How to Set a Faith Goal

“I know that I have not yet reached that goal, but there is one thing I always do. Forgetting the past and straining toward what is ahead, I keep trying to reach the goal and get the prize for which God called me through Christ to the life above.” (Philippians 3:13-14 NCV)

I believe in setting goals. I've set them all my life, because goals are simply statements of faith. The Bible says, “The just shall live by faith” and “Without faith it's impossible to please God” and “Whatsoever is not of faith is sin” and “According to your faith it will be done unto you.”

God always operates in your life by faith. That's why you need goals in your life, because a goal is a statement of faith. A goal says, “I believe God wants me to accomplish something by a certain date.” If you don't have a date, it's not a goal. It's a wish. It's a dream. It's a desire. But wishes are a dime a dozen; they're worthless. The only thing that will change your life is setting a goal. You've got to wake up from the dream and go to work!

A **“FAITH”** goal has five characteristics:

Focused. That means it is specific. If you use the words “more” or “less,” it's not a focused goal. “I want to be less angry” or “I want to weigh less” or “I want to be more like Jesus” are not goals because you can't measure them. You have to be specific.

Attainable. If you set an unrealistic goal, it's just going to discourage you. If you say, “I'm going to pray three hours a day,” you're setting yourself up for failure. Set a goal that stretches you and then trust God will help you stretch.

Individual. That means it's personal. You cannot set goals for other people because you can't control them. You can't set goals for your children, your husband, or your boyfriend or girlfriend. You can only set goals for yourself, because you can control you and not anybody else. The only way you can change other people is by changing yourself.

Trackable. Trackable goals can be measured. They're verifiable. You set a date and say, “By Nov. 30 I will have accomplished this, and by Dec. 30 I will have accomplished this, and by Jan. 30 I will have accomplished this.”

Heartfelt. Your goals have got to be heartfelt. You'll never reach a passionless goal. If you're not passionate about the goal, wait until you get passionate about it. If you don't have a deep desire to do it, don't set it.

I encourage you to set one spiritual goal for your life today. Maybe your goal is to have a quiet time for five minutes every day for the next month. That is a FAITH goal, and you can accomplish it in faith.

The fruit of the Spirit abides in us and it is up to us to cultivate it so that we may experience the blessing and the fullness of the Spirit. God is the husbandman..."He prunes, nurtures, waters and protects His own. The indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit will energize and control every faculty of our nature when our will joins the will of God. Then the "beauty of the Lord will be upon us" (Psalm 90:17) and "we shall bring forth fruit unto God" (Romans 7:4)."

FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT:LONG-SUFFERING (PATIENCE)

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, LONG-SUFFERING, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance." (Galatians 5:22,23)

LONG-SUFFERING is from the Greek word 'makrothumia' which speaks of steadfastness of the soul under provocation. It means forbearance and patient endurance of any ill-treatment, without anger or thought of revenge. LONG-SUFFERING, or PATIENCE ("Hupomone") is the God-given ability of a Christian to remain upright in spite of overwhelming circumstances, tests and tribulations. It is a sweet attitude toward any trial that God permits in the life of the Christian. It is what enables the Christian to "give thanks in everything".

LONG-SUFFERING is a product of faith. We must believe that God is at work in our lives and that we will not be forgotten by the God to whom we have committed the keeping of our souls. LONG-SUFFERING grows where there is a continual awareness of God. God is faithful and will not allow evil to overcome us, but our trust must be anchored only in Him. It is inward peace, as well as outward control.

