The Goring and Streatley GAP Festival team is excited to announce the opening of entries to a brand new Children's Film Festival competition, which will take place as part of the biennial cultural festival in June next year.

We are inviting youngsters of all school ages from Berkshire and Oxfordshire to get digitally creative and make their own short films.

With free video editing software now readily accessible on mobile devices, we hope this exciting new competition will receive entries from media studies students, budding young filmmakers and those that may have never clicked record before.

The films will be shortlisted by a group of industry professionals and shown on screen at a special red carpet premier event on the last night of the main GAP Festival on Sunday 12 June 2022.

With categories for primary, secondary and sixth form school ages, entries can be created by groups or individuals, on any subject matter, under a 'Universal' rating.

Prizes have been generously donated by The Arts Society Goring and Film Oxford. Each category winner will receive a voucher for a two day film course run by local arts and creative media charity Film Oxford, to continue building their filmmaking skills and knowledge.

THEALE COMMUNITY FIRE STATION NOW OPERATIONAL

Firefighters are now serving the community from Theale Community Fire Station, after successfully relocating from Dee Road Fire Station in Tilehurst.

The relocation has been made possible thanks to a team effort involving staff from across the Service, led by the Capital Projects Team, who have worked effectively with the contractors on site.

Contractors Knights Brown began the build in January 2020 and despite the challenges of working during a global pandemic, they have successfully completed the build and recently handed over the site to RBFRS.



This new station supports our ongoing commitment to work collaboratively with our emergency service partners, offering a shared location for Royal Berkshire Fire and Rescue Service, Thames Valley Police and South Central Ambulance Service. As well as improvements for all Services in the efficient use of public funds, the relationships and opportunities of working more closely together is expected to support greater collective effectiveness for the services we provide to the public.

Councillor Angus Ross, Lead Member for Strategic Assets on Royal Berkshire Fire Authority, said: "I am delighted that Theale Community Fire Station is now operational. This represents a significant step forward and is the culmination of years of hard work from teams across Royal Berkshire Fire and Rescue Service.

"The construction of this community fire station will help to deliver on our strategic commitment to ensure that our fire stations, people and resources are placed firmly at the heart of the local communities they are serving. I am sure that the new station will be a facility that the community will be proud of for many years to come."

Although crews have moved into the new facility, several other teams will relocate in the coming weeks, as well as our partners from Thames Valley Police. After this process is completed, we intend to welcome local residents to see the new facility, with the official opening ceremony planned to take place in spring 2022.

CHEESE ETC

You may have spotted that there have been a few changes at 15 Reading Road over the past couple of months. New signage is now adorning the building revealing that the Tasting Rooms for Cheese Etc will soon be opening.

Cheese Etc will be keeping their shop next door at 17 Reading Road with its wide range of cheese, crackers, wine and other goodies. Ali and Jen have wanted to be able to offer tasting sessions for sometime and have been slowly transforming the additional premises to provide somewhere to enjoy tasting and learning about cheese in all its forms. Tasting Sessions will be running in the new year and will be available to book from November. In addition to booking a session direct, there is the option of buying a Tasting Session voucher, a great idea for a gift at any time of year, but a timely one with Christmas not too far away.

Downstairs, The Loose Larder will shortly be opening too, offering a range of loose goods including pasta, rice, cereals, nuts and seeds, herbs and spices and more. Bring your own containers along to fill them up so that you can top up your own kitchen larder without adding more plastic bags to your recycling pile.

The Loose Larder will also be the pick up point for Christmas cheese orders from Cheese Etc. Orders are now being taken and the cut off point this year is 6th December. Orders can be placed online or paper forms are available in the shop. This time of year is incredibly busy, and just before Christmas, the workshop at number 15 comes into its own, as hundreds of orders are cut, wrapped and packed, ready for seasonal festivities. Whether it is filling up your cupboards from The Loose Larder, visiting the Tasting Rooms or seeing orders being lovingly prepared in the workshop, this little spot in Pangbourne will soon be full of life.

