SUMMER SAFETY

As you all know it's that lovely time of year again where we are reaching high temperatures here in the valley. As a reminder, I encourage you all to stay hydrated during these next few months! Often we forget to take a moment, while working in the yard or working on projects around the home, to stop and hydrate. If you plan on taking an early morning hike or walk make sure you have ample amount of water on you! We see an increase in mountain rescues and medical calls during the hot months of the summer, due to lack of preparedness. Pay attention to your body, it knows you best! If you feel nauseated, dizzy, have a headache, or your muscles are cramping, those could be signs telling you that you are dehydrated. Water is your best bet for flushing out toxins! Steer clear of sodas and juices when attempting to hydrate! If water just doesn't give you that refreshing taste you prefer, try a sparkling water like Arrowhead or a La Croix, items that don't have added sweeteners in them!

Along with staying hydrated, be sure to limit your time in the sun! Whether you're in the pool or hanging out in the backyard make sure you protect your skin with sunscreen and stay in shaded areas as much as possible. The American Academy of Dermatology recommends a minimum of 30 SPF or higher to protect your skin from sunburns and skin cancer. While we all enjoy a nice summer tan, the long term risks aren't worth it!

Let's not forget about the safety of your furry family members during the summer months! Make sure your pets have plenty of water and shade if they have to be left outside for any period of time. Don't leave your dogs or pets inside your vehicle to run errands in the store. If you identify an animal left in a vehicle understand the steps you can take:

- 1. Call 911
- 2. Make sure there is imminent danger of death or injury before taking further action.

- 3. Ensure that the vehicle is locked and there's no other way to get the pet out.
- 4. Use only the force necessary to help the animal get relief.
- 5. Remain at the scene until authorities arrived.

So what are the penalties for leaving a pet in a hot car?

Under A.R.S. 13-2910, it is considered animal cruelty if a person intentionally, knowingly or recklessly leaves an animal unattended and confined in a motor vehicle and physical injury to or death of the animal is likely to result.

Lastly, make sure you're mindful of your animals while taking them on walks. If it's too hot for you to walk barefoot on the concrete, it's too hot for your pet's paws! Have a safe summer!

NEW HANDS-FREE CELL PHONE LAW (This is the actual language of the law.)

- 1. OFFICERS MAY ONLY ISSUE A WARNING FOR A VIOLATION OF THIS SECTION. Civil Citations issued under the new ARS 28-914 cannot be issued until January 2021.
- 2. The new statute provides that a person operating a motor vehicle is prohibited from the following:
 - Physically holding or supporting a cell phone with any part of their body
 - Writing, sending or reading texts, instant messages, e-mails or internet data on a cell phone
- 3. The statute is NOT violated under the following circumstances:
 - The vehicle is parked or stopped
 - Driver is using voice-based communications to write, send, or read a text
 - Driver is using a phone or other device in hands-free mode for navigation, GPS use or obtaining motor vehicle information
 - Driver is operating a device through an interface with the motor vehicle that allows hands-free communication except to actiate or deactivate a function
 - A cell phone is used to report illegal activity or summon emergency help



Reporting your PNP hours (Logs)

Please double check you have all your hours entered. Don't worry that they are late, they still count. Please try to have this done in the next couple weeks. Thanks!

On Line Reporting for PNP at volunteer@phoenix.gov

Mileage Reimbursement (2019 rate has increased to \$.58 per mile)

PNP members who have a NBW Grant in their neighborhood that has funds for PNP patrol fuel reimbursement, please record miles and reimbursement documents online. The log sheet has been updated for this. PNP members recording their time for fuel reimbursement this way must enter the beginning and ending odometer readings and license plate number of the vehicle used on their logs.

When you are ready to do a reimbursement simply email <u>Brian.kornegay@phoenix.gov</u> the PNP members name and the time frame you are requesting to reimburse and he will email back a report. This report will be signed as becomes your "receipt" for the grant quarterly report. The report double checks the math and calculates the reimbursement total.

If this methods work well it will likely be the required method for the grants awarded in July 2018.

PVSA Participants logging hours

In the past PNP members who also participate in the Presidential Service Award (PVSA) program had to do separate entries for PNP and PVSA. This was a duplication of effort. We have an updated combination log for PNP and PVSA. Detailed instructions went out to the PNP members who are also in PVSA.





Candice used Social Media to find a bio on the Social Media Det. Palmer! He is proficient in the use of Social Media, sites and open information source for researching offenders in his investigations. He has been an instructor at several conferences. He teaches officers all over Please Arizona. welcome Detective Sam Palmer.