How is LONG-SUFFERING produced? TROUBLE!! Trouble alone will make us impatient, but trouble connected with faith produces LONG-SUFFERING. LONG-SUFFERING is also produced by knowledge, faith and hope. When we understand what is going on we can patiently await the outcome. LONG-SUFFERING does not stand alone, it supports and is supported by the other fruit of the Spirit, for without love, faith, hope, kindness, etc., one cannot be patient. God's timing does not always coincide with our immediate plans, but LONG-SUFFERING offers opportunity for spiritual growth while waiting for God to intervene on our behalf. How do we recognize LONG-SUFFERING? Look for persons who:

- - have forgiving spirits. are enduring hardships, illness, or loss patiently
- - are obedient to God, even under great persecution
- - have control over their tempers and attitudes
- - despite great difficulty remain Christ like
- continue to praise and thank God in all things, whether good or bad
- face tribulations head on and do not try to escape the trial or take matters into their own hands.

WARNING

Avoid the enemy of LONG-SUFFERING - impatience, which if allowed to take root leads to disobedience. Impatience is a direct stance against God.

Key Thought: Faithfulness in our lives stems from being full of faith.

Prayer: Dear God, thank you for the fruit of faithfulness¹. I desire to always be faithful in every area of my life. I yield myself to the work and power of your Holy Spirit, who enables me to walk in faithfulness by being steadfast, unmovable, trustworthy, and to be always abounding in your work, O God².

Key Scripture: "I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the ending, saith the Lord, which is, and which was, and which is to come, the Almighty" (Rev. 1:8).

Key Thought: You belong to God.

Prayer: Dear God, I realize I am not my own. I have been bought with a price - the price of the precious blood of Jesus.¹ I am crucified with Christ. Nevertheless, I live; yet it is not I, but it is Christ who lives within me. The life I now live in the flesh, I live by faith in the Son of God who loved me and gave himself for me.² I embrace your Word which tells me that I am dead to sin, and my life is hid with Christ in God.³

Because of your great love, I am risen with Christ, and I will seek those things which are above, where Christ sits at your right hand.⁴ Father-God, I commit myself to giving you first place in my life at all times. PARABLE OF THE UNFORGIVING SERVANT

Devotional Reading:
 Colossians 3:12-17

Scripture:
 Matthew 18:21-35

EXALT!

Invocation: Speak Lord so that we hear from heaven. Speak through Your word, our teacher, and to each of us. Center our thoughts on You. During this lesson and in the week to follow, let the Holy Ghost energize our spirits for your purpose. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

Declaration: *Matthew 18:21-35*

21 Then Peter came and said to him "Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?" 22 Jesus said to him, "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.

23 "For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. 24 When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; 25 and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payments to be made. 26 So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' 27 And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. 28 But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, 'Pay what you owe.' 29 Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' 30 But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. 31 When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. 32 Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. 33 Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?'

34 And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. 35 So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart."

Affirmation: I will strive to forgive others even as Christ has forgiven me.

ENGAGE

Being Forgiven and Being Forgiving

There was a death row inmate who was released after being wrongfully accused. His community accepted him back, as did his place of employment. He was given the chance to begin again. Months later, a petition was circulated by members of his community advocating for mandatory life sentences rather than the death penalty. Instead of supporting the petition, the former inmate became a vocal opponent against it.

As a class or in pairs, compare this account with the parable Jesus told. Identify their similarities and differences, and discuss any conclusions drawn from the learners.

EDUCATE

Today's Scripture text is a familiar one to most Christians. It establishes the breadth of forgiveness that one should extend toward another. It also includes a parable instructing believers to respond to being forgiven by being forgiving.

We begin our lesson with Peter's introductory question in Matthew 18:21, "Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?" (Note that the "church" had not yet been established. A better translation would be "my brother.") Most likely, when Peter asked this question, he was thinking that seven times is extremely generous when it comes to forgiving someone. Whether Jesus responded by increasing Peter's "generosity" to seventy-seven times or 490 times is unclear in Greek

THE ARMOR OF GOD

EPHESIANS 6:10-18
 "... Be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. Put on the full armor of God so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes." v. 10, 11

The Shield of Faith (Eph. 6:16)
 Faith is being sure that God will keep His promises. Faith in God protects you when you are tempted to doubt.