This is located at No 9 High Street, Theale and is home to Studio 12 Designs interior design practice founded by BIID Registered Interior Designer Claire Tull.



PANGBOURNE HERITAGE GROUP THE DEMISE OF PANGBOURNE'S FIRE BRIGADE

FIRE BRIGADE.

The reconsistion of a 40 h.p. Itala mater (kindly given to the brigade by Mr. G. B. Tate, of Bere Court, Panghourne) has rendered it necessary for the executive to obtain more commodious custors to accommodate their motor and fire engine. The committee have bought the building used previsesly as a crole and motor works, adjoining the Breedon Selsool. A good stretch of ground at the rear of the premises will be found useful when cleaning the engine and its appliances after practice work or an accual five.



There has been a fire service as such in the village since 1895, but it was formalised by public subscription when a manual engine at the cost of \pounds 130 was purchased.

PHOTO 1: 1916. (Some of these dates are approximate) Mr Blazey was captain of the brigade and Mr Downing his deputy. The engine was kept in a shed and horses in a paddock on land belonging to Mr DH Evans, probably next to Howarth Lodge. The firemen's uniforms were also purchased by public subscription.

PHOTO 2: Pangbourne Fire Brigade attended incidents in other villages including this one at Streatley Mill, and were commended for their efforts. The hoses and pump can be clearly seen.


PHOTO 3: A newspaper cutting displays the need for better facilities as fire engines become more sophisticated and increase in size.

PHOTO 7: The present Fire Station in Horseshoe Road is shortly to be sold, and the service has been disbanded. It was latterly a retained service with parttime officers, mostly people working locally or from home. However it was still subject to the strict training applied to all of the service, and carried the same equipment as the full time appliances. It was part of the Royal Berks Fire and Rescue Service with a four by four engine, water carrier Land Rover.



The new fire station has been built on land adjacent to the A4 Roundabout at the end of the Tidmarsh Road. It is far larger, and will serve a much wider area. The work of the Fire and Rescue Service has diversified greatly during the last decade or so, but Pangbourne has played its part in responding to the many emergencies over the years, and we grateful to the local brigade of volunteer fire officers.

The Heritage Group held a well attended daytime social at the Dolphin Centre in September. The AGM in October will be a time when we can make decisions on the future direction of our activities. We are also planning a pre Christmas social, details of which will be sent to members once a date has been arranged. I don't think any of us are fully back to organising events long term at the moment, the effects of lockdown will take a while to disperse. In the meantime, we welcome any additions to our archive, or stories that we can link in to what we are learning about the village.





As I write, autumn is approaching and the frenzy of harvesting is calming down a bit, giving more time to get the allotments ready for the winter. As usual, there has been a wonderful display of sunflowers.

WATER

The PAA is starting to focus on rainwater collection on the allotments as a lot of the sheds and greenhouses don't have any water butts connected. If anyone has any guttering, barrels or large containers lying around unused, we'd be glad to have them. We hope to arrange to have an expert to come to talk to us – perhaps at the AGM next year – not just about water collection, but also about things like mulching and ground cover which would help us to use less water. Apart from being a precious resource, the costs are going up and up.

TREES

The new trees that were planted round the allotments at the beginning of this year are on the whole doing well, and the two larger lime trees either side of the field gate, planted at the beginning of 2020, are pretty wellestablished. According to The Times "One mature oak tree will give off enough oxygen for two people to live off for a year and absorbs 40lb minimum of carbon. It will also support one of the biggest ecosystems that we

have in this country, in terms of 3,000 species of insects and life in its canopy". Admittedly only one of this year's planting is an oak, as we have to be aware of the

shade that will be cast when it is mature and growing fruit and vegetables is our priority, but many of the others – such as rowans – will have berries and shelter for birds and insects. If anyone is interested in "plant a tree for the jubilee" there is more information on 'queensgreencanopy.org'

On 3 August, a group visited St Bartholomew's Church in Lower Basildon and were entertained to a most interesting talk about the Church followed by a sumptuous afternoon tea – nobody needed to cook a meal that evening! On 21 August we hosted a session at the Art Cafe in Whitchurch, and members and local residents enjoyed delicious coffee and cakes (made by our members) and lots of convivial chat. There was also a raffle with some excellent prizes, and a craft and produce stall with the chance to purchase a range of items made by our members. This was a great chance to socialise and catch up with friends we had not been able to see for some time, as well as fund raising for our group.

