Meeting Highlights from January 8th

Program: Neodymium Glass

Neodymium was discovered in 1885 by chemist Carl Auer von Welsbach. Its use in glass is attributed to Leo Moser of Moser Glassworks, collaborating with two European professors around 1920. Later, Heisey obtained the rights to produce this glass directly from Moser. The appearance of neodymium glass is described as lavender in color when viewed in daylight or incandescent light. However, it appears more blue than lavender under fluorescent light as you will see in the pictures below.

Technically, this characteristic is called "dichroic", which means to have or show two colors. The dichroic nature of the glass is due to the use of neodymium $oxide(NdO_3)$ in the glass batch. The dichroic nature of Nd glass makes it valuable to collectors.

The various glass companies that produced or that still make neodymium glass all had their own names for it. These include "Alexandrite" used by Moser (Czech), Heisey, Morgantown Glass Works, and Boyd's Crystal Art Glass; "Wisteria" used by Fostoria, Steuben Glass Works, and Fenton Art Glass; "Twilight" by Tiffin (mostly made in the 1950's), "Dawn" by Tiffin using Duncan Miller molds; "Heatherbloom" by Cambridge (introduced in late 1931 and produced through 1936); "Neo-Blue" or "Neodymium" by Lotton Art Glass; and "Pink Luxodine" or simply "Luxodine" by Zeleznobrodske SKLO A.S.

Some of the European glass companies still produce Neodymium pieces. The vintage pieces by US companies produced between 1930 and 1950 are hard to find, especially Morgantown's Alexandrite which had the shortest production run. Heisey and Fostoria produced neodymium glass for about 5 to 7 years, and Steuben discontinued colored glassware altogether by 1934.

Most of the pieces in Astrid's collection are by Tiffin who began her collection with some small compotes in Wisteria, then she later found two in Twilight and she was off to the races. Her collection includes pieces with the familiar optics pattern which were formed by the use of tools or molds, creating a series of lines, circles, or other patterns within the body of the glass. Pieces with optics features include vases and bowls.


