DORVAL NORTH LEADS POOL CAMPAIGN

More Pledges Needed

Residents of Dorval North have mailed 57% of the pledges received in the Dorval Recreation Association's campaign to build two more swimming pools in this city. So their children will not have to cross the boulevard to go for a swim, people in the area are out campaigning actively for pledges, with excellent results.

Because pledges must be received in 1959 if the new pools are to be built in 1960, Association officials hope other supporters will follow the Dorval North example. If they do, the campaign objective should be met well before December 31st, which is the date by which pledges must be in if construction is to start by early spring.

People living in Dorval East have mailed 12% of the pledges,

and those in Dorval West have accounted for the remaining 31%.

Within a few days a letter appeal for pledges will be delivered to every home in Dorval. After elapse of a reasonable period for returns to come in, results will be announced. It should then be clear whether or not there will be sufficient support to justify building two more pools next spring.

The Association is encouraged by public reaction to the plan to date.

Campaign officials stress the need for early mailing of pledges. Delay in mailing pledges could easily delay pool construction another year.

Lachine High Graduates Receive Their Diplomas

On Friday, October 23rd, in an impressive ceremony, Lachine High School added 152 new names to its roster of graduates. Diplomas attesting to their success in the recent High School Leaving Examinations were presented to them by their teachers to the applause of assembled parents and friends who filled the Auditorium to capacity.

Mr. K.D. Sheldrick, who acted as Chairman, also delivered the principal speech of the occasion. The invocation was pronounced by the Reverend D.H. MacFarlane and the Benediction by the Reverend A.A. Schweitzer.

Appropriate music throughout was provided by the Lachine High School Singers and the Glee Club under the direction of Mr. F.L. McLearn. Miss M.J. Meacock was accompanist.

In his annual report, Mr. Gavin T. Graham, Principal, paid particular tribute to those members who had left the staff in the past year, among them former Vice-Principal Edgar Davidson, now Principal of John Grant High School, and Mr. Ernest Spiller and Miss Janet Woodley, who had won appointments as principals of elementary schools. A hearty welcome was extended to Mr. Roy Saunders, now Vice-Principal, and nine other new members of the staff.

Mr. Graham prophesied that Lachine High School, with attendance now of about 1000, will, at present rates of growth, have reached capacity in about three years. He singled out a number of school activities for praise: the Gymkhana, the Singers and other musical groups, the Cadet Corps, the Chronicle and the Library, which has become "an essential tool of teaching." The Lachine City Council, he said, had made a valuable contribution to the last by their annual grant for the purchase of books.

TWO NEW BURSARIES

The principal also announced that two more awards have been added in the past year to the long list already available to deserving students. These were the Kiwanis Club of Lakeshore Montreal Bursary and the Lachine High School Students' Bursary.

Mr. Graham noted that 118 students had been successful in obtaining their coveted High School Leaving Certificates, and pointed out that, of this number, 77 pupils (more than 65%) were going on to higher studies.

LIQUOR OUTLET DECISION MADE

The Liquor Commission store planned for Dorval will be built at Dorval avenue and Marcell avenue, it was revealed at Friday's meeting of City Council, and not on Lakeshore drive, the site asked for by a group in the eastern part of the city.

The Dorval avenue site was the one originally approved by council.

It is expected that work on the building will begin soon.

A pavilion, to cost \$19,800, is to be erected at Courtland Park. It will be similar to the one at Walters Park.

Mayor Pratt has been told by Federal Transport Minister Hees that he will look into his request to eliminate landings and take-off of jet aircraft at Montreal Airport during normal sleeping hours.

In his Valedictorian Address, Gordon Hurford, leading student of the graduating class, paid sincere tribute to the parents, teachers and friends who had done so much during their academic careers to make this day possible.


Chief among the highlights of the afternoon's ceremony was a significant address to the graduates by Mr. K.D. Sheldrick, who as a member of the Lachine School Board for many years, has been intimately concerned with education in Ville LaSalle, Dorval and Lachine. After a gracious compliment to the ability and industry of those who had produced the School Yearbook, the Chronicle, he reminded them that all still had many more responsibilities to assume in the future.

"You are in the debt of the past," he said. "The fact is that you are under a great and inescapable and a glorious obligation."

"The greatest and most compelling lesson of human experience and the professed belief of the Christian world of which your school system forms a part is simply this: All life should be lived to the glory of God, and in the utmost service to your fellow man."

