

Dear Mr. Bickelmeyer:

We live at a time when there is growing concern about the ability of our democracy to function and thus provide our children a better life.

Last month's congressional elections have left the legislative and executive branches of our government sharply divided along party lines. Major economic, energy and security issues are not being addressed. All of this reminds us again how important it is to have leaders in Washington who can temper their partisan impulses and work with each other to get things done for the good of the country.

It also underlines the importance of the work we do at the Panetta Institute.

For seventeen years, it's been our mission to encourage thoughtful young men and women to go into public service and help them develop the skills they'll need to meet the policy challenges of the future.

These skills include the ability to find areas of agreement between rival factions and to build consensus through listening and negotiation.

We see these skills blossom each year as we bring together student government leaders from twenty-six California universities for our <u>Leadership in Public Service</u> course. These students learn the elements of effective leadership through role-playing exercises and by meeting with local, state and national officials who have shown an exceptional ability to work across party lines.

A spirit of bipartisanship also infuses our <u>Congressional Intern Program</u>, which brings students from those same campuses here to the Institute for an intensive orientation on the workings of Congress and then sends them to Washington for eleven weeks to work in the offices of the California congressional delegation. In their prep work here and in the seminars we provide them in Washington, they hear from policy advocates and experts from both major parties, deepening their understanding of differing points of view.

Likewise, our annual <u>Leon Panetta Lecture Series</u> maintains a bipartisan perspective, typically featuring at each event Republicans and Democrats, who engage in respectful dialogue about a pressing national issue.

And each November we hold a major dinner, our <u>Evening to Honor Lives of Public Service</u>, where we present our Jefferson-Lincoln Award to office holders and journalists who consistently put the good of the country and a healthy respect for the facts ahead of partisan posturing and rancor.

We also honor and encourage the nonpartisan public service of ordinary citizens who donate their time and talents to help our area's children. Since its founding in 1997, the Panetta Institute has spearheaded the

Monterey County Reads Program, recruiting, training and placing thousands of volunteers to work with individual elementary school students who need help with their reading.

In these and many other ways, this Institute is pushing back hard against the trends of blind partisanship and public indifference. And we're making real progress.

Almost every week, it seems, we hear from a former leadership trainee, congressional intern or other Institute program participant whose experience here has opened a door into government service. Newly minted congressional staff members, city or county officials, candidates for elective office – they tell us again and again that they never could have achieved their dream if it hadn't been for the training and encouragement they received at the Panetta Institute.

We're determined to continue to find, inspire and prepare the public servants of tomorrow, opening this opportunity to individuals of all backgrounds and promoting an ethic of patriotism over partisanship.

But to do this, we need your help.

Dear Mr. Bickelmeyer:

The Panetta Institute's most recent survey of U.S. college students brings sobering news for all of us who care about the health of our democracy and our country's ability to address major problems – and it strongly underlines the importance of the Institute's mission.

The April study shows students overall turning inward, less focused on international issues, disenchanted with political leaders and generally disengaged from the political process. Although interest in the possibility of running some day for elective office has risen since 2012, interest in service-oriented experiences such as AmeriCorps, VISTA or Teach for America has fallen to an all-time low.

Much of this is understandable, in light of more than a decade of U.S. involvement in costly overseas conflicts and a painfully slow economic recovery. But it also reminds us how important it is to find, inspire and prepare those students who are bucking the trend – who want to embrace public service and take on the public policy challenges of the future.

That's what we do at the Panetta Institute, and we cannot do it without your help.

We need your financial support now in order to continue and expand our efforts which, for seventeen years, have stimulated greater civic involvement by citizens of all ages and broadened the knowledge and skills of tomorrow's leaders.

We can point to countless examples of students in particular whose lives the Institute has touched in decisive ways:

- The Institute's <u>Congressional Intern Program</u> has served as a springboard to a public service career for scores of student participants who otherwise would not have had a chance to step into a substantive role in government or community service. Present-day congressional aides, nonprofit administrators, candidates for office and other aspiring public servants tell us again and again that the Panetta Institute made the critical difference for them particularly because our program covered the airfare, lodging and living expenses that otherwise would have made their eleven-week stay in Washington unaffordable.
- We hear similarly enthusiastic reports from dozens of former student government officers from across California who have participated over the years in our <u>Education for</u>

Leadership in Public Service course. The intensive, week-long seminar involves these students in direct interaction with a variety of visiting national, state and local leaders and engages them in role-playing exercises designed to improve the leadership and consensus-building skills they will need if they choose a future in public service.

- Our widely acclaimed Leon Panetta Lecture Series, which introduces major policy makers, journalists and political thinkers to adults of all ages on the Monterey Peninsula, also has a special component for young people in the area who might someday seek a role in public life. In addition to addressing the series subscribers, our speakers meet first with students from local high schools, colleges and military installations to answer their questions on the subjects about to be discussed.
- Meanwhile, our Policy Research Fellows Program offers a golden opportunity to a select group of upper-division law students from the area. Working directly with the Institute's teachers and leaders, they gain invaluable experience researching public policy issues of relevance to our various programs.
- And for a much younger group, we have Monterey County Reads. Coordinated by the Institute since 1997, this highly successful program recruits hundreds of reading assistance volunteers and deploys them to the county's elementary schools, where they work one-to-one with children in the early grades who are having trouble with their reading - greatly improving their chances of growing up to be successful, active participants in our democracy.

In these and many other ways, the Panetta Institute is making real, observable progress against the headwinds of political disengagement and indifference.

