



Relieve all who live with chronic illness and pain (*especially*), Barbara, Jan, Janet, Joyce, Phyllis and Larry, Bob and Ellie, Mary, John, Tom, Doug, Alice, Charlie, Pat, Karl and Otti, Larry, Karen,

Anna, Deb, Fran, Pat, Bill, and others we may name aloud or quietly in our hearts. Hear us, O God.

Your mercy is great.

Incarnate God, your love enlightens. Open our hearts and minds to fresh understandings of our faith. Deepen our love for you and for one another. Teach us to pray for our enemies. Hear us, O God.








Preface

This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.


Remembering, therefore, his death, resurrection, and ascension, we await his coming in glory.





Aaron Klink is Chaplain and Bereavement Coordinator at Pruitt Hospice in Durham. He holds a B.A. in Religion from Emory University, an M.A.R. in Systematic Theology from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia, and M.Div from Yale Divinity School, and a Th.M. from Duke Divinity School where he was Westbrook Fellow at the Duke Institute for Care at the End of Life. He has worked as a chaplain, congregational pastor and bereavement coordinator with people experiencing loss for two decades.
