NEWS OF THE PAST!! By Nettie A. Kauffman

I was presented with a "News Digest of Berks County Pomona Grange No 43 dated June 2, 1945. This "newsletter of the past" presented some very interesting facts. I'm sure you will get a chuckle or two from the comments I am presenting from the newsletter. I am providing the information as it was written back then. FYI, this newsletter was at the time when W. John Blatt was the Master of Berks County Pomona Grange. SOME OF THESE ARTICLES ARE SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT!

<u>ATTENDANCE</u> – The attendance at Kutztown on June 2, 1945 exceeded last year's number by over 100. When we met in Shartlesville in June 1944, there were 200 patrons present. In Kutztown we had 313 present, counting the women who worked in the kitchen.

WELCOME BY BROTHER DR. JAMES GRIM

"Did you know that the meteorologists in Alaska are trying to change the weather scientifically? The war has been responsible for much progress in this line.

"The new Secretary of Agriculture, Clinton Anderson, is well-fitted for this position. He is a farmer from the western part of our country."

MASTER W. JOHN BLATT'S ADDRESS (only certain items are listed)

"We want to be punctual and shall start at 10 A.M. in the future."

"The death of President Roosevelt has brought great changes in government circles. We pledge our support to President Truman and his new officers."

"Although we witnessed the end of the war in Germany, the united energies of all are needed to end the Pacific War speedily. Support the 7th War Loan, produce all you can of needed foodstuffs and keep faith in mankind."

"Since the government has cut the allotment of canning sugar, and this in turn prevents the preserving of fruits available at this season, we should ask our government to revise its policy speedily so we may replenish our supply of home canned fruits."

STATE DEPUTY'S RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. More interest in legislative measures of State and Nation in our Grange.
- 2. Need a stronger organization in order to further the advancement of Agriculture and accomplish our needs.
- 3. Better attendance at Grange meetings.
- 4. Evaluation of News Digest.

OUR REHABILITATION PROGRAM - Address by John Davis, Secretary of Reading Chamber of Commerce

"The attitudes of the people, especially those in the Service, will be the important factor in determining the kind of world we are to have."

"The hardest task will be to make people willing to work – work for the joy of creation."

"Democracy does not make free enterprise – free enterprise makes possible democracy."

RESOLUTIONS (I only provided the "Resolved that B.C.P.G. No 43.")

- 1. appeal to non-members to investigate the activities of the order and ascertain how they endeavor to strive for a higher standard of living for all farmers and a return for labor on a parity with non-agricultural workers.
- 2. go on record petitioning our President, Mr. Harry Truman, to select a leader of Agriculture to represent the interests of the farmers of the nation at the Peace Table.
- 3. go on record petitioning the government to investigate the Veterans Administration so as to improve conditions in all Veterans Hospitals, especially mental institutions.
- 4. go on record supporting a Peace Plan which is elastic enough to be just to all yet binding enough to repress aggressors thus preventing future wars.
- 5. go on record opposing compulsory military training in peace times.

All of the above resolutions requested that copies be forwarded to various entities, such as: to President Truman, Senators, Congressman, Masters of the State and National Granges.

Note: these are only a few of those presented at the quarterly meeting June 2, 1945.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE (continued)

I would like to break it down a bit further.

To close this message, I have been made aware that there are a couple of subordinate Granges outside of Berks County that do not have a Pomona, and they have interest in considering partnering with Berks County. I do not have details to share yet, but please come be part of the conversation at our meeting in December. I really do look forward to seeing everyone there.

THANK YOU OLEY FAIR VOLUNTEERS

Thank you to the 26 members and friends from 7 Granges that donated 164 hours to help at the Soup Stand and other food service tasks at the 2025 Oley Fair.

The Pomona Grange first helped at the 2019 Fair and simply filled in anywhere that help was needed. Since then, we have been staffing the Soup Stand and helping at other places if we had more volunteers than required at a given time.

We had nice weather with comfortable mornings and afternoons, followed by busy evenings. We have been selling 175 gallons of Chicken Corn Noodle soup and 100 gallons of Beef Vegetable soup in recent years. We will probably receive a check by the December meeting, and they are looking forward to having us volunteer again in 2026.

POMONA LOTTERY CALENDAR 2026

We will be doing another Pomona Lottery Calendar for 2026 as a fundraiser. We will be selling 500 lottery calendars with 2 numbers on each. It will be done during the months of January and February for 2026. They will cost \$10 and will pay out \$20 Monday thru Friday, \$25 Saturday and Sunday, and \$100 on 1/1 New Year's Day and 2/14 on Valentine's Day.

POMONA BBQ REPORT

First, I want to say THANK YOU to the BBQ committee for getting all the supplies, that included Michael Adams, Fern Kulp, David Merkel, and Henry Seidel. Thanks to the Ontelaunee Grange for allowing us to hold the BBQ sale there, and to all the people that helped with the selling of the dinners. Kauffman's BBQ did a great job of cooking all the chickens and the potatoes! We sold 640 dinners this year, which included only 12 extras. WE MADE A PROFIT OF \$3,435.19, which included a \$250 gift card from THRIVENT!

TREX SOFT PLASTIC RECYCLING PROGRAM

Hamburg and Virginville Granges are collecting soft plastics, which will be recycled by TREX and into plastic benches. The list of plastic bags include, bread bags, newspaper sleeves, pallet wrap & street, and stretch film, salt & ice bags, case overwrap, bubble wrap, wood pellet bags, plastic shipping envelopes, dry cleaning bags, Ziploc, and other recloseable food storage bags. AGRICULTURE REPORT by Doug Sattazahn

With archery deer season in now and rifle just around the corner, I thought I would update farmers on other options for deer control throughout the year. The Agricultural Deer Control Program—formerly known as the "Red Tag" program—provides landowners in Pennsylvania experiencing deer damage with a tool to manage antlerless deer populations outside of the regular hunting season. Specifically, eligible landowners may apply through their district game warden to enlist licensed hunters who are issued harvest permits for antlerless deer on their property. These permits allow hunting of antlerless deer during specific periods and help reduce crop damage while keeping deer numbers in check. (continued page 8)

AGRICULTURE REPORT (continued)

In 2022 the program was significantly revamped to make it more accessible and flexible for both farmers and hunters. Changes include:

- *Hunters may now obtain **up to four permits per property**, aligning the program with the rules of the Deer Management Assistance Program (DMAP)
- *Permit seasons adjusted: the valid period runs from **August 1—September 15** and **February 1—April 15** of each license year, replacing the old February—September window with a broader spring/early fall focus
- *Farmers are no longer required to participate in the Commission's Hunter Access Program or post special signage for their property to enroll
- *The "red plastic snap tags" have been replaced with standard harvest tags issued by the state's licensing system (HuntFishPA). Reporting responsibility now lies with the hunter, not the landowner.