We resumed our monthly meetings on Tuesday 14 September and our President, Sue, began by showing us our NFWI (National Federation of Women's Institutes) 100th Anniversary Certificate which had been presented to her by the Berkshire Federation President. It is wonderful that Pangbourne WI has been part of this village and its history since 1921 and we hope that it will continue for another 100 years. During lockdowns Sue had encouraged us (via her excellent monthly emailed newsletters) to produce a rainbow in any art/craft medium. Members had produced some really interesting pieces which were displayed on a table, together with photos of our centenary birthday party, our visit to St Bartholomew's Church and our morning at the Art



Cafe, which brought back many happy memories and also the feeling that life was returning to some sort of normality. All of these photos will go into our archives for future generations to enjoy.

Our speakers, Catherine and Viv, were then introduced to present their talk entitled "All about Hedgehogs". We learned some interesting facts about this endangered species; for instance there are no hedgehogs in North and South America, Australia, South-East Asia nor, surprisingly, in Wales. Their declining numbers are due, in part, to the



widespread use of pesticides, fertilisers, slug pellets etc. Another contributing factor to their demise is the growth of large field sizes resulting in poor nesting opportunities. The African pygmy hedgehog, recognised by its white fur, is a popular pet in the UK and is sold in pet stores.

Hedgehogs like to eat creepy crawlies such as worms, beetles, slugs, and caterpillars. There are many dangers facing these delightful little creatures, such as litter (crisp bags, plastic cups etc) and garden rubbish. One way we can help is to provide a safe area with garden netting stretched tight and a lined tunnel under a solid fence to provide a safe route from one area to

another. With regard to garden ponds, hedgehogs can swim but need somewhere to climb on to; for example plants, bricks etc. Open drains should be covered to prevent them falling in and bonfires should always be checked for these little creatures before lighting.

We were then invited to have some fun producing a scented lavender bag hedgehog. All the materials were supplied and all we had to do was add some stuffing and a lavender bag, sew up the tummy and give them a mouth and eyes. For those not keen on sewing, pictures were provided to colour in. This all caused much merriment and prizes were awarded for the best exhibits.

Our next meeting is on Tuesday 12 October at 2.30pm, when we will be shown a selection of clothes from The Clothes Shop – Newbury, to try on and purchase if we wish. The theme will be "Bring back your sparkle by revitalising your wardrobe". We have had several visits from The Clothes Shop over the years and it is always a most entertaining meeting – definitely one not to be missed.



PANGBOURNE PLACE-NAMES

LEST WE FORGET

As memories of the events surrounding the commemoration of the centenary of the end of World War 1 fade, I thought it might be useful to record the vestiges locally of two comparatively recent dark times in our Island's history, World War 1 and World War 2.

Both periods are brought together in the splendid work of the St James the Less 150th Anniversary Access Project when the lettering on the **War Memorial** in the churchyard was restored and safe access provided via the new gated entrance on Pangbourne Hill. It records 41 men from our village who died in WW1, including one set of brothers, Albert and Percy Swell. The youngest was Norman Hull, aged 16, and the oldest the village doctor, Captain Godfrey Hawes, aged 51, serving with the Royal Army Medical Corps. 15 were killed in WW2, covering all three Services. As we mourn the loss of them all, it is worth remembering that there are similar memorials across almost the whole of Europe, recalling ordinary men and women who died in the defence of their country's honour as they saw it, and at the command of their, mostly distant, governments and leaders. The futility of it all is so well summed up in the cemetery at Mons, where the first British soldier to die in WW1, Private John Parr, lies buried just a few yards from the last to die in that war, Private George Ellison. In-between lie four years and some four million deaths on the Western Front alone.

