

o listen during the Christmas season. But what is the evidence, or is there any, that Jesus was born on Christmas day, and what kind of day is Christmas religiously?

Christmas is not mentioned anywhere in the Bible. If anything, Christmas is a tradition that came from the Roman practice of *Saturnalia*, a week long period of lawlessness in Rome that resulted in abuse (<u>The History</u> <u>of Christmas</u>). Since the last day oft his ritual came on December 25, it was adopted as a official tradition, especially of the catholic church. So when was Jesus born?

One source says that he was born in the fall or spring based on Zechariah's quotes in the Bible. Most of the Bible, if not all of it, never makes a case out of the date of Jesus' birth, but from these sources we can understand that he certainly was not born on December 25 (eliyah.com). So what is Christmas if it is not actually the day of Jesus birth?

Christmas, like Easter, is actually a pagan holiday that evolved into a Christian holiday. Much like Constantine over the years in Rome adopted Christian names for his pagan Gods and created the *universal or catholic church*, these other religions adopted pagan holidays and called them Christian.


This is not unusual, as the devil has been trying to destroy the purity ands dignity of the church since Jesus created it, but one would ask—should I stop celebrating Christmas?

It is really your choice. I do not see anything wrong with

participating in Christmas as long as you know its history and understand it as a chance to get people saved. Like I said earlier, Christmas is when most people have Christ on their minds and may be more interested in the gospel than at any other time of the year.

There are certain things you can do to make Christmas less of a pagan holiday and more of a day in a Christian's life. If your job is having a party with alcohol, it would be good testimony not to go. Just leave your cards and gifts to be handed out by someone else. That way you are a good testimony for Jesus.

When you distribute cards, always put a good four point gospel tract in with the card. When choosing gifts, select things that are a good testimony such as a skirt for a woman instead of a pair of pants. Use conversations you have at Christmas as a chance to discuss the gospel. These are some of the ways you can use the Christmas season to further the gospel and be a good testimony.
