

Nerds and Heros

This could have been a golden year for the science of virology. Americans cannot walk 20 feet without seeing an image of one of the most fascinating forms of life on earth. In fact, there has been debate over whether we should even classify viruses as living beings, since, in their pure form, they are inert, having no metabolic processes and only "coming alive" when in the cell of a living being. Unfortunately, when the typical American sees an image of one of these creatures, the dominate emotion is not fascination, but fear, and a golden opportunity to learn something is lost. In the case of Ebola, the questions we hear are: "How do I know if I have it? How do I protect myself and my family? Should we send in the Marines? "

Consequently, our stock market stumbles, our travel industry trembles, our hospitals scramble. The media, of course, steps up, covers the story, and, as usual, gets it all muddled up. They cannot see the big picture or put things in perspective because they do not understand what an epidemic is - how it works, or how it gets resolved. Doctors, of course, understand epidemics, but doctors, except for a few academics, have been largely left out of the dialog, and, as a result, our patients have been needlessly frightened.

Here's how the story should go:

- An epidemic is looming; but we've been through epidemics before; our first line of defense is our public health community, doctors and nurses who will work tirelessly, selflessly, and even fearlessly to figure out the nuts and bolts of this thing. They do the science. What is the infectious agent? How is it spread? What is the treatment? Can we make a vaccine? The process they use is steeped in serious scientific inquiry, the best of what modern medicine has to offer. Doctors enjoy this scientific enquiry, but we are not just nerds, we are also heroes in the sense that our work makes the world safer for the public. The big story is about the work of doctors, not about whether one nurse broke sterile protocol, or whether someone should or should not have gotten on a cruise ship.
- A little history would also be appropriate, to remind the public how past epidemics have been controlled (eradication is another thing altogether, a common misunderstanding of scientifically-illiterate reporters). Smallpox, Yellow Fever, Cholera, Polio. All at one time caused widespread panic, now, not so much. Indeed, many people would have trouble even recognizing the names of these once terrifying problems. In those epidemics, money was appropriated for research, equipment and supplies, then the doctors and nurses got to work, relegating the epidemic to a historical footnote.
- The media would also do a great service by putting this epidemic in perspective. Ebola consists of a very small segment of the infectious disease burden of humanity, or even of the infectious disease burden in Africa, where malaria, Dengue fever, parasitic infections, sleeping sickness and, of course, AIDS, still reign supreme. In our country, pneumonia is the infection to watch out for, the infection most likely to kill you. Stop

worrying about Ebola and get your pneumonia vaccine, your flu shot - and while you are at it, get your kids vaccinated fully! Then trust your doctors and hospitals, who have done you good service in the past, to get a handle on this epidemic.

- Next, the media needs to remind people that in times of crisis, they must remain calm. Take a deep breath. This is not the time for drastic, unproven actions, such as sending in the military or banning travel from affected countries.
- The goal should be that everyone understands these issues. Perhaps everyone should be required to study biology in high school. Medical reporters should

be required to take extra science classes. Colleges required to offer science courses for seniors. Then, when the next crisis occurs, when the next epidemic occurs, as it surely will, we will understand it, and our attention as a country can focus on something else other than the silliness we have seen with this Ebola epidemic.

 And perhaps, just perhaps, people should recognize that when they think of "public safety" heroes (policemen, firemen, military servicemen) they should think of doctors as well, who are every bit as important in guarding the lives of Americans.

We can only hope.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING LEGISLATION SIGNED INTO LAW

On Thursday, October 16, Gov. Rick Snyder signed legislation protecting Michigan citizens from human trafficking and supporting victims by putting some of the strongest policies in the nation into place to combat this crime. Much of the legislation stems from a 2013 report by the Michigan Commission on Human Trafficking.

Snyder signed Senate Bill 584 and House Bill 5158 during the Women Strengthening Michigan forum in Oakland County. The legislation makes human trafficking punishable by imprisonment for life and permanently creates the state Human Trafficking Commission within the Attorney General's Office. They are now Public Acts 324 and 325. Prior to the forum, the governor signed the remaining 19 bills within the package which strengthen punishments and provide support for victims. They are now PAs 326-344.

