Orthopedics and Orthotics

Two of our busier departments are **Orthopedics** and **Orthotics**. Many children are patients in both departments.



Alessa Noriega, age 7, lives in Hermosillo, Son. She has spina bifida. Although we don't see much spina bifida in the U.S. today, this condition is more prevalent in Mexico.

Alessa cannot walk and depends on her wheel chair for mobility. We get discounted wheel chairs, but these still cost \$500-\$4,000 depending on the type of adaptation needed for the child. As the child grows,


we provide a larger wheel chair, taking the used one to hand down to another child.

Alessa also wears ankle-footorthoses (AFOs) to help keep her feet straight. Dario Millanes, below, also wears AFOs. These cost approximately \$750. Dario lives in Huatabampo, Son. and



is 6 years old. He does not walk well, and the AFOs help to keep his ankles and feet properly aligned to help his walking.

Abel Garcia Perez, age 4, is a new patient at St. Andrew's. He has problems with his hip. He will be diagnosed by the Or**thopedics** doctor. If he needs surgery, we will send him to **Shriners Hospital** in either Spokane, WA or Sacramento, CA. In each case, The Clinic will pay the air fares for him and one parent to accompany him. We send patients when there is an opening in the surgery schedule so this means we pay \$1,000-\$1,500 for each round-trip air fare.



Then and Now

Hector Lopez came to the Clinic when he was 6 months old. He lives in Nogales, Son. The doctors diagnosed



him with arthrogryposis. He has no real knee, elbow, or wrist joints. Hector and his mother traveled to **Shriners Hospital** for surgery on his feet. He was very traumatized by the surgery.



At The Clinic, **Reiki Masters** worked to help relieve the clenching which often results when anyone is hurting from surgery.

Usually, the patient lies on a table for Reiki Therapy, but Hector was so traumatized that the Reiki Masters worked their "healing magic" while his father was holding him. He was 3 years old.

At age 4, Hector was the happiest we had seen him. He was talking excitedly with the **Occupational Therapist**. In the photo, he is showing her the strength in his hands as he pushes down on a toy. She used this method to see if he was strong enough to push a wheel chair.

Hector is unable to walk. He moves by jumping his body up and down while his legs are crossed. He can move very fast this way.

Children with arthrogryposis are very bright. They are good at figuring out ways to adapt. For example, to eat, Hector rests his arm on the table and brings the fork up to his mouth.

At age 4, Hector received his first wheel chair; he could go to school. He was delighted to be mobile. He could not uncross his legs so the wheel chair had to be large enough for him to sit cross-legged.

Now, Hector is 11 years old. He is able to uncross one leg, but keeps the right leg bent. The **Physical Therapist** said that he can now propel himself in a wheel chair, toss a ball by crossing his wrists, and transfer himself from his wheel chair to a bed on a slide board. His mother helps him minimally. He has made a lot of progress in caring for himself.

Hector has a cheerful outlook



on life. He is an example of one of our long-time patients who continues to get **occupational** and **physical therapy**. He will need a larger wheel chair in the near future.

Patients Need Different Services

r. Francisco Valencia examines Carlos Carpio Espinosa in the **Orthopedics Department**. Carlos is 9 years old and lives in Hermosillo, Son.

Carlos has Legg-Calve-Perthes disease characterized by a loss of blood supply to the femoral head of the right hip in his case. Over time the blood vessels are likely to grow back and bone



reform, although an x-ray will show an abnormal hip. Carlos should do quite well; his case is not severe enough for surgery.

Daniela Solis, age 4, also lives in Hermosillo. She has strabismus with one eye looking inward. Often eye glasses will correct this situation. If not, we work with an ophthalmologist who will do the surgery.




She also wears special shoes to correct a foot problem. She is a patient in the **Vision** and **Or-thotics Departments.**

Vision Department Volunteer Rudy Piña helps Angel Valenzuela to read a book. Angel is feeling the images on the




pages as he is mostly blind. His mother is learning Braille so she can help him when he is ready to read Braille. Angel is 2½ and lives in Nogales, Son.

He falls a lot and is at The Clinic for corrective shoes in the **Orthotics Department.**


Luis Fernando Guirado Gonzales is 6 years old and also lives in Nogales, Son. He had his first cleft lip surgery at age 3 months. This was followed by cleft palate



surgery in 2009. He had pharyngeal flap surgery in 2011. He is a patient in the **Speech and Language Therapy Department**.

We'll have more on our October Cleft Palate/Cleft Lip Mission in our next newsletter. Luis is one of many patients who require more than one surgery. Other missions to third-world countries do only one surgery without any follow-up surgery or speech and language therapy. It's not too late to sponsor a child for this year's mission. Our cost is about \$1,000/child.

Patients Need Different Services



avier Hernandez Velarde is having his hand wrapped by a **Shriners Hospital** nurse in the **Orthopedics Department**. His thumb was turned into his palm. Surgeons at **Shriners Hospital** fused the thumb and rerouted the tendon so the thumb won't turn inward resulting in much improved function of his hand. Improved function is the main reason for the surgery since the thumb is functionally 50% of the hand.

Javier is 14 and lives in Naco, Son.

At each clinic, one or more doctors and nurses for either **Shriners Hospital**, Spokane or Sacramento, come to our clinic to assess patients for surgery at their hospital. They also do follow-up on patients after surgery.

We are very grateful to **Shriners Hospitals** for providing free surgeries to our children. The Clinic pays the round-trip air fare for patient and one parent. The cost is usually \$1,000-1,500.



Seven-year-old Yeraldi Gaxiola is a patient in the **Vision Department**. She lives in Huatabampo, Son. She will be examined by our volunteer eye doctor to determine her need for glasses.

Children needing glasses can get a free pair once a year unless medically necessary for more frequent prescriptions. The Clinic accepts children's used eyeglass frames for reuse. You can leave these at our Green Valley Business Office.

She can walk but has a rocking gait. At her young age, chances of developing normal hip and walking after surgery are excellent.
