Dear friends,

I've been asked a couple of times now over the last year why I don't include more comments about recent events in my sermons. So I thought I would use this space to explain myself a little so you know what to expect from me.

It was back in 1966 that preacher, teacher, and theologian Karl Barth (1886-1968) wrote in *Time* magazine that a preacher should, "Take your Bible and take your newspaper, and read both. But interpret newspapers from your Bible." A form of this quote was at the center of my formal education in seminary, that we should write our sermons with the Bible in one hand and the newspaper in the other. Of course, the image of the newspaper is a little outdated, but the idea still holds, that the preacher should keep attuned to what is going on in the world. Pastors like me live in the world just as much as you, even when my daily work is mostly ensconced in the walls of the church. But I still live in a community with neighbors, and I participate in civic life like everyone does (or should).

Yet, I don't always bring these social situations to the front of my sermons. And I have reasons for that. First of all, you did not hire me to be a political commentator. You called me to be your pastor and proclaimer of God's love through Jesus. So when I write my sermons, my first priority is always to point to Jesus. Any social situation may or may not have reference to the scripture readings of the day or to the particular message I try to speak that morning.

Other times, I find myself getting in the way of speaking to recent events. Even though I try to keep informed, sometimes I do not know enough about a given situation to speak clearly enough. Other situations produce a stronger emotional reaction within me that I feel would overshadow the message of Jesus. And, to be honest, sometimes I think that my comments about political events would not be welcomed. I've put myself into too many uncomfortable situations too many times previously to blithely walk into that again.

I also come to my position and opportunity of writing sermons with the realization that, within my lifetime, all social events have become "political," that colloquial term for different expected responses, reactions, and retaliations based on political beliefs and party choice. Since my political beliefs do not coincide with either of the major political parties, my reactions rarely fit nicely into the political expectations. With the polarization of political parties and their reactions to social events, a monologue (like a sermon) rarely, if ever, elicits constructive results. Instead, it tends to further polarize and eliminate the conversation that needs to happen to appropriately respond to some of the things going on in our world.

I also trust you as fellow followers of Jesus to draw your own connections between following Jesus and living in the world. Many of you have been involved in the adventure that is life for a lot longer than I have. Many of you have had more and different experiences than I have. I do not feel that I am an expert on how to interpret the world or faith. In fact, I look forward to learning from you as much as I hope you learn from me. After all, both faith and civic life are only accomplished in community.

So with all of these pieces, I exercise caution when commenting on societal events in sermons and in worship. I want to make our congregation a welcoming place for all people who come to hear of God's great love for us.

Luckily, my words are not the only opportunity to share with each other. When you want your church family to join in your sorrows or joys, you are invited to share them out loud or in your hearts during the prayers of intercession. When you want to share more with your friends here, you are invited to bring your concerns during the announcement time. And when you want to talk with me and others, sitting around tables with cups and snacks during coffee hour is a great time to have conversations. We can also go more in-depth conversations during Bible Study for us OWLs. And, of course, you can have time with me one-on-one or in small groups.

I believe that the church could be, and really should be, the place where people with different political and social views, theories, and ideas can be together with a focus of learning from each other and working together to generate more and better solutions for the problems of the world. From our gatherings and services like worship, Bible study, and projects, we make Jesus's love for the world a reality. I try not to jeopardize that by misusing time, place, and words to make others feel uncomfortable or unheard. Instead, I want to be an open and affirming community of Jesus-followers who seek out his will in all things.

This movement resulted in a split in Western Christianity and the formation of diverse Protestant denominations.