Bills strengthening punishments for human trafficking offenders include:

- Making it a felony to solicit a person under 18 years old for prostitution (SB 205);
- Making soliciting a Tier I sexual offense, and recruiting a minor for a commercial sex trade or forced labor a Tier II offense, both requiring registration as a sex offender (SB 602);
- Making penalties for human trafficking consistent (HB 5234);
- Classifying restraining a minor for the purpose of producing child pornography as kidnapping (HB 4021);
- Increasing the fine from \$2,500 to \$5,000 for operating a place of prostitution and removing gender from the description of prostitution in the Michigan Penal Code to ensure all offenders receive the same punishment for operating a place for prostitution (HB 5231);
- Ensuring the Judicature Act includes human trafficking provisions (HB 5236);

• Holding individuals who do not report human trafficking practices accountable by allowing seizure of personal property or possessions (HB 5233).

Bills providing support for victims include:

- Vacating prostitution-related offenses from a victim's record (SB 585);
- Allowing a victim's convictions as a result of forced trafficking to be set aside (HB 5025);
- Presuming that individuals under 18 years old with prostitution offenses were coerced into the activity (HB 5012);
- Ensuring that trafficking victims within the foster care system receive appropriate counseling (SB 587);

- Ensuring potential homes for a victim in foster care will provide the necessary mental health, counseling or other services necessary resulting from being trafficked (SB 593);
- Creating the Human Trafficking Victims Compensation Act, making victims eligible for compensation from those who trafficked them (SB 590 and HB 5237);
- Ensuring access to medical assistance benefits for psychological and medical treatments through Medicaid or other insurance coverage as a result of being trafficked (SB 592);
- Expanding juvenile court jurisdictions to protect children who are victims of human trafficking (HB 5026);
- Requiring the Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs to work in conjunction with health professional boards to adopt rules to raise awareness

- training standards for health professionals to identify victims of human trafficking (SB 597);
- Ensuring the Michigan Department of Human Services reports suspected or investigated cases of child abuse or neglect involving human trafficking to local law enforcement (HB 5239).



Ongoing construction and remodeling, the search for the next dean and new duties for some faculty members were the primary topics of two recent all-staff forums conducted by Central Michigan College of Medicine Interim Dean, Linda Perkowski.

The forums were conducted in Saginaw on October 8 and in Mount Pleasant on October 17. Perkowski said construction of the educational facility on the campus of Covenant HealthCare remains on track to be completed by May 2015. Renovation of the lobby and waiting areas for the CMU Health clinics at 1000 Houghton are underway, and the CMU Board of Trustees recently approved a construction/renovation plan at St. Mary's of Michigan.

Other areas discussed at the forums:

The next dean: CMU Provost Michael Gealt spoke about the ongoing search for a new dean at the forum in Mount Pleasant. Gealt said the search firm has identified several potential candidates and soon will present a narrowed list to the search committee. Committee members will interview candidates at an airport, and narrow the field further. The remaining candidates will come to CMU and Saginaw for interviews. "Just to let you know, the first words in the description are about our mission and

vision," Gealt said. "That's not changing. We are not changing what this College of Medicine does."

<u>Staff changes:</u> Perkowski outlined updated job titles/duties for seven people.

- Dr. Ed McKee, now the interim senior associate dean/faculty administration and research.
- **Dr. Ron Bradley**, continuing in his role as interim medical discipline chair.
- Dr. Sam Shaheen, continuing as the vice chair for surgical disciplines and leading a clinical task force.
- **Dr. Steve Vance**, now the associate dean for the distributed campus.
- Sue Parsons, continuing as the assistant dean for finance, but now reporting to the dean
- **Dr. Bob Fleischmann**, now chair of foundational sciences.
- **Dr. Bernard Noveloso**, now the interim program director for family medicine.

Residency programs: CMU Medical Education Partners Executive Director, Terry Lerash, spoke at the forum in Saginaw and said recruiting for physician-faculty positions continues. "We have a lot of candidates pending that we are working through, and I'm confident that by the end of this fiscal year, June 30, we should be pretty much fully staffed in the organization by a faculty perspective," he said.

