



INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY SERVICES



To ensure that students have internet access during the global pandemic, the city of Phoenix has expanded its Wi-Fi coverage outside of nearly 50 libraries, community, senior, and recreation centers. Residents and students can now sit in parking lots and public areas outside of participating facilities to connect their devices daily from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. and participate in distant learning and online education.

How to Connect Your Device

This public information page provides the names and locations of participating city-owned facilities and FAQs to help bridge the digital divide. Wi-Fi users may walk up to connect outside of the city building, while others may drive into the parking to connect from their car. The Wi-Fi signal is strongest closer to the building. To use this service, you need a wireless device such as a laptop computer, smart phone, or tablet. Connection steps may vary by device. Generally, users should locate the network and internet setting on the device.

When searching for the available city Wi-Fi network, look for PHXCITYWIFI and connect to it. Open a browser and enter any URL to access and accept the user agreement. There is no password required. When connecting at a Phoenix Public Library location, use one of these corresponding network names:

- Burton Barr: library-free-wifi
- Cesar Chavez, Cholla, Ironwood, Juniper, Mesquite, Palo Verde, Saguaro: library2-free-wifi
- Acacia, Agave, Desert Broom, Desert Sage: library3-free-wifi
- Century, Harmon, Ocotillo, Yucca: library4-free-wifi When connecting to all other locations, use: PHXCITYWIFI

- 4. To speak at the meeting, click on Register to Speak on the agenda item(s) you want to speak on
- 5. On the day and time of the meeting, go to phoenix gov and click on City Council Meetings
- Open the agenda for the meeting and find the weblink at the top of the agenda (only persons that registered to speak will be called upon to speak during the meeting)

Make Safe Donations to Help Your Community This Holiday Season



During the Maricopa County Combined Charitable Campaign, MCAO employees joined other county departments and helped raise \$188,517 to support 67 charitable organizations throughout the valley. The Combined Charitable Campaign supports organizations that help youth, provide resources to those transitioning from jail back to communities, help reduce homelessness and hunger, and support veterans' needs. For Maricopa County employees, giving back to those in need comes as naturally as their daily work. However, to make your donation count, it's essential to do research and pay attention to avoid a scam. Here are some tips and questions to ask before you share any personal or financial information.

- Verify that the organization is legitimate by checking the <u>Better Business</u>
 <u>Bureau Wise Giving Alliance</u>. Take note of any complaints or negative
 reviews
- Research the organization and find out exactly how much of your donation
 goes directly to the services or resources you want to help. Fundraising
 and operational costs can leave behind little to support programs. Ask
 about what options are available, ensuring your donation does the most
 good.
- Don't let a caller or fundraising campaign pressure you into donating. Take your time to learn more. Not all calls asking for donations come from charities. Find out by reviewing the <u>IRS's Tax Exempt Organization</u> list
- Be wary of crowdfunding campaigns promoted through social media that
 make it difficult to know where the money is going. Limit these donations
 to people or groups you know and trust personally.
- Always pay with a credit card or check and ask for a receipt. Paying with cash, a wire transfer, or gift card leaves you vulnerable to losing your money to a scam.

At a time when there are so many in need, donating can make a significant difference in someone's life, but doing so shouldn't put your personal information or finances at risk. Share these tips with your family and friends and encourage them to support their communities this holiday season.

Maricopa County Announces Results of COVID-19 Antibody Project

"Serosurvey" estimates that approximately one in 10 Maricopa County residents have been infected with COVID-19

PHOENIX (November 16, 2020) — Results from a serosurvey conducted across Maricopa County show that an estimated 10.7% of residents have detectable antibodies for COVID-19. This means that approximately 470,000 people in Maricopa County likely have been infected with the virus since the pandemic began.

The 11-day study, conducted in mid-September by Maricopa County Department of Public Health (MCDPH) in partnership with Arizona State University (ASU) and Mayo Clinic, collected specimens from 260 participants in 169 households randomly selected from across the county to test for antibodies for the virus that causes COVID-19.

MCDPH and ASU worked with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to implement a method that samples a small number of households in randomly selected communities that, when combined, represent all of Maricopa County. The CDC gave MCDPH and ASU a list of 29 communities that are representative of the entire county.

Key findings from the serosurvey include:

- For every case reported to Public Health, there were three to four cases that were not reported up to mid-September when the serosurvey was conducted.
- The number of true infections is likely far higher than the number of people who are being tested for COVID-19.
- There was a higher seroprevalence within households than across individuals, which supports evidence that infections cluster within households.