He explained that what he does is

sit at a desk and chase people who have committed crimes. There are so many scams out there... criminals gather most of the information on social media. From a very small piece of information about a person, someone can use it to become you and therefore scam you.

I would like to answer your questions instead of just lecturing you about social media.

What is a good anti-virus company? Do not use Kaspersky – it's a Russian Company, McAfee is good.

Is there any way to delete incorrect information? No, not likely unless you can find the source, but it could be mistakes or typos.

There is a scam that is an e-mail that says that you are watching pornography and we want money or we will tell everyone you know.

www.haveibeenpwned.com This website will tell you where your breached e-mail resides. All of our info is sitting somewhere, we all have digital imprints out there.

Do not use passwords, use pass phrases. They are almost impossible to crack. Use at least three words, like "lovepurpleelephants." Do not put your passphrase list in your computer. Use a piece of paper and keep it away from your computer.

Don't answer a call with your own number on it. Someone is ghosting you. Don't answer any number you don't recognize.

Is an app like Last Pass a good thing to use? Yes, but don't forget the master password.

How do I protect my identity if I want to go on a Dating Website? Use Google Voice or the 2 Line ap to use a free, different phone number.

Lookout is a good protection for smart phones. Some companies will tell you if a call is a scam or robocall.

Thatsthem.com will let you search an e-mail. Also, Truepeoplefinder.com will show you what people can find with your e-mail address and where it has been sold to. Don't use your real e-mail on Craigslist. Make up a throw away e-mail. Do not invite anyone to your home.

Det. Palmer works on cases like school threats. A kid got suspended from school and went on social media with a picture of himself holding a gun and saying he was going to shoot up his school. A friend saw the post and called the police. This ends up on my desk. I called Snapchat and even though he used a fake name, I was able to find him from his home wifi connection and I found his house and sent the police to his home. He said it was just a joke...

Where does mylife.com get it's info from? If you do a general search on yourself, it will most likely know your full birthdate. It will also list family members, addresses. Familytreenow.com is really scarey!

If you live in the European Union you can call Facebook and ask to be forgotten. Not here, but there are some privacy issues being implemented here in the USA.

If you use Google pay your info is sold to companies so they can solicit you.

Knox is a great protection used by Samsung.

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

"Call if you can. Text if you can't." was the key message rolled out during a press conference on April 2nd as text to 9-1-1 service capability becomes available for the first time in the greater Phoenix region. If you are in imminent danger and unable to talk to a 9-1-1 operator, you now have the ability to text to 9-1-1. The service goes live following months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community.

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anyone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? -Suspect description

CRIME TIPS:

BEWARE OF BOGUS OFFERS TO LOWER YOUR CREDIT CARD INTEREST RATE

One call after another rings on your phone, each promising to lower your current credit card interest rate. The callers claim that all it takes is a small upfront fee and they will negotiate significant reductions with your credit card issuers. But many of these calls are scams.

HOW IT WORKS:

A representative calls, claiming they have a special relationship with credit card issuers and can negotiate an attractive interest rate for you. Typically, they will request an upfront fee before they can negotiate on your behalf. Only, you pay the fee and never hear from them again.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

- If there's a fee, it's a scam: the Federal Trade Commission prohibits companies who sell these services from charging an upfront fee.
- As the cardholder, you have as much or more influence when negotiating with the issuer as a third party, so make the calls yourself.
- Scammers may also seek your credit card information to make their own purchases on it, or sell it to other scammers.
- If you are registered on the National Do Not Call Registry, telemarketers may only call you if you have agreed to accept calls from that company, have bought something from that company over the past 18 months, or have recently asked the company for information.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

- Be leery of any unsolicited, pre-recorded sales calls, especially if you registered your phone numbers on the National Do Not Call Registry.
- If your phone numbers are not on the National Do Not Call Registry, visit <u>DoNotCall.gov</u> to register today.
- Don't give your credit card, bank account information, or your Social Security number to anyone who calls you unsolicited.
- If you have been targeted by this scam or have fallen victim, call the AARP Fraud Watch Network Helpline at 1-877-908-3360 for guidance and support.

The Maricopa County Attorney's Office is working hard for you. Our prosecutors have been collaborating with law enforcement and crime analysts to share information and develop best practices to improve public safety by identifying and prosecuting crime drivers in the community and strengthening community outreach. We're also busy assessing and improving programs to offer diversion to offenders and give them the tools they need to avoid return to the criminal justice system.

