Christmas. Incidentally, any gifts given to Share the Harvest above our Gold Goal will give us a head start on our 2026 financial obligations, including our apportionments to the Illinois Great Rivers Conference of the United Methodist Church. Our 2026 apportionments total \$27,816, which is \$2,124 less than they were in 2025. Nonetheless, our apportionments are a critical part of our witness and mission to the world. Your support of Share the Harvest is helping to maintain that witness.



AUMC Endowment

This winter, we received a tremendous boost from our Endowment Fund. That boost totaled \$9,000, and it was directed to Share the Harvest. That's \$9,000 that you didn't have to put in the collection plate.

We are continuing to grow the base of our Endowment, primarily through estate planning. Won't you consider leaving a "final tithe" to Aledo UMC through your estate or life insurance policy? Your gift will become part of the principle of our endowment, generating income for the church in perpetuity.

Roof and Light Project

In 2024, we secured a loan through Black Hawk Bank & Trust to install a new roof over our sanctuary at a cost of \$47,550. Because we secured that loan, we were able to get a most favorable interest rate of 2.15 percent. As of this writing, we have paid \$26,000 on that loan, reducing our balance to \$21,550.

Unfortunately, we have been faced with other needs in this century-old building. Specifically, we've been "nickled and dimed" with the cost of replacing an old light fixture every month or two.

Our trustees learned of a rebate program through Ameren. Rather than replacing one fluorescent fixture every month or two, as we have been doing, we discovered that if we replaced all of them at one time with LED fixtures, we would be eligible to receive a \$4,100 rebate and avoid a piecemeal approach. Additionally, we would lower our light bill by \$124 per month.

To access the rebate, the project had to be approved by Ameren and the lights had to be installed by December 31. We did not know if any such rebate would be available after this year. To fund this project, we did not feel as though another capital campaign was the answer. Rather, our finance team used our borrowing power at Black Hawk.

Total cost is estimated at \$19,111. After much prayer and deliberation, there was overwhelming support to move ahead with this project by our trustees, finance committee, and administrative council. Soon this project will be added to our roof loan. If you choose to give toward this project, you may designate your gift above your regular tithes and offerings for either “roof” or “lights” or simply “building.”

Once again, thank you for your faithful stewardship which enables us to let our light shine for Jesus in this community and beyond.

Heifer International

Over the past several years, Aledo UMC has supported Heifer International through our Reverse Advent Buckets. This past year, we added our December Connection Coins to the mix, and this enabled us to take advantage of some early matching grants.

First, Heifer multiplied all gifts by three, and we were able to purchase one Flock of Chicks for \$20; four Goats for \$480; and one Heifer, for \$500. That \$1,000 gift was multiplied to become three Flocks of Chicks; twelve Goats; and three Heifers.

Later, Heifer International announced a new matching program, this time with a matching multiplier of five. This time we purchased seven Flocks of Chicks for \$140; four Honeybee Hives for \$120; one Sheep for \$120; one Goat for \$120; and one Heifer for \$500. That \$1,000 gift was multiplied to become 35 Flocks of Chicks; 20 Honeybees; five Sheep; and five Goats.

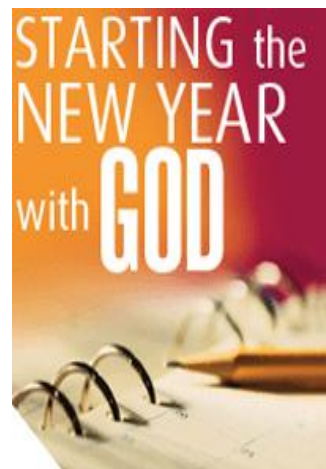

Tuesday Morning Bible Study

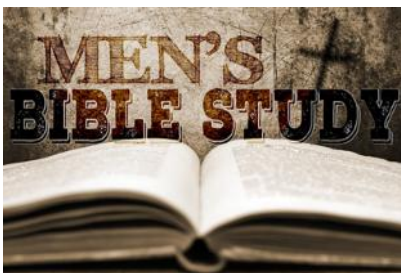