Marcy Flanagan, executive director of MCDPH, said there are several key takeaways from the survey.

"We know that sustained close contact drives the majority of infections. The serosurvey findings emphasize the importance of separating household members once someone is diagnosed with COVID-19 and in isolation at home."

She said the percentage of Maricopa County population with antibodies—11%—is far less than is needed to reach herd immunity, which is the point at which the virus cannot spread effectively. This emphasizes the need for mitigation efforts as well as getting the COVID-19 vaccine when it becomes available.

"We estimate that somewhere between 40% and 80% of the population would need to be vaccinated with the COVID-19 vaccine to reach herd immunity," said Flanagan. "It's critical that we all wear face masks correctly and consistently, physically distance from others, wash our hands and avoid large groups of people to help slow the spread of COVID-19."

As testing protocols and accessibility have developed greatly during the course of the pandemic, Flanagan also urges anyone who experiences COVID-like symptoms to get tested and, if positive, to take necessary precautions to stop the spread. ADOR Seeking Military Personnel Owed Unclaimed Property

The Arizona Department of Revenue's (ADOR) Unclaimed Property program is searching for members of the U.S. military who have unclaimed funds in their names from when they were stationed in Arizona.

The agency has identified more than 14,000 military personnel with last known Arizona addresses from Camp Navajo Army Base, Fort Huachuca Army Base, Luke Air Force Base, Tucson's Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Yuma Proving Ground Army Base, and Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Yuma.

Some dating back over 30 years, these properties total \$7 million, with the largest property due to a single owner being \$136,217.

Currently, military members with large properties will receive a notice with the goal the property owner or family member will contact ADOR's Unclaimed Property Unit.

Unclaimed property generally consists of money due to an individual from sources like old bank accounts, uncashed payroll checks, tax refunds, credit balances, rebates, returned deposits, and dormant safe deposit boxes. Often, the company holding the funds has an outdated or the wrong forwarding address for the customer, and in some cases, a person passes away with no family members aware of the assets. Most accounts are turned over to the state after several years of inactivity.

ADOR returns the property to owners who provide documentation showing their right to claim the assets. Claimants must include a valid photo ID and documentation linking them to the owner's last known address with their <u>claim form</u>. Claimants must also provide documentation demonstrating a legal right to claim any property listed in another name.

Every year, the ADOR Unclaimed Property program returns millions of dollars to claimants, including \$42.5 million in 2019-2020. In the past three fiscal years, about \$155 million has been returned to individuals and businesses.

BINGO & RAFFLES: DO YOU KNOW WHAT'S LEGAL?

PHOENIX – In several states across the country, individuals may see forms of gambling being offered online. However, in the State of Arizona, all forms of online gambling are illegal. That said, other forms of gambling in the State are legal, including bingo and raffles. Both provide legal methods for charitable organizations to raise funds, though there are different restrictions and requirements that organizations need to follow if they want to host a bingo or raffle event legally.

Bingo

Bingo is legal in the State of Arizona, both for recreational purposes or to allow certain types of nonprofit organizations to generate funds to support their activities. To legally host a bingo event, an organization must be licensed by the Arizona Department of Revenue (ADOR). Additionally, there are specific bingo rules that have to be followed when conducting a bingo game. Questions? Raffles

While ADOR regulates bingo, no state agency regulates raffles. Raffles in Arizona can only be conducted by an organization that has qualified for an exemption from taxation of income under section 501 of the internal revenue code and has been continuously in existence for a five-year period immediately before conducting a raffle. Additionally, raffles should be registered with the Attorney General's office.

There are also a few other rules and requirements relating to the management, sales and operation of a raffle that a charitable organization needs to follow to conduct a raffle in Arizona legally. Technology, training help ADOT keep roads safe during winter

Know Snow by reviewing, practicing safety tips

When snow begins to fall, trained Arizona Department of Transportation snowplow operators will work around the clock to keep the roads safe. Ever-evolving technology incorporated into the snowplows help give the operators a leg up during their 12-hour shifts.

This year, 25 of ADOT's snowplows have been equipped with new cameras that can stream a live feed back to district offices. These new cameras are another technological innovation to help ADOT be more aware of road conditions along different stretches of highway. They will help decision makers like district engineers and maintenance superintendents be able to see what the plow drivers are seeing.