Our efforts are being recognized as well, with three of our programs winning awards from the National Association of Counties (NACo).

Our annual 'Don't Leave Me Behind' Vehicular Heatstroke campaign is well underway. We, along with our partners, the Governor's Office of Highway Safety, the Arizona Humane Society and Phoenix Children's Hospital, urge you to help us to spread the word that 'Not One More' child or pet should die in a hot car.

Wherever your summer plans take you, make sure you take precautions to secure your home before leaving on vacation and be aware of your surroundings as you travel to avoid becoming a victim of crimes of opportunity.

THIS SUMMER, LET'S WORK TOGETHER FOR 'NOT ONE MORE' HOT CAR DEATH

It is officially summer and you can feel it, which means whether you are new to the Valley, visiting, or just need a helpful reminder... it is far too hot to leave a child or pet in a parked car. A vehicle's interior can heat up 20 degrees in just ten minutes in our heat, and even when the outside temperature is in the 60's, a parked vehicle can heat up above 110 degrees. Children and pets are particularly vulnerable to heatstroke in hot cars because their body temperature can rise faster than a human adult. "It is never okay to leave a child or pet in a parked car this summer. Whether you are a parent, guardian, caregiver, uncle, aunt, neighbor or friend helping out, if you have a child in the backseat you have precious cargo. You must remember they are there and remember your responsibility," said Maricopa County Attorney Bill Montgomery.

The Maricopa County Attorney's Office is partnering with the Arizona Humane Society, Phoenix Children's Hospital and the Governor's Office of Highway Safety for its annual "Don't Leave Me Behind" Vehicular Heatstroke Campaign. This partnership will work to help spread this important awareness message from now until August 31st through freeway billboards, digital ads, radio commercials and social media. In 2018, this summer campaign saw amazing success with ZERO deaths in Maricopa County from children or pets being left in a hot vehicle. This year, tragically, a young life was already lost prior to the launch of the campaign. However, we are working to ensure that NOT ONE MORE life is lost this summer in our community.

"Last year was the deadliest year nationwide with 52 children dying of heatstroke after being left in a vehicle in 2018. Luckily, Phoenix was not one of those locations and there were no deaths here last year. However, we have already had one this year so clearly there is a need out there for us all to be aware and it is so simple. This is 100% preventable, but you have to be aware that there is a possibility of it occurring. You cannot let down your guard or believe that it can't to happen to you," said Dr. Anthony Pickett, Phoenix 14 Children's Hospital emergency department physician. Having a strategy to remember there is a child in the backseat especially when you are outside your normal routine is the best way to prevent tragedy. You can leave your phone in the backseat or if you have a car with keyless entry leave your key fob in the back, and the car will alert you if you try to lock the door and walk away. When it comes to pets, sometimes leaving them at home is the better option.

"During the Summer, the Arizona Humane Society's Emergency Animal Medical Technicians can respond to about 40 calls a day and up to half of those can be heat related. It is important to keep pets inside as much as you can and never leave them in parked vehicles which is like a hot oven than can turn deadly to an animal locked inside," warned Tracey Miiller, Arizona Humane Society Field Operations Manager.

Serving as a tool for responders is the "Good Samaritan" law, put into place just last year, providing civil protections to those who may need to help a child or pet in distress. The Governor recently signed HB2671 into law, enhancing our animal cruelty statutes to provide greater penalties for intentional acts of animal cruelty.

If You See A Child or Pet In A Hot Vehicle:

Arizona law protects a person's use of reasonable force to remove a child or a household pet from a locked and unattended vehicle if the person does ALL of the following:

- Has a good faith belief there is an imminent danger of death or physical injury
- Check if the vehicle is locked and found no other reasonable way to get the child or pet out
- Call 911 BEFORE entering the vehicle
- Use no more force than necessary
- Remain at the scene until authorities arrive

As per Arizona law (ARS § 12-558.02) A person is not immune from civil liability if the person fails to abide by any of the provisions above and commits any unnecessary or malicious damage to the motor vehicle.

