Backpacking on the Appalachian Trail!

The next morning, we woke up at six to pack everything up. Breakfast was oatmeal and hot chocolate. Then we packed up the cooking gear and prepared to go on the trail. Everybody would be taking the short hike back to the bus. It was a very tiring hike back, and the bus ride back to the cabin was not very loud. Once we got back to the cabin, we had to lay all of the tents out to dry after the wet trip. Then everybody left to go finish their day. That was the Appalachian backpacking trip.


Troop 78 is Heading Back to Walt Disney World!!!

After missing the past 2 years Troop 78 is going back to Disney World! The troop has been going to Florida every Spring Break since before Disney opened. Disney World opened in 1972 and the Troop made its first trip to Disney in 1973. It has been a long 2 years of Covid, but it is time to get the tradition back up and running this year.

When are we planning on going? April 9th to April 16th

What are we going to do? Spend four days at a different park each day, we will visit each of the four theme parks



Who can go?

Scouts and leaders who are registered and active in the troop,

Scouts must have attended (or worked) at summer camp at least one week in 2021, and Scouts who are or will be 13 years of age by March 17th, and who are responsible enough to visit the theme parks on their own with a small group of other Scouts as determined by their parents and the Scoutmaster.

The cost to go on the trip to Disney? \$825, plus spending money

What do I get for the \$825 cost? Round trip bus transportation on the luxurious troop bus, food and meals, camping fees, a Four day Disney pass, adventures of conquering all of the mountains in Disney, visit Mickey and Minnie, and create some magical memories. While doing all of this you will learn the value of money, how to read a transportation map, learn how to use public transportation, time management, and so many more life skills that you won't realize.

How do I sign up for this awesome annual trip? Handouts will be given out at troop meetings and information will also be posted on the troop web site.

Once you reserve a spot you will receive further instructions regarding departure times, what to pack, spending money, bus preparation etc.

Why Should I Earn Eagle Scout?

It goes without saying that scouts constantly hear from troop leaders about how important it is to earn the rank of Eagle Scout. As a young scout in the troop, it can be difficult to fully understand the importance of earning Eagle. You may think that it is just simply the end-goal of being a scout or that it is just something that is expected of you. So, the big question is: Why—why should I earn the rank of Eagle Scout?

I suggest that it is important to earn the rank of Eagle Scout because it helps you learn life skills that develop virtue and character. This can be something difficult for young scouts to understand in the way that older scouts and adult troop leaders do. I sure did not understand what skills scouting offered to teach me during my time in the troop, just ask Mr. D or any one of the senior troop leaders who knew me! Regardless, the troop leaders wanted me and all scouts to learn these life skills. Wanting to

impart such skills on younger generations is why many adult leaders participate in the troop and why many still participate even after their children have left the troop.

From my experience, it is typical that scouts do not realize what skills they had developed during their time in the troop until they begin college or enter a trade. We may say that these skills include leadership, event organizing, community involvement, strong work ethic, self-disciple, etc. The list goes on. Any number of events or activities when you are a young adult who is deciding upon a possible career path requires that you put these skills to use. Furthermore, you will likely start to realize that some of the skills you developed as a scout can provide an edge or put you ahead.

Inevitably, the skills you learn while on the path to earning Eagle will enable you to do activities well because they develop good character. As you learn skills, you do not merely learn "to do things," such as tie knots or start fires, you are beginning to understand how to do things well. All adult leaders promise that you will develop character and virtue that will follow you into your adult life if you take the goal of earning Eagle seriously as you learn how to be a good scout. It is written, spoken, and lived in the scout code of honor. Those who take the task of earning Eagle seriously will have great opportunities before them in life.

As someone who did not earn the rank of Eagle Scout, I encourage all young scouts to take the privilege and honor of earning Eagle seriously. It is difficult to truly understand what doors scouting will unlock for you when you are a young scout. We must imagine and trust that scouting will provide us great possibilities throughout our lives.