ADOT districts will be able to see what conditions are like in neighboring districts and make plans to get a jump on snowplow deployment.

Many of ADOT's nearly 200 snowplows also include auxiliary cab heaters to keep drivers warm while not idling and wasting fuel; heated windshields to prevent wipers from freezing and getting stuck; backup cameras and a camera and laser guidance system to help guide operators; state-of-the-art lighting packages, and front flex plows that can bend in different configurations to remove snow.

ADOT's 400 snowplow drivers undergo extensive training so they can keep state highways safe. Now that we're in the season for winter storms to potentially hit, it's time for you to get to Know Snow by reviewing ADOT's safety tips at azdot.gov/KnowSnow.

starters. slow down when roads are slick with snow and ice, leaving extra behind room the vehicle ahead. Take a charged fully cell phone, warm clothing and an emergency kit that includes blankets, food and water,



medication and sand or kitty litter.

Check your vehicle before heading out in winter weather, making sure – at a minimum – that the tires, heater and windshield wipers are in good shape.

Before traveling, research weather conditions to determine whether it would be smarter to sit out a storm so ADOT's snowplows can clear highways. While ADOT's snowplow operators are ready to help you, you should help them in return. Always respect the plow. Avoid passing a snowplow that's clearing a highway until the driver pulls over to let traffic pass, and never assume a snowplow operator knows your vehicle is nearby. If you can't see the plow driver, there's a good chance the driver can't see you.

Remember: The safest place on a highway when it's snowing is trailing a safe distance behind a snowplow.

CRIME TIPS:

OPEN ENROLLMENT MEANS OPEN SEASON FOR MEDICARE SCAMMERS

It's Medicare open enrollment season, and that means Medicare is top of mind for many of us. And, as they so often do, scammers are looking to get in on the action for their own benefit. Here are a few examples of common Medicare scams.

HOW IT WORKS:

You receive a call or home visit from a home health care agency offering to sign you up for services that Medicare will pay for.

You get a call or respond to an ad offering state-of-the-art braces to relieve joint pain that Medicare will pay for.

You get a call claiming that Medicare is sending out new "chipenabled" Medicare cards.

You get a call about a special "deal" on a new Medicare plan during open enrollment. It may come with a free gift or limited-time offer.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Anytime you see an ad or get a call offering you something for "free" from Medicare, it is a scam. Home health services and medical equipment are only covered by Medicare under a doctor's prescription. These are attempts at getting you to share your Medicare number so that criminals can bill thousands of dollars in fake claims to Medicare.

Medicare is sticking with the current paper card and is not sending out chip-enabled cards. It's simply a ploy to get you to share your Medicare number or other sensitive information. <u>Learn more about</u> this new scam.

By law, legitimate Medicare insurance providers will contact you only if you have previously requested information.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Do not accept "free" products or services in exchange for your Medicare number.

Hang up on anyone calling and claiming you need a chip-enabled Medicare card.

If someone calls with a "sounds too good to be true" Medicare Advantage offer, hang up and call the company back directly at a phone number you can independently verify.

VETERANS REMAIN PRIME TARGETS FOR SCAMMERS

While veterans and non-veterans alike are targeted by scammers, an AARP study found that veterans are twice as likely to lose money to fraud schemes. And during our ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, it comes as no surprise that scam artists are, as always, looking to line their own pockets. As Americans honor those who have served their country on Veterans Day, scammers go to great lengths to target their money and their benefits.

HOW IT WORKS:

Targeting veterans can take many forms. These include:

Coronavirus (COVID-19) scams: Scammers call claiming to be from the VA or Tricare with offers of a COVID testing kit in exchange for your personal or financial information. They may also claim to have early access to a vaccine or treatment, again, in exchange for that information.

The cash for benefits scheme: Predatory lenders target veterans in need of money by offering cash in exchange for future disability or pension payments.

Charity scams: A caller claims to be raising money for disabled veterans or veterans with cancer or, more recently, COVID-19.

Employment scams: Con artists post bogus job offers to recruit veterans on various online job boards.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

There is no vaccine yet for COVID-19. And, you won't first hear about a legitimate treatment or cure for COVID-19 by a phone call, so don't engage. The caller is trying to steal your money or your identity.

Be wary of offers to veterans for upfront cash in exchange for future disability or pension payments. The policies typically are worth only a fraction of the stated value of the benefit.