Feet Prepared with the Gospel of Peace (Eph. 6:15)
 The Gospel of Peace is being right with God and being contented in troubled times. Jesus said peacemakers were blessed.

The Helmet of Salvation (Eph. 6:17)
 Put on the Helmet of Salvation by believing that Jesus Christ died for your sins and rose again.

The Breastplate of Righteousness (Eph. 6:14)
 Righteousness is being honest, good, humble, and fair to others. It means standing up for weaker people.

The Belt of Truth (Eph. 6:14)
 Truth keeps us from giving in to the world's beliefs. Compare your beliefs and actions to the truth of the Word of God.

The Sword of the Spirit (Eph. 6:17)
 which is the Word of God. God's Word is our offensive weapon. When we tell others what the Bible says, the Holy Spirit helps people see their bad thoughts and actions, and makes them want to be forgiven.

Ephesians 6:10-20 (New King James Version)

10 Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might. 11 Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. 12 For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this age,^[a] against spiritual *hosts* of wickedness in the heavenly *places*. 13 Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand. 14 Stand therefore, having girded your waist with truth, having put on the breastplate of righteousness, 15 and having shod your feet with the preparation of the gospel of peace; 16 above all, taking the shield of faith with which you will be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked one. 17 And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God; 18 praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, being watchful to this end with all perseverance and supplication for all the saints— 19 and for me, that utterance may be given to me, that I may open my mouth boldly to make known the mystery of the gospel, 20 for which I am an ambassador in chains; that in it I may speak boldly, as I ought to speak.

The Season After Pentecost

The Season After Pentecost covers 10-14 Sundays. The liturgical color is red for the Season After Pentecost.

Trinity Sunday is the first Sunday after the day of Pentecost. This Sunday emphasizes the three-fold manifestation of the Godhead (God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit/Ghost): three and yet one. White is the appropriate color.

Color: Red is symbolic of loyalty, power, witness, Christian zeal, blood, fire, the work and ministry of the Church, and the Holy Spirit.

Kingdomtide

Kingdomtide begins on the last Sunday in August and continues until the beginning of Advent. The emphasis includes evangelism, world missions, and the work for peace and justice in all relationships. During this period, special emphasis is placed on the Kingship of the Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. The observance is wrapped up in the heightened awareness of one of the basic tenets of the Christian faith – the hope of the coming of the Kingdom of Heaven

Color: Green is symbolic of freshness of nature, hope, life and growth.

states, "The tithe...is the Lord's," and Malachi 3:10 instructs, "Bring ye all tithes into the storehouse," By giving a tithe or more, I can demonstrate in a tangible way my obedience to God.

When I tithe I acknowledge a relationship with God. This relationship expresses itself through faithfulness in living and giving. Giving a tithe is a constant reminder that God is owner and I am his manager. The Psalmist speaks of this special relationship: "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and they dwell therein." (Psalm 24:1). I can acknowledge His ownership and my stewardship responsibility every time I give a tithe to my church.

When I tithe I enhance the ministry of my church. Most ministries of the church are supported by member's gifts. Tithing, therefore, has a practical value as a systematic means of providing financial support to help my church accomplish its mission. When my church is supported by committed tithes, it can more adequately fund its ever growing list of ministries which include preaching the Word, winning the lost, teaching the saved, and extending its witness to the ends of this earth.

When I tithe I witness around the world. A conservative estimate is more than 125 million people in the United States are unsaved and 66 percent of the world's population doesn't know Christ as their personal Savior (Home Mission Board). Christ has commissioned the church to global discipleship. I can witness far beyond

my neighborhood to 120 countries by giving a tithe or more to my church each week.

When I tithe I reflect my priorities. Jesus admonished his followers to "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness." (Matthew 6:33). Operating with a proper sense of priorities is one of the most difficult tasks. By setting aside at least the first tenth of my income for my church, I establish a pattern for giving and testify to God's priority in my heart.

