Attendance and Participation

Students are expected to attend all classes on time. A sign-in sheet will be posted at the door and will be removed at the beginning of class. Student who are tardy can sign a sign-out sheet at the end of class, including time of arrival.

- 1. Students who maintain perfect attendance will be awarded one-half of a letter grade at the end of the term.
- 2. Students will be penalized one-half letter grade if they miss four (4) or more classes without instructor approval.
- 3. Students who arrive 15 minutes late for class will be marked tardy. Two tardies will be considered one absence. Students who arrive 30 minutes late for class will be marked absent.
- 4. Under extenuating circumstances the instructor has the right to use his judgement depending on the official documentation provided by the student. In the case of conflict, the student may appeal to the relevant program director or the Associate Provost. Their decision will be final.
- 5. Students are expected to participate in class. Class participation will be a factor in determining the student's final grade.
- 6. All students must turn in assigned work on time. No late submissions will be accepted.

EWU Student Attendance Policy

- 1. When a student has reach one (1) week of <u>unexcused</u> absences prior to the 7th week of class, the instructor will attempt to reach out to the student (via phone or email) to determine the nature of the absences
- 2. When a student has reach two (2) week of <u>unexcused</u> absences prior to the 7th week of class and the student has not contacted the instructor regarding the absences, the instructor will withdraw the student from the class administratively without delay
- 3. Once a student has been administratively withdrawn from the class, the student may request reinstatement in writing and provide written, verifiable documentation for reinstatement to be considered. The decision to reinstate the student rests solely upon the instructor.
- 4. Nothing in this policy shall restrict the instructor from utilizing whatever resources he deems appropriate to assist a student with absences arising from a legitimate cause (e.g., illness, family emergency)

Academic Ethics

Students in Psych 204 are expected to maintain a high standard of honesty in their academic work. Academic dishonesty includes plagiarism or cheating on assignments, examinations, or other academic work, or without prior approval of the instructor, submitting work already done

for another course. Students shall avoid all forms of academic dishonesty, including, but not limited to:

- 1. Plagiarism—the use of another's words without attribution or without enclosing the words in quotation marks. Plagiarism may also be defined as the act of taking the ideas or expression of ideas of another person and representing them as one's own even if the original paper has been paraphrased or otherwise modified. A close or extended paraphrase may also be considered plagiarism even if the source is named.
- 2. Collusion—collaborating with another person in preparation of notes, themes, reports, or other written work offered for credit unless specifically permitted by the instructor.
- 3. Cheating on an examination or quiz—giving or receiving information or using prepared material on an examination or quiz.
- 4. Falsification of data —manufacturing, falsification of information, including providing false or misleading information, or selective use of data to support a particular conclusion or to avoid conducting actual research.