"This is the only road to a successful life. For each of you, there must be a long-time goal that fulfills this requirement and has the most fruitful purpose within the scope of your attainment. Like a campaign, it is achieved by the successive attainment of a series of short-term objectives."

AN OUNCE OF PREVENTION

The Lakeshore road was built for the horse and buggy era. It was never intended for long, sleek cars, heavy buses or trucks even in those days when, a few years back, this area was a little place in the country and not one of built-up streets.

True the road is smoother to within the limits of Beaconsfield and it no longer bears any resemblance to what it did when holiday-makers spent a few months in cottages during the summer.

Today, motorists use it more often because the beauty of its setting attracts them; trucks and buses for expediency. Combined, they create a traffic hazard which should occupy the minds of the experts well-qualified to assess these things.

Signs warning motorists of twists and turns and speed limits, vigilant police and the occasional careful motorists, are not enough. Something should be done to widen it as much as can be allowed.

As a first step might we suggest, if it is at all feasible, that Quebec Hydro be asked to shift their poles, which dot the highway at too frequent intervals. They not only constitute a menace but are also a blot on an otherwise pleasing landscape.

Toronto, be it noted, entered the field of underground cables some time ago. A step in this direction is also being taken in parts of Montreal.

A similar move along the Lakeshore road would, we feel, be welcomed by one and all.

Reports From Ottawa

Last week I published the contents of a letter from the Chief Commissioner of the Board of Transport to the Deputy Minister of Transport on the question of grade separations in this county. This letter mentioned that the Board of Transport was instrumental in having the Quebec Department of Roads and the interested municipalities from Dorval to Ste. Anne de Bellevue and the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific railways make a study, with a view to protection in this area, and the elimination of the most important grade crossings between Dorval and Ste. Anne de Bellevue. The Chief Engineer of the Quebec Department of Roads subsequently reported to the Board of Transport by letter, dated November 27th, 1952. The first page of this report is as follows:

At the beginning of June 1952, we were invited by the Members of the Board of Transport Commissioners of Canada to meet them on the 11th of June, at the Town of Pointe-Claire City Hall, to discuss the ways and means to be taken to eliminate the grade crossing at Valois Avenue, in the Town of Pointe-Claire, or to take other means to protect the same crossing against frequent accidents taking place at that special point.

Representatives from the Town of Pointe-Claire and Dorval were also invited to that meeting; at the same time, representatives from the two railway companies, the C.N.R. and the C.P.R., were requested to be present.

The meeting was presided by the Vice-President of the Board, Mr. H. Wardone, who was accompanied by two other Commissioners: Messrs H.B. Chase and A. Sylvester.

At the opening of the meeting, the President requested the representatives from the Towns above

mentioned to expose their views and their suggestions on the question above mentioned. The representatives from the Department of Roads and the Railway Companies were also asked to speak on the same question.

As the meeting had been going on since 10:30 o'clock A.M. without coming to any definite conclusion, it was then suggested and approved unanimously that the Department of Roads of the province of Quebec, together with the interested parties from Dorval to Ste. Anne de Bellevue and the representatives of the two Railway Companies, would study a general plan for the protection and the elimination of the most important grade crossings between Dorval and Ste. Anne de Bellevue, this report to be presented to the Board by the end of the year.

Pursuant to this suggestion, meetings were held between the representatives of the Towns of Dorval, Pointe-Claire and Beaconsfield, and ourselves.

The representatives from each of these towns exposed their opinions on the importance of the different grade crossings within the limits of their Municipality; but, as the grade crossing at the Sources Road (Montee des Sources) is partly located in the Town of Dorval and partly in the Town of Pointe-Claire, the representatives of the Town of Dorval objected to the construction of a tunnel west of the Sources Road, if the said road was to be closed to traffic.

Having considered and examined the recommendation and the objections made by the representatives, the Department of Roads of the Province of Quebec is, hereby, submitting to the consideration of the Board of Transport, and to the two Railway Companies a general plan which seems to be the most rational for the protection of the public in that region."

Next week I shall continue this report from the Quebec Department of Roads which deals with its No. 1 priority, the "immediate" construction of a tunnel at Montee des Sources. The word "immediate" in the preceding sentence of is more than passing interest when we realize that this report is dated November 27th, 1952, seven years ago.