But we need your assistance to continue this effort - to keep inspiring greater civic involvement and providing the mentors, real-world experiences and hands-on training that can help tomorrow's leaders be prepared for the challenges they will face.

Dear Mr. Bickelmeyer:

In this season of hope and renewal, I'm turning to you for your help in improving the prospects for a renewed sense of public service and common purpose in our country.

The partisan rancor and division so blatantly on display today in Washington has led many Americans to lose trust in the ability of elected leaders to govern in our democratic process.

But here at the Panetta Institute, we believe that a new generation of leaders can restore hope in our democracy. We continue to inspire young people to lives of public service and help them develop the skills they'll need to govern and meet the difficult public policy challenges of the future.

And we continue to reach out to others in our community with programs that inform the public about important national issues, improve the reading skills of school children, and encourage public servants in both major parties to work with their colleagues across the aisle to solve our country's problems.

I'm writing today because we need your personal support to carry on this vital work. None of the Institute's many accomplishments over the past eighteen years would have been possible without the financial generosity of friends like you.

Our accomplishments cover a wide range of programs designed to help people become more informed and capable participants in our democracy.

- Again this year, students from twenty-four California universities took part in the Institute's Congressional Intern Program. Each of them spent two and a half months in the Washington office of a member of the California congressional delegation, while also attending briefing sessions with other top officials, journalists, scholars and public policy advocates. Before going to Washington, they received two weeks of intensive training and orientation here at the Institute, with our chairman, former secretary of defense Leon Panetta, serving as one of their instructors.
- In June, student government leaders from those same schools gathered at the Institute for our highly acclaimed Education for Leadership in Public Service course. The one-week seminar

involves the students in direct interaction with a variety of visiting national, state and local leaders and engages them in role-playing exercises designed to improve their leadership and consensus-building skills. Instructors this year included a major general in the U.S. Marine Corps, a former California secretary of state, a former head coach in the National Football League and, again, Secretary Panetta.

- With Secretary Panetta back in the moderator chair, this year's Leon Panetta Lecture Series addressed the theme "Gridlock or Action," with major public figures exploring the issues of immigration reform, the federal budget stalemate, gun control, and the chances for democratic reform in the Middle East. Our speakers, including former Homeland Security secretary Tom Ridge, former Israeli prime minister Ehud Barak, and former senators Richard Lugar and Joe Lieberman, among others, also met with students from area high schools, colleges and military installations to answer their questions.
- The Institute continues to spearhead Monterey Country Reads, the highly successful reading assistance program for children in grades one through three. The program deployed 115 reading assistance volunteers to the county's schools in the fall semester alone and received awards this year for exceptional public service from the Monterey County School Boards Association, the Monterey County Unified School District's Board of Education, and the California Teachers Association and Central Coast Counties Service Council.
- At our annual Evening to Honor Lives of Public Service last month, the Institute honored Senators Barbara Mikulski (D-MD) and Saxby Chambliss (R-GA) for their willingness to work across party lines for the good of the country, and also presented our Jefferson-Lincoln Award to longtime CBS News correspondent Bob Schieffer for his dedication to fair and unbiased political reporting.

These and other ongoing Institute efforts exemplify our commitment to informing the public, promoting bipartisan cooperation, and motivating citizens to get involved in the important work of selfgovernment. But to continue these efforts, we also need a commitment from you.

Enclosed you will find the necessary materials for filing a Senate Public Financial Disclosure Report in accordance with the Ethics in Government Act of 1978, as amended, because of your candidacy for election to the Senate. The following candidates are required to file a report:

- Candidates who seek nomination for election or election to the Senate, and have received contributions aggregating in excess of \$5,000, or have given consent to another to receive contributions on his or her behalf aggregating in excess of \$5,000;
- Candidates who seek nomination for election or election to the Senate, and have made expenditures aggregating in excess of \$5,000, or have given consent to another to make expenditures on his or her behalf aggregating in excess of \$5,000.

The statute requires that you file within 30 days of becoming a candidate, as described above, or by May 15 of the calendar year in which you become a candidate, whichever is later. Additionally, you must file on or before May 15 of each successive year during which you continue to be a candidate. However, you must file no later than 30 days prior to any election, primary, or convention in which you are a candidate. If you have reached the filing threshold, as described above, your 30 day period ends December 28, 2013; if you have not reached the filing threshold or if you intend to file on or before May 15 (if that option is applicable), please notify the Committee in writing. A candidate who is a Member of Congress is not required to file a candidate report, since Members of Congress file annual reports. If you are a Member of Congress, please notify the Committee.

Under the law, a \$200 penalty will be assessed when a report is filed more than 30 days after the due date. Please notify the Committee if you have not reached the filing threshold so we may accurately determine the due date for your form. Limited extensions may be granted if requested in a timely manner. Your form must be filed with the Office of Public Records, 232 Hart Senate Office Building, Washington, D.C. 20510.

This letter is to advise you of the action taken on your application for the position as a Special Agent with the United States Secret Service.

The Secret Service recruits Special Agents at the GS-5 and GS-7 grade levels. To qualify at the GS-5 level, you must have: (1) a four-year degree from an accredited college or university; (2) three years of work experience in the criminal investigative or law enforcement fields that required knowledge and application of laws relating to criminal violations; or (3) an equivalent combination of education and experience. In addition, you must be a U.S. citizen, at least 21 years of age, but less than 37 years of age at the time of appointment to a Special Agent position, and have distant vision no worse than 20/60, correctable to 20/20.

These entry requirements were established by the U.S. Office of Personnel Management.

I regret to inform you that a careful review of your application does not indicate that you meet the basic entry requirements.