❖ AMA Calls for Re-Design of EHRs to Improve Usability

Building on its landmark <u>study</u> with RAND Corp. confirming that discontent with electronic health records is taking a significant toll on physicians, the AMA recently called for solutions to EHR systems that have neglected usability as a necessary feature.

Responding to the urgent physician need for better designed EHR systems, the AMA released a new <u>framework</u> outlining eight priorities for improving EHR usability to benefit caregivers and patients.

"Physician experiences documented by the AMA and RAND demonstrate that most electronic health record systems fail to support efficient and effective clinical work," AMA President-elect Steven J. Stack, MD, said in a <u>news release</u>. "This has resulted in physicians feeling increasingly demoralized by technology that interferes with their ability to provide first-rate medical care to their patients."

While AMA/RAND findings show physicians generally expressed no desire to return to paper record keeping, physicians are justly concerned that cumbersome EHR technology requires too much time-consuming data entry, leaving less time for patients. "Workflow, usability, productivity and vendor quality issues continue to drive dissatisfaction."

Ebola Resources and Information

For several months, the Centers for Disease Control had been warning that Ebola is "just a plane ride away" and that proved to be true in Dallas in late September.

The CDC warns that in the early stages of infection, Ebola resembles many other viral illnesses, causing headache, fever, weakness, muscle pain, diarrhea, and nausea, which is why the CDC is stressing the



need to ask about travel histories for any patient presenting with such symptoms.

MSMS has been including the links to the Centers for Disease Control and the Michigan Department of Community Health in the weekly e-Medigram. The CDC recently updated its website information about Ebola at http://www.cdc.gov/vhf/ebola/index.html.

The Michigan Department of Community Health also recently updated its Ebola website at http://www.michigan.gov/emergingdiseases/0,4579,7-186-69879---,00.html.

The American Medical Association also has extensive information about Ebola on its website. By coincidence, the AMA will be holding its Interim meeting in Dallas on Nov. 7-11 where Ebola will be extensively discussed. The AMA home page is at http://www.ama-assn.org/ama and the AMA Ebola Resource Center is at http://www.ama-assn.org/ama/pub/ physician-resources/public-health/ebola-resource-center.page.

Governor Rick Snyder issued a news release on October 9 highlighting the efforts of the Michigan Department of Community Health in preparing for any potential cases of Ebola in Michigan.

MSMS will continue to disseminate updated information to members, educate members, and update this web site as needed.

❖ MSMS Efforts on the Primary Care Uplifts for Medicaid

Due to the efforts of MSMS, the challenges of administering the primary care uplift in Medicaid were elevated within the Michigan Department of Community Health. There have been many questions regarding the accuracy of payments made through the managed care plans, and the timing of such payments. As a result, MSMS submitted a Freedom of Information Act request that provided the amount of funds MDCH distributed to the health plans and the amount of funds the health plans had distributed to physicians.

The MSMS Board of Directors recently discussed this issue in detail. MSMS discovered that the increases in payments to primary care physicians were held up by a number of issues including system issues that delayed payments, as well as, missing data from Medicaid health plans. Medicaid officials have met with health plan representatives and are committed to working with the plans to prioritize resolution of communication, data, and logistical problems, according to a report to the Board.

"This wouldn't have happened without the efforts of MSMS," said MSMS President James D. Grant, MD. "Freeing up this money for those members to whom it is owed is a tangible benefit of MSMS membership. It also benefits non-members who are not paying MSMS dues. We need all Michigan physicians to join MSMS so we can do even more advocacy like this in the future."

