Is The IRS Really Using **Private Debt Collectors?**

From The Office Of Lee County Sheriff Mike Scott

Yes, it is true! The Internal Revenue Service is now working with private debt collection agencies to recover unpaid tax debts. The new program, authorized under a federal law enacted by Congress last December, will allow one of the designated collection agencies to collect tax debt from those who owe overdue federal taxes. The four contracted agencies are CBE Group of Waterloo, Iowa; ConServe of Fairport, N.Y.; Performant of Pleasanton, Calif. and Pioneer of Horseheads, N.Y.

Without a doubt, scammers will attempt to use this new service as another way to fraudulently get your money and

your personal identifying information. It is very important you know how the new program works and what the red flags are, as you continue to remain vigilant against con artists. **How It Works**

- The IRS will mail you a letter informing you that your long overdue federal tax account has been turned over to a private debt-collecting agency. The letter will provide the name of the company and contact information.
- You will receive a letter from that collection agency confirming the account transfer.
- You will receive a follow-up phone call to discuss payment options with you.

What You Should Know

• The IRS will never use a phone call to threaten to arrest you, take out a warrant on you, or deport you if you do not

- The **only** way you can pay your tax debt is electronically or by check, payable to the United States Treasury.
- The IRS does not collect taxes on iTunes cards, gift cards or wire transfers such as Western Union or Moneygram.

What You Should Do

- Hang up immediately if you receive a threatening, aggressive phone call.
- If you are unsure if you owe federal taxes, look up your account at www.irs.gov/balancedue.
- To make a complaint about a private collection agency, call the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration hotline at (800) 366-4484.
- If you have fallen victim to this scam, call the Lee County Sheriff's Office fraud line at 258-3292.

SAFE Women And SAFE Girls – A two-hour selfdefense awareness class for women or girls that includes one hour of safety information and one hour of practical activities. For ages 13 to 100, \$5 a person.

Personal Safety – Tips on being safe at home, at work, in the neighborhood, at the store.

Personal Safety For Mothers With Young Children – Tips on how to keep yourself and your children safe at home and away.

Personal Safety For Persons With Limited Abilities – Personal safety tips for anyone living with limited abilities.

Personal Safety For Healthcare Workers – Tips for healthcare agency workers that work in a healthcare setting such as a hospital or doctor's office as well as those working at home or providing home care to others.

Burglary Prevention – How to keep yourself from being a target of burglars.

Internet Safety – Keep yourself safer online.

Workplace Violence/Active Shooter – This program gives information on keeping safe in the workplace from employees, customers or an active shooter whether business, healthcare facility, or nonprofit organization.

Safety And Security Tip

Unlocked Car + Thief = Crime Of Opportunity

From The Office Of Lee County Sheriff Mike Scott

The Lee County Sheriff's Office is asking for your help in putting a halt to a recent rash of car burglaries by reminding residents that these crimes are most often "crimes of opportunity" that can lead to expensive consequences. To minimize the chances of becoming a victim, we must first take away the thief's opportunity by taking a few preventative steps:

- Lock your vehicle. Over half of all vehicles burglarized or stolen were left unlocked. This includes both day and night and in your own home driveway.
- Do not leave valuables in plain view. This includes your wallet/purse, cell phone, laptop, GPS, shopping bags, cash, credit cards, garage door opener, keys, tools, etc.
- Park in well-lit areas. Two things burglars don't like lights and witnesses.
- Do not leave personal identifying papers in car. This includes driver's license, Social Security card, motor vehicle registration, car title, credit card and bank statements as these items can be used to commit identity theft. While vehicle registration papers must be presented when asked for by a

law enforcement officer, you do not need to store the originals in your car. Instead, keep a copy in your wallet next to your driver's license.

• Consider theft prevention devices such as an audible alarm.

"Sometimes even the best crime prevention efforts are not enough for a burglar bent on stealing someone else's property," said Undersheriff Carmine Marceno. "If you find your vehicle has been burglarized it is important you report it immediately to your local law enforcement agency."

What Should You Do If Your Car Has Been Broken Into?

- Call the Lee County Sheriff's Office at 477-1000.
- Do not touch anything or go inside the vehicle.
- If the suspect is still there, do not confront them. Instead, get as much information as possible such as their physical description, direction of travel, etc.

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

June starts to become very warm and usually the rain starts. We do need the rain. What is the month of June



known for? It is World Naked Bull Ride Month. Wow, don't think I'd like to do that. It is also National Fruit and Veggie Month as well as Effective Communication Month. The month of June is also known to be Corn and Cucumber Month. Because it is so hot, let's make a cold cucumber soup. It is tasty and easy to make. Give it a try.

Cold Cucumber Soup

3 cucumbers, peeled, remove seeds, chopped

1 clove garlic, minced

2 cups plain yogurt

2 cups chicken broth (or substitute vegetable broth)

1 tablespoon minced dill (mint can be substituted for dill) Salt and pepper to taste

1 tablespoon minced dill for garnish (or mint leaves) Also you can use sliced cucumber.

Put cucumber, garlic and yogurt in food processor and blend until smooth. Transfer to bowl and add chicken broth, dill, salt and pepper to taste. Chill several hours. Garnish with dill and sliced cucumber. Serves 3 to 4.