When I tithe I exercise my faith in God. The decision to tithe, or not to tithe, is more likely related to faith than economics. Like other important life making decisions, tithing involves an act of faith. The scriptures abound with examples of giving by faith. Abraham giving his tithes; the widow giving all she had. Tithing can help me and others develop a greater faith in the adequacy and faithfulness of God to grow in giving.

admit that we've continued to forge forward regardless of our attitudes towards each other. In perspective, we can point to much less global conflicts today than ever before. We can point to the absence of global pestilences and to less imminent aggression among our nations. Except for a few localized places still dealing with conflicts and misunderstandings, the bulk of the world today is in some level of peacetime tranquility. On all levels of human interactions, we appear to be doing much better than our past ancestors ever did. Regardless of what appears to be some kind of peace and harmony, there are a number of indicators that tell different tales of who we are and how we feel about each other.

How do I know any of this and what credence do I put into my assertions? Easy. The World Cup, that's from where I get my data. The World Cup is the biggest event there is. Much bigger than the rest of all other events combined. More than any other global event, this universal tournament of soccer loving nations, provides social entrepreneurs the unique opportunity to look into the soul of human existence. That is, if you pay attention.

As a matter of disclosure, and for those who disregard and dismiss history, I'll just like to refresh our memories with some of the highlights of conflicts that occasionally happen among nations in the name of sports. The most glaring and seriously outstanding in recent history was the 'soccer war' of 1969 between Honduras and El Salvador. Similar aggressive conflicts had happened between ancient Greeks and the Romans in the name of sports. How about the European riot instigated by a bunch of Russian football fanatics who thrashed another European stadium and were subsequently banned from participation in the games for a number of years. These and many such conflicts happen so glaringly they cannot be disregarded. They are reported on for all to read. They take place all over the world; conflicts take place all the time between nations, among clubs and individuals as a result of sports. Calling spade by its name, let's be more specific and call it football; known in the U.S. as soccer.

The aggressive tendencies stemming from anger and sometimes leading to an all out war prompted by sports and other competitive events are very well known and widely documented. What I am referring to here are the subtle behaviors and attitudes we observe just by watching the players in their natural relationships with their opponents while engaged in the game of the sport.

A very popular Premier League forward player for Manchester City, representing his country gets into an

entanglement with a defender on the opponent team. As they disentangle and disengage, the Etihad player slams the ball into the still prostrate, defenseless player and almost steps into his face with his metal-cleated shoes.

The captain of the Brazilian team leaps up to head a ball coming his way, the next thing, witnessed by all, is an opponent with his knee high in the air who bumps into the Brazilian's spine, bringing him down aggressively with a thud heard the world over. He had to be carried off the field never to return and was reported to have had surgery subsequently, before being able to play again.

A Tunisian player is whistled for un-sportsman-like behavior towards an opponent. He rushes to the referee and flares his anger and fury and disdain to the official, while on world wide television. He seems to display his utmost disgust for authority.

A Japanese player falls hard and lies writhing in pain and agony, but an opponent player runs to his side and gestures to him to cut the fakery off. In the end, the injured player had to be carted off the field with an unspecified injury. Never to return to the game.

A striker positions himself in front of the goal posts, readying for an impending corner kick, only to find himself surrounded by two opponent defenders who effectively picks him up and drops him to the ground, while the entire universe watches on television.

After a particular match is completed and fans are slowly easing out of the stands, several others could be seen picking up debris and cleaning up, apparently determined to tidy up the stands for the next match.

Two players could be seen, right after a tough match had ended, to be taking off their upper jerseys and exchanging them with each other.

A grieving player is seen being consoled by a member of the opposing team, hugging and whispering into each other's ears, until the saddened one finally straightens up and walks off hand in hand with his sympathizing opponent.

A replacement is announced and the referee puts the match momentarily on hold in order for the new player to take his place as the retiring player walks off the field. As soon as they reach the edge of the field, the players hug each other. One player turns and waves to the crowd as the incoming player touches the turf and repeatedly makes the sign of holy trinity while eagerly rushing to take his place in the game.