Other highlights from the MSMS October Board meeting include:

- Continuing MSMS efforts to educate physicians and patients about end-of-life care issues and the need for a durable power of attorney for health care. Patient Advocate forms are available through MSMS.
- Initiating a pilot membership program that will allow individual members of physician organizations that have

- engaged in a service agreement with MSMS to get a five percent discount on MSMS dues.
- Supporting Senate Bill 1033 that would assure that a set of Direct Primary Care services offered by a physician are not improperly characterized as insurance. While the pros and cons of offering prepaid DPC services were discussed at length, the Board agreed that the scope of SB 1033 is only to clarify that this innovation is not insurance and, therefore, removed from various burdensome regulatory hurdles.
- New national immunization data and rankings were announced at the end of last week and showed that Michigan ranks 4th worst nationally with 5.4

percent--up.1 percent from last year - of parents choosing not to vaccinate their children against preventable, potentially deadly diseases.

MSMS is working with a broad coalition including the MSMS Alliance, Michigan Academy of Family Physicians, American Academy of Pediatrics-Michigan Chapter, Michigan Osteopathic Association, school nurses, health plans, and other health care organizations to decrease the opt-out rate in Michigan. Various efforts are underway including news conferences to help educate the public about the consequences of par-

ents not getting their children immunized.

The coalition issued a joint statement to the media, which said, in part:

"We are extremely disappointed to learn that despite ongoing and increased education and outreach efforts, too many Michigan parents continue to make potentially dangerous choices for their children and our communities.

"Childhood immunizations protect our kids from dangerous infectious diseases such as measles, mumps and whooping cough, but more and more Michigan kids are at risk as non-medical exemption rates rise and immunization rates fall."

HOW TO WRITE RESOLUTIONS

TO THE MSMS HOUSE OF DELEGATES

The Process

Business is introduced to the MSMS House of Delegates (HOD) through the presentation of resolutions by voting delegates on behalf of their county delegation, specialty society, ethnic medical society. MSMS membership section or as individual delegates. In addition, the MSMS Board of Directors may present reports with recommendations for HOD action.

In order to be considered as regular business of the HOD, resolutions must be submitted to MSMS 60 days prior to the meeting of the HOD.

Once resolutions are received by MSMS, they undergo MSMS and AMA policy review, legal review and appropriate editing. Resolutions are then

assigned numbers and referred to one of the seven HOD reference committees. A complete set of resolutions is included in the Delegate Handbook that is emailed to delegates prior to the meeting of the HOD, as well as, on the MSMS website at www.msms.org.

Special briefings for delegates and alternate delegates are held in April of each year to review submitted resolutions, as well as, major activities and issues of MSMS. All delegates are invited to the briefings held in their respective districts.

Deadline to submit resolutions: Monday, February 23, 2015

Late Resolutions

Late resolutions received by MSMS after the deadline are reviewed by the Committee on Rules and Order of Business that meets prior to the opening session of the HOD. The Committee will provide introducers of late resolutions an opportunity to

explain the reasons for submitting late resolutions. The Committee will make recommendations to the HOD regarding acceptance. The HOD will vote on the recommendations of the Committee on Rules and Order of Business.

Structure of a Resolution

Resolutions start with a series of "whereas" clauses that explain the rationale of the resolution, contribute to the understanding of the subject matter, and lead into the "resolved" section of the resolution.

A 2006 resolution requires that the "whereas" clauses must include references to any data or statistics that might be used in formulating an opinion on the resolution's "resolved" sections.

The "resolved" section of a resolution defines the intent of the resolution. It is required that each "resolved" be able to stand independent of the "whereas" clauses(s) as only the "resolved" portion is retained in the Digest of Proceedings, the official record of the HOD.

When preparing resolutions, close attention should be given to the following:

- The title of the resolution should be brief and should appropriately reflect the action for which it calls
- 2. Information contained in the resolution should be checked for accuracy.
- The "resolved" must stand alone and not refer back to the "whereas" clause(s) since the HOD adopts only the "resolved" portion and the "whereas" clauses(s) do not appear in the Proceedings.
- 4. An estimated fiscal note should be added by the author when appropriate, and should set forth the estimated cost, if any, of the policy, program or action proposed by the resolution.
- 5. Resolutions asking for AMA action or policy may be submitted through the MSMS HOD to garner additional support of the Michigan Delegation to the AMA.
- 6. It is recommended that delegates contact their county societies, specialty societies and sections regarding their resolutions, as each may have a specific process prior to the resolution being submitted to MSMS.
