

MAJ Threatt serves as the Executive Director for U.S.VETS Long Beach. Her duties included managing an 8-million-dollar budget and programs that provide daily support and housing for over 800 veterans on the 27-acre campus. She advocates for veteran housing, sits on the Long Beach Mayor's Homeless Task force, LINC Housing Board, V.A. Southern California Institute of Research and Education Board, Board member of the Long Beach Continuum of Care, Long Beach Rotary and others. MAJ Threatt vacates her position with U.S.VETS this summer to serve veterans at the Community College level.

In 2001, MAJ Threatt's patriotic passions led her to design of the 911 memorial license plate dedicated to the memory of the those who perished on that fateful day. Approved by Governor Davis, confirmed by the California State Assembly, the Highway Patrol and the Department of Motor Vehicles, the 911 plate became a reality in 2002. CH Threatt was awarded a special plate for her vehicle, 'MY IDYA' for *her idea*. The plate has generated millions of dollars in support of anti-terrorism in California.

MAJ Threatt is a commissioned officer (Chaplain) in the California State Guard, a Division of the California Army National Guard. MAJ Threatt is trained in Military Emergency Management, crisis intervention, and all areas of military protocol. Her duties include counseling soldiers and military families, suicide prevention, casualty notifications, crisis response, soldier readiness, chapel services, funerals and marriages among other duties. She serves as the Chaplain for the 224TH Sustainment Brigade, Long Beach.