For me, equally telling is the east window of St James the Less, commemorating in particular 2/Lt George Armstrong, who died aged 18 in WW1, and his cousin Philip, as well as more generally all who perished in Pangbourne. The window can be read at a number of different levels, but I am constantly struck by the innocence of the faces. So many of those who died were young men, with their lives before them. Boys left school in July, joined the Army, after training were posted to France, and were regularly dead by Christmas. The carnage amongst any school's old boys was great, but it did produce the following curious cameo: In the 1920s, an absent-minded headmaster on an Old Boys Day was no doubt frantically searching in his mind for the right Christian name as one of his Old Boys descended on him. He is said to have come out with the memorable "Tell me, was it you or your brother who was killed in the war?"

An apparently major local vestige of WW1 is **Pangbourne College**. However, although founded in 1917, its original purpose was to provide recruits for the Merchant, as opposed to Royal, Navy. This focus has of course changed over the years, best exemplified by the Falklands Chapel. It was sited at Pangbourne at least in part because in the Falklands War in 1982 the College Old Boys had more citations for gallantry or meritorious conduct than any other school.

A very minor vestige of WW2 in our village is the absence of **railings** at the front of many houses built in the Pangbourne boom housebuilding period around the turn of the last century. The shape of the semi-circular bricks, often with the original metal hoop retained, in the front gardens of any number of houses in Horseshoe Road, Reading Road and Thames Avenue, with the absence of railings, bears this out. There are occasional reminders of what they originally might have looked like, as with modern reproductions in Horseshoe Road. The railings were offered by the owners as scrap metal, to be melted down "to help the war effort".

A similar fate befell the **German howitzer field gun**, on a plinth outside what is now The Old Breedon School. It was there between the Wars, but was taken away in 1940 to be melted down.

Unfortunately, there does not seem to be any photographic record of it.

The most dominant recollection of WW2 in our immediate area is not in Pangbourne, but across the Thames in Whitchurch, at Thamesfield. However, contrary to popular belief, this was not Eisenhower's Headquarters prior to D Day, which was actually at Southwick Park, Fareham. Eisenhower did come to Pangbourne in the months leading up to D Day, but only to have lunch with his old friend General Mark Clark. Thamesfield was in fact the headquarters of the major river crossing training centre just below Whitchurch Bridge, which gave training in bridge-building successively to British Royal Engineers, then their Canadian and in due course American counterparts. Shortly after VE Day in 1945 and no doubt to impress the local residents from Pangbourne and Whitchurch, they were invited to cross the Thames on foot on the Bailey bridges constructed specially for the purpose.




Bailey Bridge building at Pangbourne. (Photo courtesy of the Heritage Group.)

PANGBOURNE PLACE-NAMES


Sturdy, but deliberately merging into the landscape, are the **pillboxes** built in haste in the days following Dunkirk in 1940, to defend the western approaches to Reading. Part of GHQ Stop Line Red, essentially along the Thames, they were strong points along a zigzag defended ditch 55 feet across linking the Thames to GHQ Stop Line Blue, along the Kennet and Avon Canal. Later in the War, when the threat of invasion had receded, the defensive ditch was filled in, apart from the stretch from the railway to the Thames, used as a small training facility in association with the Thamesfield river crossings training area. The only remains of that now is a small, ill-defined ditch.

Less visible still, since it is in the private grounds of Jesmond Hill, is the garden shed where, perhaps in "Dad's Army" style, the

Setting aside the still very active Brock Barracks, Reading, and Denison Barracks, Hermitage, the

nearest wartime vestige to Pangbourne that I am aware of is the **Merityre** premises at Purley. Now providing excellent tyre, exhaust and similar services, in the War it produced wings and parts for Spitfires.

