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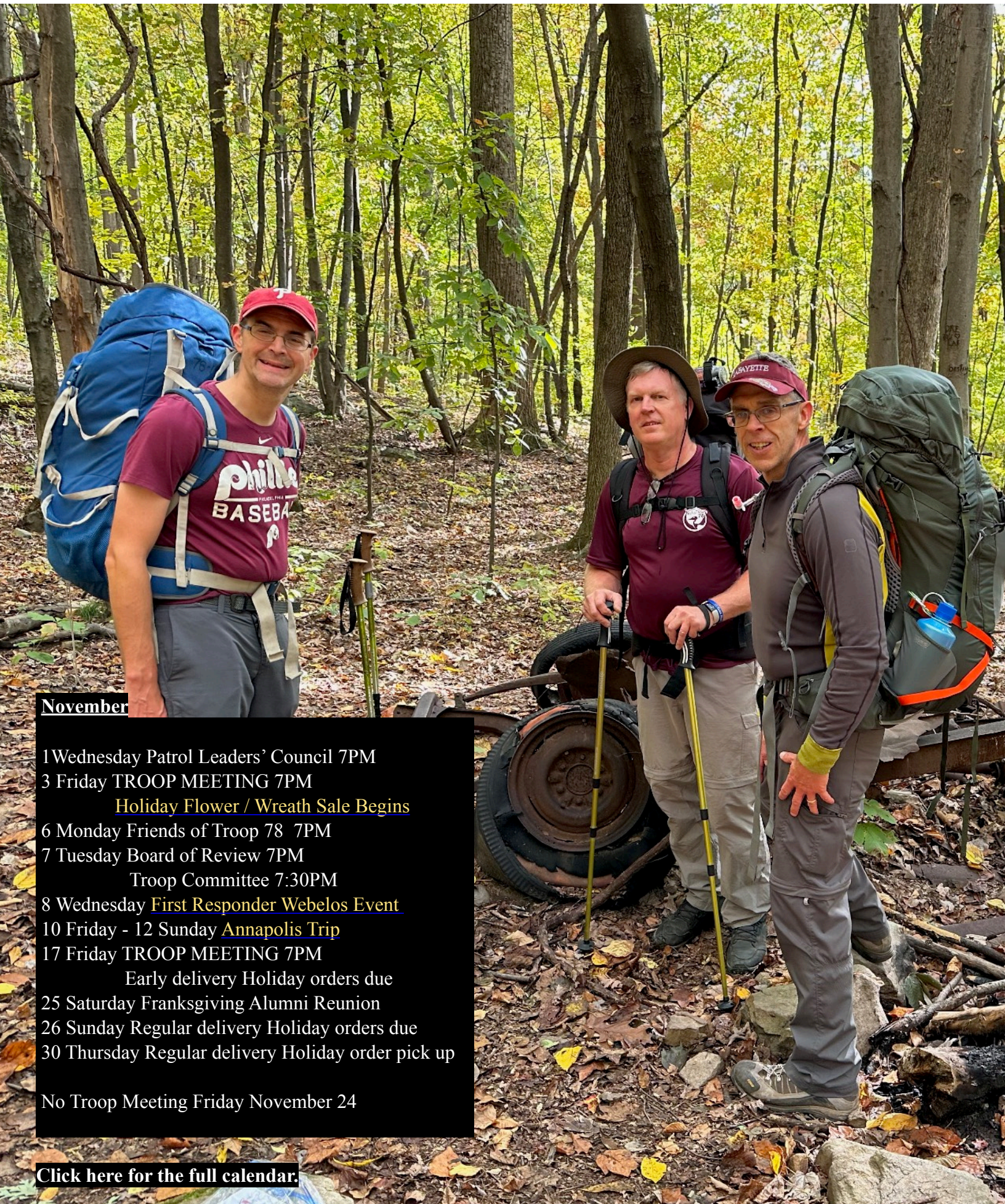

Appalachian Trail

Carlisle, Pennsylvania

Friday October 20 - Sunday October 22, 2023

What Does Active Participation Mean? Is Your Scout Active?