God Wants Whatever You’ve Got

“Where shall we buy bread for these people to eat?’ He asked this only to test him, for he already had in mind what he was going to do.” (John 6:5b-6 NIV)

Do you remember the story of Jesus feeding 5,000 people with only five loaves of bread and two fish? I think it’s amazing that out of 5,000 people, only one person brought a lunch. I’m thinking a lot of people were hiding a picnic basket under their robes because they didn’t want to share with anybody else. But one little boy offered the bread and fish that he packed for his lunch. He gave Jesus what little he had, and God used it not just to feed a lot of people but also to show them how much he cared and how powerful he is.

God always starts with what you have. You may not have much time. Your finances may not be worth much. You may not think you have much talent.

But you can give God everything in your life. Give him your heart. Give him your reputation. Give him your past, your present, and your future. It may not be much, but you can give him your five loaves and two fish.

In John 6:5-6 Jesus asks, “Where shall we buy bread for these people to eat?’ He asked this only to test him, for he already had in mind what he was going to do” (NIV).

Jesus wasn’t sweating how to feed 5,000 people. He already had in mind what he was going to do. He saw the need long before they did. And he had a plan.

You need to understand this truth today: God always has the answer before you even know the problem. God is not sweating your unsolvable problem. It’s not too late in the day for Jesus. He saw your problem long before you did. He knew it was coming, and he already had a plan for it. God knows the solution to your problem before you even recognize it’s a problem.

So why are you worrying? Just admit you have an unsolvable problem, and then give God everything you have.

text. Regardless, the point Jesus was making was that there is no mathematical formula or numerical standard for forgiveness - it is limitless. This in no way implies that Christian love is one that habitually turns a blind eye to sin or offenses. The Bible teaches that accountability, along with honesty and responsibility, are also attributes of godly character that believers should embody. However, there are times when mercy should be granted, in spite of the offense.

In the parable, the servant did not ask the king to be forgiven of the debt, but rather asked for mercy and time to pay off the debt, which amounted to ten thousand talents. By today's standards, a person with simply five talents of gold or silver would be considered a multimillionaire, according to New Nave's Topical Bible. Jesus exaggerates the amount of the debt owed in order to convey to His hearers that the debt was impossible to settle. (In a way, Jesus was foretelling that humanity's sin debt - which was impossible to settle by human standards - would soon be forgiven because He would pay it in full, on behalf of all humanity, at Calvary.) In those days, kings did not accept excuses for non-payment, which made the absolution of the servant's astronomical debt all the more incredible. But how did the servant respond to such a gracious and merciful act? He failed to pay it forward to a man who, like him, requested mercy and time to pay off a debt that was equivalent to only about three month's wages. (This translates to about one-millionth of the amount of that the servant was forgiven.) Instead of showing the same mercy that he just benefited from, the servant threw the man into prison.

"The world's worst prison is the prison of an unforgiving heart. If we refuse to forgive others, then we are only imprisoning ourselves and causing our own torment...What was wrong with this man? The same thing that is wrong with many professing Christians: They have received forgiveness, but they have not really experienced forgiveness deep in their hearts. Therefore, they are unable to share forgiveness with those who have wronged them. If we live only according to justice, always seeking to get what is ours, we will put ourselves into prison. But if we live according to forgiveness, sharing with others what God has shared with us, then we will enjoy freedom and joy,"

ELEVATE

Forgiveness is a topic that can sometimes be challenging. People with deep wounds that are recently received may need time to heal somewhat before entertaining the idea of forgiving. Even today's lesson may have caused the recollection of disturbing experiences or unresolved issues that were buried somewhere in the subconscious. For some, holding on to

a grievance makes them feel less, vulnerable - at least for a while.