Warning Signs of Heatstroke in Children:

- Red, hot, and moist or dry skin
- No sweating
- Strong rapid pulse or slow weak pulse
- Throbbing headache
- Dizziness
- Unconsciousness
- Nausea
- Confusion
- Irritable or strange behavior

Warning Signs of Heatstroke in Pets:

- Red gums and tongue
- Rapid panting & pulse
- Excessive/lack of drool
- Excessive thirst
- Vomiting/diarrhea
- Glazed eyes
- Weakness/collapse
- Seizures
- Unconsciousness
- Confusion
- Irritable or strange behavior

Safety Tips:

- Never leave a child or pet alone in a parked car even with the windows rolled down or air conditioning on.
- Always check the back of the vehicle before locking the door and walking away.
- Never let children play in an unattended vehicle.

- Always lock your vehicle doors and trunk and keep the keys out of a child's reach. If a child is missing, quickly check all vehicles, including the trunk.
- If dropping a child off is not part of your normal routine, take steps to remind yourself that the child is in the car:
 - Place something you need to take with you in the back seat next to the car seat so that you'll check the back seat before you leave.
 - Set a reminder on your cell phone or calendar.
 - Instruct your daycare provider to call you if your child does not show up.
- If a child or pet is in distress due to heat, get them out of the heat as quickly as possible. Cool them rapidly by spraying them with cool, not cold, water. Never use an ice bath!

Facts:

- 2018 was the deadest year on record in the U.S. for children left in hot cars.
- Since 1998, more than 800 children have died nationwide as a result of vehicular heatstroke.
 - o 54% were forgotten in the vehicle.
 - 27% gained access by themselves and became trapped.
 - 18% were left intentionally.
 - 1% were unknown cases.
- High body temperatures can cause permanent injury or death.
 - Heatstroke begins when the core body temperature reaches about 104 degrees and a child's major organs begin to shut down.
 - Heatstroke becomes fatal at a core body temperature of 107 degrees.

Heatstroke fatalities have occurred even in vehicles parked in shaded areas and when the air temperature was 80 degrees or less.

VACATION PLANS THIS SUMMER? PROTECT YOUR HOME BEFORE YOU GO

Some of us spend a lot of time planning our summer vacation. We meticulously research hotel rooms, airfares, study maps and plan activities. But as vacation season gets underway, how much are you thinking about the security of your home when you're away? Criminals look for the path of least resistance and only need a few minutes to break into your home and steal what is valuable. But there are a few simple actions you can take to deter crime from your home.

- The first thing to think about is how to make your house the least appealing house on the block for criminals. Do this by making sure that your entrances, garage and driveway are visible from the street by keeping shrubs and trees appropriately trimmed and keeping these areas well-lit at night.
- Having a home alarm system is a great deterrent, but even if you don't have one, you can display an alarm company sign.
- Never hide a spare key in obvious places. Criminals know what those hide-a-key boxes look like and all the typical hiding spots, such as under a rock, planter or mat by the door, or on top of the door ledge. Instead, get a coded key box or leave a spare key with a trusted neighbor.
- Arrange to have someone pick up your mail or have the Post Office hold it for you. The same goes for newspaper deliveries.

If you can, leave a television or radio playing to make it sound like someone is home.

A thief takes only 5-30 seconds for entry and spends roughly 3-5 minutes in your house.

The first stop for a burglar is the master bedroom and master bath, so find another location to store valuables.

The most valuable thing a thief can take is your identity, so don't leave documents with sensitive personal information out in the open or in easily accessible places.

When you're at home:

From burglary reports reviewed by the MCAO, we regularly see scenarios where a homeowner was too busy to answer the door, or didn't recognize the person knocking, so they ignored it. **Bad idea!**

Frequently, these situations are followed by the door being kicked in or a stranger breaking into the house from the back yard. Typically, burglars are attempting to locate homes where the residents are *NOT* present so that they can enter without confrontation and have a better chance of stealing property without being identified.

A good piece of advice is to *ALWAYS* respond to the knocking when it is someone you don't know by calling through the door, "not interested," "go away," "I am busy, go away or I will call the police," etc. but *NEVER* open or unlock the door, just loudly call through it. The object is to let the stranger know that someone is at home inside the residence who is awake and alert and able to call the police.

In another scenario, a stranger may come to your door and ask to use your phone. They may say their car broke down, or it might be someone adamantly insisting that they need help. In those instances, *DO NOT* open your door, but offer to make the phone call for them.

If someone comes to your door to perform a service on your home or property and you weren't expecting them, ask for identification. It's okay to call the company and verify that they sent someone out.

Lastly, call the police anytime you see strange activity in the neighborhood.