Understanding the expectations of any institution, group, place of employment, place of worship, neighborhood, or school is key to be able to be successful and have meaningful membership within that group. Scouting and Troop 78 makes it pretty easy to know what to expect with an adherence to the Scout Oath and Law, in addition to an active, well-published calendar of meetings, trips, and events; all within a well-oiled but ever-evolving program. BSA also mandates that individual units set the parameters and definition of what “active in your troop” means. Traditionally that has been set at 50% of participation. However, the pandemic years also meant we changed and modified what active participation meant - and for some very understandable reasons at that time. However, at the end of last season, the Troop Committee voted to return and reiterate what the formal definition of Active Participation means for our scouts. Simply defined, it means a minimum attendance of 50% at all meetings AND 50% of all trips are required for a Scout to be considered active. If your Scout received a score below a 50% in math for the marking period, chances are, you and your Scout would not be very happy. Thus, the 50% threshold is considered both fair and achievable; while leaving room for other family, religious, school, and other obligations. Our Troop calendar is produced very early in the season and will only ever get slight modifications along the way, allowing for scouts and their families sufficient ability to plan ahead for the Troop’s events.

The only requirements of 100% participation that our troop has are 1) participation in every fundraiser and 2) our big day of service at Radnor Races (which, this year, is on May 18th). One of the reasons for these requirements is our legacy of service to our community with Radnor Races, where much of the day’s proceeds goes towards open space preservation in our region, as well as that day also assisting with our Troop’s funding. Something that many families don’t realize is that out of the dues you pay to Troop 78 for your Scout’s membership, exactly \$0 goes to the Troop itself. That is right, 100% of those fees go to Council and National exclusively. Thus, our program exists solely from funding from our charter organization, donations, and fundraisers. Your Scout pays very little to nothing for our trips (this year being a slight exception where skiing and whitewater rafting will both have fees but be heavily subsidized for scouts, and scholarships and their own camping accounts are available to help). It is important to know that Troop 78 also implemented one of the first fundraising programs of its kind in Chester County, where scouts participating get some funds of their own to help subsidize their own camping (like the trips just mentioned) and of course, summer camp. This is all why fundraising is so important.

It is important to attend trips, and certainly while I am biased (as I take the lead on planning and managing those “in season” trips for the Troop), they are also always the most notable experiences of our scouts. We know this based on the feedback we receive after our scouts ‘age out’ of the program, and as you will hear in many of the boys’ own presentations at family nights, courts of honor, and Eagle Award ceremonies. Most of **Scouting** is Outing, and the leadership, life skills, fun, adventure, and challenges of our trips are a large part of our program and legacy. No Troop in Chester County will do as much outdoors as we do, and we are proud of that. It is one of the key features of our program and our success.

And yes, a requirement of rank advancement for Star, Life and Eagle is for the scout to “Be Active in your Troop” for a set amount of time, and this 50% participation definition for trips AND

meetings is what is and will continue to be used. However, it's important to remember that; in order for all Scouts to really get the most of our program and to be in sync with their patrols and each other, it's the proper threshold needed to achieve success.

We hope you will support your scout's full participation with our program, encouraging him to come on nearly every trip, and attend most every meeting (even when it's cold outside), while remembering that no family with a scout in our troop should ever let cost be a factor in your scout's participation. Families may reach out to the Scoutmaster (or for in season trips, myself) and be assured they will get the help they need to support their Scout in a completely confidential matter for all Troop activities and membership.

Being active in Troop 78 can be one of the most meaningful experiences of your child's life, and I know I have a lot of company within the Troop Committee when I say thank you for supporting our Troop and your Scout's involvement in our program. I know that all of us within the program, especially the youth leadership, will do the very best to support your Scout within the tenants of Scouting and our legacy of over 90 years of service to the youth of Chester County.