1. We had one attempted car break-in during April on Double Eagle Court. A "slim jim" was found on the roof of a car in front of a house. The car was not opened and nothing was taken.

2. I would like to let everyone know what can happen to someone. I have been scammed. I am telling you my story so none of you will ever fall for this kind of a scam. I had put my name, phone number and email address on a site called Care.com for a part-time job. A woman called me from England to say that she and her husband and mother-in-law were moving to Fort Myers and she needed someone to look after her mother-in-law for four hours a day for three days which is a total of 12 hours.

The first red flag was that she was going to pay me \$450 for 12 hours of work – that is over \$33 an hour. I get \$15 to \$20.

The second red flag is that she wanted me to buy some food, appliances and other things for the house they were renting. She gave me the address of the house. I drove to

Verandah to see and talk to the people there. The guard gave me a phone number to call. I did and spoke with someone who had no knowledge of this person. She gave me to the management company who also did not know anything about her renting the house.

The third and biggest flag was a check arrived in the mail for \$4,350. I did not cash it. If I had they would have asked me to send some of the money and I would be out the full amount of the check. It would have bounced. The name on the check was NotaryGo Inc. in California. I called them and they told me that in the last few weeks they had had four cases through Care.com that someone had mailed a check with their name on it. It was not a valid check. I am telling you this so you know there are scammers out there and you need to be very careful. Do not cash a check. I called and reported this to the Fraud Department at the sheriff's office and talked to my friend in the sheriff's office. He stated to "walk away and do not ever cash the check."



Delicious Fun At The Butterfly Estates



Vice President's Report: Richard Herman

- 1. Bike path update (along Eagle Ridge Drive and American Colony) I attended the monthly meeting in March and April to keep the name of our community and interest before the Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC). We plan to continue to do so until BPAC finalizes their priority list at the end of 2017 and the list is subsequently forwarded to the County Commissioners the following year for their review.
- 2. Article 5, Section 3 of the ERPOA by-laws provides that "The DIRECTORS shall fix the salaries of the OFFICERS of the Corporation and reward them from, time to time such additional compensation as may be lawful and justified."
- 3. Article 5, Section 3 is applicable and provides the Board the authority and discretion to approve payment to the ERPOA secretary/treasurer, who is an OFFICER.
- 4. An explanation of the procedure to contact Lee County DOT at (239) 533-9400, to request that your front swale be cleared for better storm water flow.

Luther Ward: Is Eagle Ridge Incorporated? John Spiegel: Yes, it is.

Director's Report: Christine Leslie

- 1. A summary of the Surface Water Management Committee. Due to the very dry winter and spring, no new drainage issues have arisen. The golf course is expected to advise details of their drainage improvement plan however we do not have an expected date when that plan will be finalized.
- 2. We are still waiting for the Golf Course to improve their drainage.
- 3. If the swales in your yard are high, Lee County DOT can be requested to come and look at it and will set an appointment to come back and dredge the swale then come back and sod it

Committee Reports

Arbitration Board Committee: Charlene Wendel (no activity to report).

Architectural Control Committee: Bill Simons

1. A summary of architectural/property submissions reviewed and/or approved or pending approval for the months of March and April 2017. New roofs: 2, Exterior paint: 4, New driveways: 3, Remodel (pool cage, new doors, etc.): 4, Landscape: 2.

Deed of Restrictions Committee: Don Peters DOR Committee Report for March and April, 2017

- 1. During our March tour, nine new violation notices were issued. Four were considered minor and it is expected that residents will comply. Three were discussed with the owners who are working on complying, but need extra time to finish the project. The remainder are on our "watch list" for the next tour
- 2. There was one major violation of heavy construction equipment loaded on a trailer being stored in a driveway for more than two days. In addition, other construction equipment was also stored in the driveway. Ladders and debris were on

the side of the house. One week later only the trailers were there. A second violation notice was issued. The following week the trailers were gone. This issue is on our watch list.

- 3. For April there were six new violations, mostly landscaping problems that need to be corrected. Direct contact was made with three owners. Follow up will occur during May tour. The draught and watering restrictions are taking their toll in many cases.
- 4. The May tour will take place on Monday. May 8.

Landscape Beautification Committee: Hewitt McCloskey, Jr.

- 1. A list of landscape maintenance items was given to our landscape contractor that is to be addressed in the next three weeks and completed no later than May 21.
 - 2. Prune all palms and shade trees.
 - 3. Prune all shrubs located throughout Eagle Ridge POA
- 4. Perform a wet test of our entire irrigation system to verify complete coverage.
- 5. Verify with sub-contractor, All State Pest Control that all trees, shrubs and lawn areas are being fertilized and treated for insect pests four times a year.

Legal Committee: John Spiegel

- 1. See above.
- 2. Our long time general counsel Sarah Spector, Esq., is moving to a new firm in Fort Myers. She will continue as our general counsel
- 3. We will streamline the process for issuing citations for violations of the Deed of Restrictions which will result in more prompt compliance, especially parking violations, e.g., improper vehicles parked in driveways overnight. The details will be worked out and announced, hopefully, at the next board meeting.

Security and Safety Committee: Connie Hope

1. On April 12, on Double Eagle Court a "slim jim" tool (used to open locked car doors) was found on the roof of a car in front of a house. The car was not opened and nothing was taken.
