

15th Sunday Ordinary Time Year C Luke 10:25-37



"There was a scholar of the law who stood up to test Jesus and said, "Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus said to him, "What is written in the law? How do you read it?" He said in reply, "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself." He replied to him, "You have answered correctly; do this and you will live." But because he wished to justify himself, he said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man fell victim to robbers as he went down from Jerusalem to Jericho. They stripped and beat him and went off leaving him half-dead. A priest happened to be going down that road, but when he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side. Likewise a Levite came to the place, and when he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side. But a Samaritan traveler who came upon him was moved with compassion at the sight. He approached the victim, poured oil and wine over his wounds and bandaged them. Then he lifted him up on his own animal, took him to an inn, and cared for him. The next day he took out two silver coinsmand gave them to the innkeeper with the instruction, 'Take care of him. If you spend more than what I have given you, I shall repay you on my way back.' Which of these three, in your opinion, was neighbor to the robbers' victim?" He answered, "The one who treated him with mercy." Jesus said to him. "Go and do likewise."

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Anthony & St Pius Families,

15th Sunday Ordinary Time

Year C Luke 10:25-37

Want a friend? Be a friend! Jesus teaches us today how to create good friends. Become the friend you wish to have! Jesus tells the familiar Good Samaritan parable. We don't always get the specific context for particular details of Jesus' teaching. Sometimes we just run into a record of Jesus' teaching, such as His lengthy Sermon on the Mount, but we don't hear much else about what happened just prior to Him delivering those words (like what current events are occurring in history, what He just saw, or what people just told Him that might have provoked Him to respond with a specific direction or interpretation of reality-like when Jesus tells the parable of Lazarus and Rich man right after the Pharisees who 'loved money over God' had insulted Jesus in Luke 16:14). But regarding today's parable of the Good Samaritan, we learn that Jesus tells the parable of the Good Samaritan as a specific answer to the Scholar of the Law's question "Who is my neighbor?" We even hear what motivated the scholar to ask for further explanation from Jesus, that 'he wished to justify himself' (Lk 10:29).

Scholars love details, they love to wear us out with conditional clauses, and wordy explanations about endless and specific distinctions. Jesus answers with the parable as a way of saying, basically, "A neighbor sees a need and meets it - no questions asked – if someone needs help, the good neighbor gets right to it!" The good neighbor looks past labels and stereotypes to see FIRST and most importantly: the human person-the human need—not the clothes that he/she is wearing, not the skin color, not the ethnicity, not the home address. But the fact that a human person needs help. The Good Neighbor doesn't demand an ID, before giving life-giving care or nourishing food to a suffering person. Labels don't apply. The only important thing is that there is a human need. If someone needs help, then deliver it. The Scholar of the Law has gotten so bogged down in specific details of the Law, that he has overlooked the obvious part of a 'human who is hurting and in need'. The scholar is ignoring the real needs of people lying right in front of him or living next door! Jesus is comparing the Scholar's fixation on fine legal details to the Priest and Levite in the parable who are so enmeshed in Temple Legislation (the Temple trains have to run on time, and in propping up the Temple, there is no place for the messy fats of real life!) They don't SEE a human person in desperate need!

But if detail is what scholars love (and Priest/Levites), Jesus knows how to apply details! He lays it on thick, multiple levels, detailing just how far the Samaritan goes to take care of the injured man (extreme kindness and generosity) Talk about over-the-top treatment! Jesus points out how the Good Samaritan responds with overwhelming love and compassion to the injured man. Keep in mind that the Levite and the Priest, arrogantly take the extra effort to walk to the other side of the road to avoid interacting with the suffering man ('I don't see that man over there bleeding out and hungry'). BUT, the Samaritan is moved instantly and responds with humane care. Notice the lengths to which the Samaritan goes to love and tend to the hurt man. One, he stops to look into his case. Two, he cleans up the man, tending his wounds, pouring his own wine and oil over the wounds. (there goes his evening cocktail, poured out as antiseptic, and the good dipping oil for his dinner bread now gone, used an ointment) Three, he bandages the wounds – which would mean ripping his good clothes into strips to create the proper medicinal coverings for the man's injuries. Four, he lifts the man up and onto his own animal – that means the Samaritan is now hoofing it himself walking alongside the animal! Five, he takes the man to an inn, and puts him up for a couple days, paying for his lodging out of his own pocket. And six, when the Samaritan has to leave, he gives a deposit for the innkeeper's future expenses and offering a promissory note, to return and settle any further costs the innkeeper may incur while the man recovers (adding to his future schedule, *open-endedly committing more time* to helping). The Samaritan does all of this service out of love, as Luke 10:33 tells us he was 'moved by compassion'! That's a good neighbor, that is a good friend! And Jesus demonstrates truly; good scholarship by focusing on the right detail, (not legalistic fine print, but humanistic felt principle). The dignity of every human person should be the center and motive for all our decisions. (Compare this emphasis of Jesus here with a similar passage in Matthew 23:23 where Jesus points out to the Pharisees how they misapply their attention, underlining all the wrong things in the law!) Jesus lays out the details of what true friendship and true neighborliness means, and invites the scholar to go back to school to learn what it means to 'love others as oneself'!
