Great Notes From Our Point Leaders:

We work in the Communications unit and provide communications to all users on the installation. Nearly none of the lower ranked Airmen have vehicles and are limited to shopping at the small Base Exchange and Commissary or taking a taxi to a shopping center off base and paying higher prices for items.... For many Airmen, this is their first base and first time being separated from family and the downside to being away from home are some of the essentials, snacks, quick eats, coffee. Board games and books are okay to send as well for those in the unit who like to read and play games to pass the time. The weather is already getting cooler so cold weather gear (thick socks, gloves, fleeces) will be a challenge. These are at the expense of each member which depending on quality, cost can be high for those members who survive paycheck to paycheck.... Hours are long and sometimes include the weekends; duties are indoors/outdoors. As a leader, I will always hand out care packages to my unit and disseminate them fairly. I am doing this for the morale of my Airmen. My morale increases simply by seeing my Airmens' morale at a high level. I also think care packages are more important now because all MWR's, USO's and gyms are closed or semi-closed due to the Coronavirus pan. — L Adams

We are a small shop on a small FOB in the desert. Days are HOT! We split our time inside and outside. We work 7 days a week at a minimum of 12hr shifts. Most of us are just missing home comfort. We don't have a lot to do here and our enter-tainment is very limited — H Avrianna

Living conditions are below standard. No running water or plumbing. Limited hot food availability. Austere environment. Sometimes electricity is available. — R Botashoff

We are a unit of over 125 service members of varying degrees of experience and acclimatization. We are at an altitude of approximately 7,000 ft, and subject to temperatures ranging from approximately 105 F to below 0 F. We have no organic Post Exchange, and rely entirely on mail. Our mail reception capability is severely degraded due to COVID-19, and the local economy is entirely off-limits. Our dining facility is limited on supplies. We are low on basic hygiene supplies, cold weather equipment, snack food, entertainment (board games, movies, etc.), and tactical equipment (eye protection, gloves, hand warmers, cold weather socks etc.) Thank you for your support; any contribution would really help morale. — C Johnson
