President's Message by Tom Adams:

As I sat down to write this month's article I was torn whether to tackle the subject of Moore County's response to the roll out of the Hunan/Covid 19 vaccine. First, credit to President Trump for his foresight to purchase several million doses of the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines, while still under development which hastened their delivery into people's arms by six or more months, once the drugs were approved by the FDA. That decision took guts. Can you

imagine the derision and invective that would have been heaped on him by a joyful press had he spent the billion or so dollars for the drugs and they had not been approved? In that event we would probably be looking at Pelosi, Schumer and crews third attempt at impeachment rather than just the second. Thank you for your foresight and guts Mr. President.

So, what has happened to all those doses? Not many seem to have reached Moore County, or have they reached us, and we've just not gotten them into arms? According to the local newspaper about 10,000 vaccinations have been dispensed in our county of 100,000. Most of those have gone to health care workers and the very oldest of our citizens with multiple health issues. I'm fine with that. It is as it should be. But why so few? If it's due to a shortage of product being sent to us, what have we done to secure more? Is our Health Department banging on the Governor's door, the Secretary of Health and Human Services door demanding more? Does our Health Department have the expertise to know whose door we need to be knocking on to get more product? Other nearby counties, notably Cumberland, Lee, Hoke and Harnett, seem to be rolling out their vaccination programs in a timely manner with great success. We should expect our Health Department to do the same thing here.

The more that I thought about it and looked around the state I'm struck that those counties that voted democrat in the recent elections seem to be doing just fine in being able to get the vaccine. Large clinics vaccinating in the thousands have been held in Mecklenburg and Durham counties. Guilford and Forsyth now have product available and closer to home as noted above Cumberland, Harnett Lee and Hoke have all been giving vaccinations and fortunately Moore County residents over 65 have been able to get shots in those counties. Legislators from Republican counties need to ask the Cooper administration when the vaccine will be available equally in all counties. Vaccine delivery should be a matter of geographic fairness, not politics.

Part of people's frustration in trying to look at the issues surrounding obtaining the vaccine is that the Moore County Health Department has not been overly

(President's article continued from front page) forthcoming with information. It has not been transparent, and we deserve better. Our County Commissioners have tried to get information. They have offered the department more money and more people which has been met with a response from the Department's Director that more resources are not needed. That is not an appropriate response. Moore County needs more vaccines now and we need to get them into our citizens arms faster. If it takes making changes in the staff or the makeup of the Board of

Public Health the Commissioners need to make changes and effectuate improvement.

As this article was going to the printer US Senator Thom Tillis and nine other Republican Senators had just introduced a slimmed down version of a pandemic funding bill and met with President Biden to introduce him to the provisions of a compromise bill that they can support. At a cost of 600 billion as opposed to Biden and the democrats 1.9 trillion

Biden Covid spend-a-thon, the Republican proposal spends money where it is most needed. The Republicans are proposing savings and the worst democrat spending such as a financial bailout for democrat run states and cities are eliminated in the Tillis/Republican proposal. The Republican bill does not provide for a national \$15 per hour minimum wage and does provide payment of \$1000 to those families with greatest need rather than the Biden \$1400 for everyone. The proposals agree on important provisions to fight the virus like an identical 160 billion of the spending going for Covid related items like vaccines, testing and aid to health care systems and departments to dispense the vaccines.

The 440 million left after this spending in the Republican bill is still a LOT of stimulus. For example, the state of North Carolina's total yearly budget is around 23 billion. It raises the question of what are the Dems going to do with the remaining 1.3 trillion? To date they have not said completely. So far just another "trust us" bill. The most famous of which? Obamacare. You know how that turned out. **Kudos to Senator Tillis and his Republican** colleagues for putting a bi-partisan bill of more fiscally responsible dimensions on the table. Now Democrats will have to decide whether to jam through using the budget reconciliation process, their 1.9 trillion spending monstrosity, or will they negotiate for a bi-partisan compromise? We'll know soon whether Biden was serious when he pledged to work with Republicans toward bi-partisan solutions of the nation's problems. So far from what we're hearing from Schumer and Pelosi compromise does not look promising.

On Tuesday, February 2, I sent a letter to you indicating that the North Carolina State Board of Education would vote Thursday, Feb. 4, to adopt new state social studies standards, kindergarten through high school. I am convinced the proposed standards are not in keeping with our conservative republican values. They are political in nature and paint America and our history as evil and racist. These divisive standards consistently separate Americans into groups in an effort to undermine our unity. The proposed standards indoctrinate our students against our great country and our founders. The standards are not age-appropriate in the elementary grades. In the letter I urged you to write members of the State Board of Education and ask they defeat the current draft of standards and support the original standards submitted in June of 2020. By the time

you read this the vote will have occurred. I'll let you know the results at our upcoming meeting.

The April meeting of the MCRMC has been moved to Thursday April 22nd so as to not conflict with the Annual Reagan dinner on April 17. If you have never been to a Reagan dinner you really should sign up to attend. It is a fun evening. This year's speaker is North Carolina's newly elected Lt. Governor Mark Robinson. 



