When: Saturday, February 18, 2006 from 6-10pm


Where: Ardovino's Desert Crossing


Costs: \$18.00 per person (includes one entree, all sides, and gratuity); there will be a no-host bar.

AT FEATHER LAKE

To prevent overloading of its existing system as east El Paso grows, El Paso Water Utilities is planning a new wastewater interceptor line in the Feather Lake vicinity. One 300-foot section of 36"-diameter pipe is currently proposed to be within the Feather Lake property. Originally, the proposed alignment avoided our sanctuary entirely, but problems obtaining an easement from one landowner on North Loop caused the engineers designing the project to look at an alternate alignment within our sanctuary.

The 300-foot segment would be 16 feet south of the fence along North Loop, in the area along the trail between the lake inlet and the east property fence. If installed by digging an open trench, the work would disturb an area approximately 30 feet wide, with all vegetation removed. We first learned of this planned alignment in November, when Brown and Caldwell, the engineering firm managing the project, asked us for input on measures to reduce impacts.

We are working with Brown and Caldwell on ways to minimize impacts to the sanctuary. Our first preference would be an alignment outside the Feather Lake property. Another option would be to bore the pipe in place rather than dig an open trench. Current plans call for construction in Spring 2007. We'll update you as the planning moves forward.

Many thanks go to the participants in our bimonthly workdays at the lake in 2005: Eddie Chew, Jane Fowler, Edgar Sandoval and John Sproul. Thanks also go to the City of El Paso Street Department for repairing a break in the fence at the back of the sanctuary.

Feather Lake went dry in mid-December, and we now have it closed until water returns. But don't let a little lack of water keep you from visiting on Sat., March 26, the date of our next workday. Join us at 2 p.m. to help

with habitat management at our sanctuary. Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave.

RIO BOSQUE WETLANDS PARK


UTEP offers free walking tours twice each month and also holds monthly community workdays at Rio Bosque Wetlands Park, 4 miles from Feather Lake.

WANTED: Keystone Site-'New' Bird Species Sightings REWARD: \$15/ first sighting!

With the Keystone site's bird checklist now at 189 species, I wanted to try to add an incentive to get some more birders to go out and help add some new species to the list!

For each new species that is observed by someone else, for the list to reach the 200 species level, I will donate \$15 in cash &/or birding equipment (they don't have any optics or field guides for visitors/volunteer use) to Keystone Heritage Park, Inc. [KHP].

'Proof of Sightings' can be discussed with me, on a case by case basis.

The bird's listed below are some of the more likely species that <u>may</u> be found at the site, but there are other less likely or more difficult to identify species, as well (review the site's checklist on the KHP or EP/T-P Audubon websites, to determine which additional species have not been seen at the site).

Hopefully this 'incentive' to help the Keystone group, will spur you to visit Keystone more frequently and help to 'build-up' the bird checklist!





CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

This years Hueco Tanks Count was held on 17 Dec and we had 7 counters. A Great Blue Heron and

Common Mergansers were recorded for the first time. Species with total birds above average were Gambel's Quail, Rock Pigeon, White Wing Dove,

Inca Dove, Burrowing Owl and Lesser Goldfinches. Below average counts occurred with Northern Harrier, Horned Lark, Cactus Wren, Rock Wren, Canyon Towhee, Brewers Sparrow, and House Finch. The 57 species and 2361 total birds were about average.
