Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

The first Sunday in February is a festival we usually celebrate only when February 2 falls on a Sunday. The Presentation of Our Lord commemorates the events 40 days after Jesus' birth: Mary comes to the Temple to be purified according to Jewish Law and Jesus, as her first-born son, is presented to the Lord. The day has traditionally been called the Purification of Mary by Lutherans, but in an American context filled with anti-Catholic bigotry, we have adopted the more neutral title, the Presentation of Our Lord. The Presentation of Our Lord is referred to in some corners of the church as Candlemas because of an ancient tradition of dedicating all the candles to be used in the church in the coming year at the service celebrated on that day. It was a way of underscoring the truth of Simeon's confession that this baby Jesus was "a light for revelation to the Gentiles" and a light for glory to Israel. With the invention of liquid wax candles, this practice has largely disappeared.

Our Congregation Meeting to approve the final 2024 financial and committee reports will be held on Sunday, February 9, 2025, at 11:30 a.m., immediately after the 10:30 a.m. service. Please make sure to be there for this brief but necessary meeting. I can tell you Regular Member Giving in 2024 was the highest it has been in the last 10 years. Average weekly attendance continues to increase as we continue to recover from the negative effects of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Every Sunday at Augustus we gather around God's Word to hear how much God loves us and how much he has done for us, especially through the life, death, and resurrection of his only Son, Jesus. Why not invite someone to join you for worship who needs to hear the Good News? It will be a blessing for both of you.

May God the Holy Trinity bless you and keep you, fill you with courage, and + give you peace.


#### 6. Baptism

Being baptized is being connected to the death and resurrection of Christ and being invited into God's grace. This is an accepted Christian belief that is rooted in the New Testament. Jesus is baptized by John the Baptist (Mark 1:9-11; Matthew 3:13-19) and according to the Gospel of Matthew (chapter 18, verse 19) he sends the disciples out in the world to make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. The early Christian creeds stem from the confession of the triune God at baptism. When baptized, the person becomes a child of God and is given everything that belongs to Christ. See Article IX of the Augsburg Confession.

#### Augsburg Confession: [IX. Concerning Baptism]

"Concerning baptism, it is taught that it is necessary, that grace is offered through it, and that one should also baptize children, who through such baptism are entrusted to God and become pleasing to him.

Rejected, therefore, are the Anabaptists who teach that the baptism of children is not right."

#### **Under Authority**



#### **Disciples of the Cross**

In Ephesians 2:1 and 4, the Apostle Paul writes, "As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins . . . but because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ . . . " Before Christ, we were dead in sin. Through no effort of our own, we have been made alive "with Christ"!

Now what? Now what, indeed! Yes, Christ has saved us for eternity, but that eternity begins at Baptism. Some of us will spend only a short portion of eternity on earth, others much longer, but all of us are called to make these days count. In the Great Commission in Matthew 28:19, Jesus calls us to "go and make disciples of all nations." He asks us, empowered by Word and Sacrament, to carry on his work.

There are many facets to the work of the Church. Not all of us are preachers and teachers of the Word, but we read in 1 Peter 4:10 that each of us has a gift and each of us is to use this gift to serve others. Peter speaks of offering hospitality and serving as gifts which God has given to edify the Church. The Apostle Paul writes about spiritual gifts to the Romans, the Corinthians, and the Ephesians, each time stressing the point that we are to use what gifts we've been given for the good of the Body of Christ and according to the grace we've been given.

#### Jesus said:

"If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me will find it." (Matthew 16:24-25).

This is the challenge Jesus issues to each of us individually and to the Church collectively. Alive in Christ, we pick up the cross and, joyfully, just as Jesus, "who for the joy set before him endured the cross" (Hebrews 12:2), carry it wherever Jesus leads us. There is no life apart from Christ. As disciples of the cross who have found this to be true, let us carry this message to the world.