Fantasizing about retaliation and revenge can be compelling and self-gratifying; but it can also become dangerously all-consuming and lead to acts of violence. Sometimes people decide not to forgive because they have equated it with letting a person off the hook or giving permission for them to keep committing the offense. These are but a few reasons why forgiveness can be a difficult topic to discuss.

As Christians, we must be careful not to minimize a person's woundedness by saying, "Just tell Jesus!" Or, "You've just got to let go, and let God! OR asking, "Where is your faith?" instead, let us listen to their story and truly empathize with their painful experience. Then, let's replace those well-intended analyses and recommendations with a simple ministry of presence, prayerfulness, and patience for our brothers and sisters who are finding it difficult to forgive.

I THINK:

1. Invite willing participants to relate personal experiences about either giving or receiving forgiveness. Discuss feelings involved. Was it difficult to forgive? Why or why not? Is there any situation in which you think forgiveness should not be given? Why or why not? How does this line up with today's lesson?
2. Hold a debate about whether justice is served when the offending party is forgiven rather than punished.
3. Create a litany about forgiveness.

positive to say. When someone would ask him how he was doing, he would always reply, "If I were any better, I would be twins!" Many of the waiters at his restaurant quit their jobs when he changed jobs, so they could follow him around from restaurant to restaurant. The reason the waiters followed Jerry was because of his attitude. He was a natural motivator. If an employee was having a bad day, Jerry was always there, telling the employee how to look on the positive side of the situation.

Seeing this style really made me curious, so one day I went up to Jerry and asked him, "I don't get it! No one can be a positive person all of the time. How do you do it?" Jerry replied, "Each morning I wake up and say to myself, I have two choices today. I can choose to be in a good mood or I can choose to be in a bad mood. I always choose to be in a good mood."

Each time something bad happens, I can choose to be a victim or I can choose to learn from it. I always choose to learn from it. Every time someone comes to me complaining, I can choose to accept their complaining or I can point out the positive side of life. I always choose the positive side of life." But it's not always that easy," I protested. "Yes it is," Jerry said. "Life is all about choices. When you cut away all the junk, every situation is a choice. You choose how you react to situations. You choose how people will affect your mood. You choose to be in a good mood or bad mood. It's your choice how you live your life."

Several years later, I heard that Jerry accidentally did something you are never supposed to do in the restaurant business: he left the back door of his restaurant open one morning and was robbed by three armed men. While trying to open the safe, his hand, shaking from nervousness, slipped off the combination. The robbers panicked and shot him. Luckily, Jerry was found quickly and rushed to the

hospital. After 18 hours of surgery and weeks of intensive care, Jerry was released from the hospital with fragments of the bullets still in his body.

I saw Jerry about six months after the accident. When I asked him how he was, he replied, "If I were any better, I'd be twins. Want to see my scars?" I declined to see his wounds, but did ask him what had gone through his mind as the robbery took place. "The first thing that went through my mind was that I should have locked the back door," Jerry replied. "Then, after they shot me, as I lay on the floor, I remembered that I had two choices: I could choose to live or could choose to die. I chose to live." "Weren't you scared?" I asked. Jerry continued, "The paramedics were great. They kept telling me I was going to be fine. But when they wheeled me into the Emergency Room and I saw the expressions on the faces of the physicians and nurses, I got really scared. In their eyes, read 'He's a dead man.' I knew that I needed to take action." "What did you do?" I asked. "Well, there was a big nurse shouting questions at me," said Jerry. "She asked if I was allergic to anything." "Yes," I replied. The doctors and nurses stopped working as they waited for my reply. I took a deep breath and yelled, 'Bullets!' Over their laughter, I told them, "I am choosing to live. Please operate on me as if I am alive, not dead." Jerry lived thanks to the skill of his doctors, but also because of his amazing attitude.

I learned from him that every day you have the choice either to enjoy your life or to hate it. The only thing that is truly yours that no one can control or take from you -is your attitude, So if you can take care of that, everything else in life becomes much easier.

Now you have two choices to make:

1. You can forget you read this message or


