### Love Makes Us Do It

A young girl was dying. Her only hope lay in a complete blood transfusion, but she had a very rare blood type. Only her brother, even younger than she, had the same type blood. His parents and doctors explained the situation to him, giving him time to ask questions. He agreed and, without delay, he was laid on a bed, the needle was pushed into his tiny vein, and slowly his blood seeped from his small body into the bag hanging from his bed. He lay quietly as the nurse stood next to him, ready to attend to any need he might have. "How do you feel?" she asked. "Ok," he answered, "but, Nurse, when do I die?"

What love this little boy had for his sister. What must he have thought when his own parents seemingly agreed, even asked him to sacrifice his life to save his sister's?

The boys' love for his sister can help us see how much Jesus loves us. Jesus suffered abuse, torture, persecution, and death for all of us. "Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). He demonstrated his tremendous love not because of our worthiness, but because he is a God of tremendous love. Jesus' love for his heavenly Father and for us changed the world. Through his death and resurrection from that death, we through faith have received the forgiveness of our sins and life eternal. God's love to us in Christ is that power that enables us to love him. "We love because he first loved us" (1 John 4:19).

The love of Jesus empowers us to be his stewards. Because of Jesus' love, we change from people giving to a need to people responding out of love. Certainly, we give to needs such as our church budget, Christian causes, and people, but our primary reason for giving is out of love and commitment to Jesus. When needs arise, Jesus opens our eyes and hearts so we can respond to those needs. However, our primary reason for giving is a desire to express our gratitude and thanksgiving for our Lord and the love that he shows us every day. Because our love for Jesus is our motivation for giving, our giving becomes joyful. Love changes our giving from an obligation to a privilege.

We live in difficult and changing times. How wonderful it is that, as Christians, we know that there is the certainty that Jesus always reaches out to us and loves us. May our lives and our giving genuinely reflect his love for us.

## Christian Education

In January and February, the Sunday school is focusing on stories of Jesus' healing miracles. Those miracles often caused folks to have an "epiphany" and realize that he was Emmanuel—God with us. February 12<sup>th</sup> is "Bring a Buddy" Sunday so we hope to see lots of new friends on that day. The most exciting day is February 19<sup>th</sup> on which the church celebrates the Transfiguration. It's the last Sunday before Lent begins so we'll have an ice cream party and also sing in church about our Big, Bold, Powerful God! If you're the parent of a child aged 3 through sixth grade, be sure to bring your child to Sunday school and church on February 19<sup>th</sup>. And EVE-RYONE should plan to be in church on the 19<sup>th</sup> to hear our kids sing.

Our confirmation students are exploring the Lord's prayer and getting ready to begin rehearsals for Stations of the Cross, which will be presented on Good Friday, April 7<sup>th</sup>. You won't want to miss that presentation, but before that you'll definitely want to attend the Ash Wednesday service on February 22<sup>nd</sup> at 7 p.m. Our youth will be taking leadership roles in that service.

I'm so thankful to be part of a church where our children and youth are a part of everything we do. They are not just the church of the future. They are the church of today!

# Graceful Generosity

#### Materialism

"Do not love the world or anything in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For everything in the world ... the cravings of sinful man, the lust of his eyes and the boasting of what he has and does ... comes not from the Father but from the world" (1 John 2:15-16).

Webster's Dictionary defines materialism as follows: "the tendency to be more concerned with material things than with spiritual goals or values." Based on this definition, there is no doubt that we live in a very materialistic society. Materialism involves greed, covetousness, and the love of money. It results in our envying others who have what we don't have. It causes us to dwell on money and possessions and is characterized by an extreme lack of contentment. Materialism leads us to spend money we don't have to buy things we don't need to impress people we don't even like.

#### **Testing your Knowledge of Scripture**

What parable could the following picture refer to?

If you said the The Parable of the Hidden Treasure, you were right! This two sentence parable, which is found in Matthew 13:44-45, reads as follows: "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field. When a man found it, he hit it again, and then in his joy went and sold all he had and bought that field." The man understood that what he had found in the field was of such great value that he was willing to give up all he had to gain it.

The parable does not imply that we can buy the kingdom of God with money, but teaches that, when Christ enters our lives, we willingly surrender our past lifestyles and loves and devote ourselves completely to Jesus.

#### On the Lighter Side

A minister was walking along the beach one day and stumbled upon a lamp. Picking it up and wiping if off caused the lamp to shake and smoke, and a genie came out. The genie thanked the minister for this new-found freedom after years of captivity and offered him one wish.

The minister immediately said, "I've always wanted to visit the Holy Land, but I am afraid of flying. I just can't bring myself to fly. And I get seasick thinking about boats. So could you build

a highway across the ocean so that I could drive to the Holy Land?"

#### **Disciples of the Cross**

In Ephesians 2:1, 4-5, the Apostle Paul writes, "As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins. But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ . . . " Before Christ, we were dead in sin. Through no effort of our own, we have been made alive "with Christ"!

Now what? Now what, indeed! Yes, Christ has saved us for eternity, but that eternity begins at Baptism. Some of us will spend only a short portion of eternity on earth, others much longer,

but all of us are called to make these days count. In the Great Commission in Matthew 28:19, Jesus calls us to "go and make disciples of all nations." He asks us, empowered by Word and Sacrament, to carry on his work.

There are many facets to the work of the church. Not all of us are preachers and teachers of the Word, but we read in 1 Peter 4:10 that each of us has a gift and each of us is to use this gift to serve others. Peter speaks of offering hospitality and serving as gifts which God has given to edify the church. The Apostle Paul writes about spiritual gifts to the Romans, the Corinthians, and the Ephesians, each time stressing the point that we are to use the gifts we've been given for the good of the Body of Christ and according to the grace we've been given.

Jesus said, anvone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me will find it. (Matthew 16:24-25). This is the challenge Jesus issues to each of us



individually and to the church collectively. Alive in Christ, we pick up the cross and, joyfully, just as Jesus, "Who for the joy set before him endured the cross" (Hebrews 12:2), carry it wherever Jesus leads us. There is no life apart from Christ. As disciples of the cross who have found this to be true, let us carry this message to the world.

ALTAR GUILD VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

Have you ever wondered about the drapes on the altar? What do the colors mean? What are the pieces for?

Who puts them there, anyway? What about the candles? There are many important pieces that make up our weekly worship at Augustus! The people who make sure everything is where it needs to be, that communion is available, and that the candles are ready to be lit are a group of volunteers called The Altar Guild.

These folks are well trained and serve usually one month each year—in pairs. It takes a few minutes each week to set things up, and you don't even have to be present for the church service to participate during these crazy times.