ADOT MVD: Don't pay for things that are free

Agency urges consumers to avoid "DMV" websites for Arizona services

The Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division is urging MVD customers to be careful when looking up websites for motor vehicle services. Copycat websites not operated by the MVD may charge for services people can otherwise get for free.

"We frequently get contacted from people who used a website such as <u>DMV.org</u> or <u>Drivers-Licenses.org</u>, and were charged improper or exorbitant fees for something that's free, and we never want to see that happen," said MVD Deputy Director Chad Campbell.



There are only two online service portals for the Motor Vehicle Division: <u>ServiceArizona.com</u>, and AzMVDNow.az.gov. Customers may establish a

personal MVD account at Az MVD Now, and that portal will also be adding more service options later this year.

Campbell added, "What's even worse than charging for something that's free is making someone pay and then not delivering the service at all, which happens occasionally. Customers will contact us wondering what happened when in fact they used a website that isn't affiliated with the MVD and they've been scammed."

"Much of the problem stems from people doing a web search for the 'Arizona DMV' or something similar," he noted. "DMV is a common term, but there are many motor vehicle agencies in states like Georgia, Michigan, Texas, Washington and others that, like Arizona, use a different name. Web scammers know that and take advantage of it. It's important that consumers avoid the 'DMV' clone websites and always use trusted sources like AZ MVD Now and ServiceArizona.com."

Drivers: Do you know what to do when confronted with a dust storm?

Best advice: Don't drive into a dust storm



PHOENIX – Are you ready, Arizona? Monsoon season is back. While the exact moment of when the first massive wall of dust will rise up from the desert floor isn't known, we do know this: It's coming.

With June 9-14 officially proclaimed Monsoon Awareness Week by Governor Doug Ducey, now is the perfect time to brush up on the actions drivers can take to stay safest when confronted with blowing dust.

The No. 1 thing motorists can do to stay out of harm's way? Do. Not. Drive. Into. A. Dust. Storm.

That's a really bad idea. Visibility can drop to zero and turn pitch black, meaning you're driving blind and so is anyone else on the road with you. But maybe you're curious and wonder, "Just how dark and dangerous could it be?" Well, we've got the answers. This video shows how quickly visibility is reduced to nearly nothing after driving into a dust storm. And this video shows the aftermath of a 19-vehicle collision that occurred in 2013 in dust storm on Interstate 10 near Picacho Peak that resulted in three fatalities and a dozen injured people.

OK, so now you're convinced to not make the decision to drive into the towering wall of dust. But what if a dust channel whips across the highway in front of you, engulfing your vehicle in a swirling sandstorm? Remember these words: <u>Pull Aside, Stay Alive</u>. ADOT has developed the following <u>"Pull Aside, Stay Alive</u>" dust storm safety driving tips, which can help motorists survive a blowing dust event.

- If you encounter a dust storm, immediately check traffic around your vehicle (front, back and to the side) and begin slowing down.
- Do not wait until poor visibility makes it difficult to safely pull off the roadway – do it as soon as possible.
 Completely exit the highway if you can.
- Do not stop in a travel lane or in the emergency lane. Look for a safe place to pull completely off the paved portion of the roadway.
- Turn off all vehicle lights. You do not want other vehicles, approaching from behind, to use your lights as a guide and possibly crash into your parked vehicle.
- Set your emergency brake and take your foot off the brake.
- Stay in the vehicle with your seat belt buckled and wait for the storm to pass.
- Drivers of high-profile vehicles should be especially aware of changing weather conditions and travel at reduced speeds.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. *FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!*

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

Block Watches come in all sizes. They can be a few houses in a cul-de-sac to a whole square mile neighborhood. They help to develop a "sense of community" and strengthen and sustain neighborhoods by bringing residents/neighbors together with a common interest.

Every Block Watch starts with one person and their concern for the safety and well-being of themselves and their families. Their motivation may be to meet or get to know their neighbors to protect the children, to keep property values up by eliminating blight and graffiti, to stop speeding on the streets by installing speed humps to protect the children, to have peace of mind by discouraging barking dogs and loud parties, and to be safe from crimes like burglary, theft and assault.

We all want to live in a safe and secure environment. Our homes should be safe havens. By rights there should be several layers of protection from the national level to our own neighborhoods. National and state governments provide control of our borders; state and city governments provide police and fire protection, education, and other resources, community member groups provide Phoenix Neighborhood Patrollers and the posting of PNP signs on neighborhood streets; Block Watch provides neighbors watching out for neighbors; and we provide our own home security alarms, lighting and burglary prevention measures.