Tom's Thoughts

Protect the Right to be Wrong

Something important to think about. We probably should do a lot more of protecting the right to be wrong in a lot of endeavors.

It is clearly applicable to many things we are currently struggling with in NC and beyond.

I have strong opinions — but not about how to perform brain surgery, write a smart-phone app, design a golf course, or produce a hip-hop album. Perhaps you do have a strong view about one of these, but almost certainly not about all four.

Why? Because none of us can simultaneously be a surgeon, a software engineer, a golfing expert, and a music producer. When it comes to our work, we specialize in a few things and then trade what we produce for the goods and services that other specialists produce. The exchange makes us all better off.

We live most of our lives engaged in such exchanges. There is a great deal of specialized knowledge, with more produced every day. But individually, we possess or are even aware of only a tiny fraction of that knowledge. It would be too difficult or costly to acquire. We don't need it. We just need to trade for its fruits.

Among specialists or other discrete communities of interest, however, there is often robust debate. Surgeons learn, practice, and disagree about the merits of new ways to attack brain cancers. The rest of us don't typically know which side to root for in these contests. We just root for them to keep at it, so we as potential cancer patients can benefit, and

otherwise leave them alone as we go about our own business

Now consider what happens when goods and services are provided by government agencies and public employees rather than private companies and independent professionals. Suddenly, we all feel the need to express our expert opinions about the best ways to rehabilitate a prisoner, treat a mental illness, or teach a child to read — even though we can't possibly possess expertise about so many different and challenging fields, and even those possessing such expertise may lack consensus.

The problem is that, unlike in the earlier cases, we can't simply sit back and let the professionals fight it out. If we don't like a new smart-phone app or hiphop album, we don't have to buy it. If a particular brain surgeon or hospital seems to have poor results, we can go elsewhere.

But what if we don't like the outcomes produced by our prisons, public health agencies, or public schools? It's either impossible or highly expensive to "take our business elsewhere," as it were, by relocating ourselves and our tax dollars to another state. Instead, we seek to change the mix of professionals providing those services by casting ballots in the next election.

This is not nearly as effective an accountability mechanism. For one thing, we may be outvoted. Even if our preferred candidates win, they may not be in a position to swap out the personnel in question or overrule their professional judgments. And through it all, we end up doing the very thing I'm suggesting we lack the capacity to do well — engaging in debate about matters we don't and can't fully understand.

There is no magic wand one can wave here. Ensure more competitive elections? Great. Collect more data and encourage more experimentation and research? Sure. But the problem will remain in some form. It is endemic.

I submit that the best response is to minimize the extent to which people are compelled to receive services from professionals they don't select. That argues for more choice and competition in education, health care, and transportation, even when those services are substantially funded by governments. The next best thing is for governments to pay for measurable performance, by public or private providers, rather than focusing on inputs or dictating procedures.

More fundamentally, this argues for limiting the scope of the public sector. In fact, I think it's one of the best arguments for limited government. Although you may care and worry about me as a person, it does you no harm if I have a wrong idea, do a foolish thing, or hire an incompetent doctor. You can even learn from my mistakes.

AUSTIN CONFIRMED AS
NEW DEFENSE
SECRETARY: Former U.S.
Central Command leader Lloyd
Austin was confirmed last
Friday as the next defense
secretary; an historic vote that



makes him the nation's first Black chief of the Pentagon. Austin, a four-star Army general who spent more than 40 years in the ranks, was approved by an overwhelming 93-2 vote in the Senate.

The vote erased fears of a possible lengthy wait for the new administration's national security team to be put in place. Austin, 67, has intimate knowledge of the DoD. He takes over a Pentagon that is likely to see tighter defense budgets than in recent years and continued questions about how to balance traditional threats like China and Russia with overseas terrorist and extremist groups.

"Globally I understand that Asia must be the focus of our effort, and I see China in particular as a pacing challenge for the department," Austin told lawmakers.

CONGRESS LISTENS AND KEEPS AGENT ORANGE PROVISION IN NDAA: The Senate passed the final version of the NDAA which included the Agent Orange presumptive conditions, already passed by the House. The Senate and House Armed Services Committees conferees of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2021 (NDAA) are to be commended for including Senate Amendment 1972 in the final version of the bill.

Senator Tester introduced this important amendment which will finally add bladder cancer, hypothyroidism, and parkinsonism to the list of Department of Veterans Affairs presumptive conditions for herbicide exposure. President Trump was urged to sign the NDAA into law and provide our Vietnam veterans the long-awaited care and benefits they deserve."

DISTRIBUTION PLAN: VA has announced
publication of the VA COVID-19 Vaccine
Distribution Plan. VA began vaccinating veterans
and frontline employees this week (1/25/21) after
the authorization was given for the PfizerBioNTech COVID-19 vaccine. The plan includes a
prioritization for identifying those who are at
highest risk, and addresses vaccinations for
veterans, staff, and other federal partners in the
U.S., Puerto Rico, and U.S. territories where VA
provides health care to veterans.


