## BURNING ON YOUR OWN PROPERTY

If you plan to do yard waste burning on your property you **must** get a burn permit beforehand from Benton County. (If you don't and a fire truck comes out because someone reports smoke at your property, you will be charged for the fire service call.) Call **Benton County at 479-273-5530.** Burn Ban info can be found on our website: www.lbvca.com. (Burning of construction materials is prohibited.) *Do not leave smoldering fires unattended!* 

#### **CLEANING UP YOUR PROPERTY:**

**Please remember:** Be a good neighbor and rake out leaves and tree debris from your ditches and culverts to prevent water run-off problems, and either burn them or haul them away. If you hire someone to rake leaves or clear other yard waste from your property be sure to tell them to NOT push it into a ditch or culvert or into the street. The property owner can bring them to the Village collection site on Arabian Drive or take it to Inland Waste Service (479-878-1384) for disposal. You will be charged a clean-up fee if LBVCA has to clean out your ditch.

**INJURED OR DEAD ANIMALS**: To report an injured or dead animal (deer, raccoon, etc.) and have it removed from a <u>state</u> culvert or <u>state</u> road, contact the **Arkansas Game & Fish Department** at 1-866-253-2506. (They'll need the street address of where the animal is located.) If you find a dead animal or deer parts on your property (left behind by hunters or coyotes), you may bury them but <u>NOT</u> burn them (according to the AR Dept. of Environmental Quality).

The Benton County Roads Dept. and Sheriff's Dept. state they have no program in place for picking up dead deer from county roads or culverts. If the animal is lying in a culvert, notify the AR Dept of Environmental Quality at 1-888-233-0326.

#### VILLAGE ROADS:

**Green** and **Blue** street signs in the village are county roads. If you live on a road with potholes or ruts, **call Benton County Roads (479-271-1052)** to have it repaired. You do not need to call the Village Office or wait for a Board meeting to report it.

**SPEED LIMIT & PARKING in LBV:** The speed limit throughout the Village is **20 or 25mph** and is enforceable by the Benton County Sheriff's dept. *There is <u>no</u> onstreet parking throughout LBV.*

LBVCA financials continue to look good for 2020. On the income side, LBV assessment income is holding +2% ahead of budget, while total income is -1% behind budget for the year. The board continues to focus on thoughtful spending and selectively investing back into LBV amenities. The board is maintaining that mindset as we budget for 2021.

In the last newsletter I went over some of the facts about how our airport is represented on the charts that pilots use for navigation. This time, I'll go deeper into the "(Pvt)" that indicates that the airport is privately owned vs. owned by a municipality or public entity or the government. Again, I'm not a lawyer, and nothing I say should be construed as legal advice. From the pilot's perspective, "(Pvt)" simply means that you need permission from the owner/operator to land but does not specify how permission is to be obtained or what form it should take. LBV has a "Portal Amenities Policy" document which describes in detail the circumstances under which non-members may use the airstrip. As a practical matter, the relevant information from that document is summarized in a FAQ on the lbvca.com website. I occasionally get phone calls from pilots interested in landing, in which case I ask the relevant questions and give a yes or no answer. Nevertheless, "permission" in our case consists of having met the criteria rather than having communicated with anyone in advance. The FAA does not specifically enforce the permission requirement that I can tell. Any enforcement action would be a civil trespassing charge. FAA control over airport operations generally exists when the airport accepts government money for improvements, which is not our situation.

## Did you know?

**Jingle Bells" was written for Thanksgiving, not Christmas.** The song was written in 1857 by James Lord Pierpont and published under the title "One Horse Open Sleigh". It was supposed to be played in the composer's Sunday school class during Thanksgiving as a way to commemorate the famed Medford sleigh races. "Jingle Bells" was also the first song to be broadcast from space.

In Germany, Poland, and Ukraine, finding a spider or a spider's web on a Christmas tree is believed to be a harbinger of good luck. Architectural Control Committee BUILDING PROJECT GUIDELINES By John Niernberger, Chairman

The Architectural Control Committee (ACC) has been actively meeting with landowner and homeowner applicants to discuss, approve and monitor building projects. In the last two months, there have been three deck additions, one storage shed, and one metal shop building permitted and approved.

As the cooler fall weather forces more people indoors, the numbers indicate that the corona-virus continues its' relentless rampage, now affecting rural communities more so. Even though we don't see many cases here in our near vicinity, most likely due to our diligence; it is not a time to become lax in our efforts.

A huge THANK YOU goes out to all the brave folks still working within the medical, police, fire, teachers, restaurant, truck-drivers, grocery and retail ranks keeping the wheels of our society turning, in anticipation of a vaccine coming soon.

Our next meeting is scheduled Monday December 7<sup>th</sup>, at 4 PM, in the lower level Community Hall below the office, practicing social distancing protocols; mask wearing is mandatory.

Also, should any of you wish to become a Committee member, please contact the office. One of our long-time members has retired after a couple decades or so of faithful service to the Lost Bridge Village Community in many fashions.

For those who are thinking of starting a construction project, or those in the throes of one and unsure what the next step is, see below:

The Guidelines/Procedures for Building Applications are as follow:

Property owner submits proposed building plan application to LBVCA ACC, whom reviews these plans for <u>Covenant</u> <u>Compliance</u>, and then approves/denies applications using Building Standards & Practices as a guide. Building Project Checklist is completed by property owner, and appropriate fees and performance deposits are collected.

Benton County Development (Building Safety Division) will only issue appropriate Building Permits after receiving application approval from LBVCA ACC.

After project is completed, ACC follows up and reviews/approves/denies for <u>Covenant Complianc</u>e. When the CO (Certificate Of Occupancy) is issued by a Benton County Building Inspector, and final approval is then obtained from the ACC, the property owner may then apply to the ACC for a refund of their Performance Deposit.