Scammers pull on our heart strings to convince us to donate to a cause we care deeply about. This is especially true for the men and women who have served our country.

Veterans and military spouses lose more money to employment scams than the general population because scammers see them as hot targets.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

The VA may check in with you by phone, email or text, but if you aren't sure the contact is legitimate, verify by calling the VA at 1-800-827-1000.

Only work with VA-accredited representatives when dealing with VA benefits. You can search for them online at the VA Office of General Counsel website.

Check out charities through websites such as give.org or charitynavigator.org before donating to a cause.

It's a scam if you have to pay upfront to get the job, supply payment information or pay for your personal military records, or if the ad refers to "previously undisclosed" federal jobs.

Help Stop Illegal Dumping into the Sewer System

Dumping oil, fuel and solvents into the sewer harms the environment and can cause severe damage to your neighborhood. Illegal sewer dumping has become an increasingly large problem in Phoenix. Wrongdoers dump later at night or during low traffic times. When someone illegally disposes of waste, the wastewater treatment plant may not be able to treat the water adequately leading to the discharge of solvents, fuels, and oils that can inhibit or kill the microorganisms. These organisms are vital part of breaking down organic matter in the treatment process.

It can also cause permit exceedances that can lead to the City of Phoenix to be fined by Arizona Department of Environmental Quality or the Environmental Protection Agency costs that could be passed down to residents. It affects everyone including the safety of workers. The sewer is not just a series of pipes. There are manholes, metering stations and sampling vaults that require employees to work in as confined space entrants. Fumes from fuels or solvents dumped in the sewer can be harmful to employees.

Wastewater treatment plants expend a lot more time, energy (electricity), and chemicals to treat wastewater containing fuel, oil, and solvents. The additional time needed to clean and treat illegally dumped substances is costly and can affect future costs for all residents. All fuels, solvents and oils must be recycled or hauled off and disposed of by a licensed waste hauling company.

PARKS AND RECREATION

The Phoenix Parks and Recreation Department will lift its annual ban of open fires in the city's desert parks and mountain preserves on Tuesday, Dec. 1. Typically lifted during the month of October, the ban was extended this year due to the unseasonably warm and dry fall weather. Park users are reminded that vegetation in these areas remains dry and caution should be taken any time they are using an open fire. In consultation with the Phoenix Fire Department, the ban went into effect on May 1, and prohibits open wood and charcoal fires. Propane or gas grills are not part of the ban but can only be used in established picnic areas. The ban applies to Camelback Mountain, Deem Hills Recreation Area, Papago Park, Phoenix Mountains Park and Recreation Area, Phoenix Mountains Preserve, Phoenix Sonoran Preserve, North Mountain Park, Rio Salado Habitat Restoration Area, and South Mountain Park/Preserve. It does not apply to the city's flatland parks. Motorists traveling through or near Phoenix's desert parks and mountain preserves should use extreme care with smoking materials and dispose of those only in their vehicle's ash tray. Smoking outside an enclosed vehicle is prohibited year-round in those natural areas. To protect their homes, residents whose property borders the city's preserve land may remove dry shrubs, brush and grasses, and trim dead branches from trees within the 10-foot strip of land that borders their property. By creating this 10-foot "buffer zone" residents can help to protect their homes from potential brush fires in the adjacent preserve land. Preserve neighbors also should check irrigation lines and pool back-flush hoses to ensure that water is not seeping into the preserve. Outside water sources encourage unnaturally dense vegetation growth, which increases fire risk.

The Phoenix Parks and Recreation Department and Phoenix Fire Department remind trail users to "Take a Hike. Do it Right." and practice responsible physical distancing when enjoying the city's desert parks and mountain preserves. View a hiking safety checklist and guidelines for physical distancing when on the trail. Detailed information about Phoenix's 41,000-plus acres of desert parks and mountain preserves, and 200- plus miles of trails, is available at Phoenix.gov/Parks.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be 1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

"Call if you can. Text if you can't." was the key message rolled out during a press conference on April 2nd as text to 9-1-1 service capability becomes available for the first time in the greater Phoenix region. If you are in imminent danger and unable to talk to a 9-1-1 operator, you now have the ability to text to 9-1-1. The service goes live following months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community.

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will det13ermine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anvone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle…?
- Who did it? -Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- Who is calling? Give your name location and

phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)