More obscure still, since it no longer exists at all, now being an estate of upmarket houses, is **Tenaplas**, Upper Basildon. The factory of that name, which manufactured extruded plastics products on the site until 1999, was originally located in Putney, London. The Company's premises there were bombed out in 1940 and, since it was then producing reinforced petrol hose for the RAF, essential to the war effort, it was relocated to the disused brickworks site in Upper Basildon.

All that remains of the massive storage area used to stockpile military stores ahead of D Day on **Bucklebury Common** are some small stretches of concrete roadway and three topsoil mounds. These were formed from the soil scraped away to give a dry gravel surface on which to store military equipment.

Stately homes in our area were pressed into wartime service. In WW1 Basildon House was used as a convalescent home for wounded soldiers from Berkshire regiments, and in WW2 it was requisitioned. The House and Park were used for training before D Day by elements of the US 101st Airborne Division, known as 'The Screaming Eagles'. Later, there was a prisoner of war camp in the grounds, not of the barbed wire and searchlight type, but providing accommodation for captured junior ranks. These were men who were willing to work on the local farms, happy to be out of the war and working on the land, no doubt doing what many of them had done at home in the 1930s in peacetime.

PANGBOURNE PLACE-NAMES

Englefield House was a hospital in WW1, and one wing was a convalescent home in WW2, the family remaining in another part of the house. **Sulhamstead House**, now the **Police Training Centre**, temporarily housed personnel for RAF Theale, since accommodation for them was still under construction when that airfield was already in use.

RAF Theale was opened in 1941. It consisted of grass landing areas of about 900 by 800 yards, and was bounded to the north by the Kennet and Avon Canal. It was primarily used for elementary flying training, and later in 1944 by No 128 Gliding School. It was closed in 1948, with the site subsequently being bought for gravel extraction, whence the large lake there now, the home water of **Burghfield Sailing Club**.

However, still in use for light aircraft is the former **RAF Hampstead Norrey**s, located at what is now called **Haw Farm Airfield**. It was mainly used for training Wellington Bomber crews, and at least two field-names in the vicinity still recall its wartime existence. **Lookout**, on the Aldworth-Streatley road, has a commanding view to the northwest and the Midlands, and nearby is a field called **Searchlight**.

RAF Greenham Common was opened in 1942, and in 1943 was turned over to the US Air Force. On 12 December 1944 it witnessed an accident involving a glider, in which all 33 on board were killed. The two pilots are remembered at **Albury Road**, Greenham, and **Buckner-Croke Way**, Thatcham, with Burton E Lindenmuth, a private soldier on board that glider, recorded in **Lindenmuth Way**.

Arnhem Road, Newbury, owes its name to a local resident, Norman Symons, who married Sophia Helena Schaap, from Arnhem, Holland. She was in that town during the Battle of Arnhem in 1944, and wanted the road so named

in memory of the soldiers who died there. It thus performs the same sort of function as **Remembrance Road**, Newbury, remembering all those from Newbury who died fighting in WW1.

In the other direction, towards Reading, there is **Artillery Mews**, Tilehurst Road, built in 1922 and used in WW2 as an army barracks. **Yeomanry House**, at the top of Castle Hill, was built as a private house in the early 19th century, but in the 1900s it became the headquarters of the Royal Berkshire Yeomanry. The footprint of the current County Record Office is that of its former Riding School.

The **Museum of Berkshire Aviation** stands on the site of the former **RAF Woodley**. In the 1930s the aerodrome had been a thriving aircraft factory. The WW2 flying ace Douglas Badet lost both his legs there in a flying accident in 1931.

The only major place-name in the region of which I am aware that recalls a WW2 victory is **Enham Alamein**, a village on the Newbury road just north of Andover. First recorded as *Enham militis* ('Knight's Enham') in 1316, and *Knyghtesenham* in 1389, after WW1 a rehabilitation colony for ex-servicemen was set up there. It was reendowed after WW2 by the government of Egypt in gratitude for the defeat of the German army at El Alamein, and the name changed from Knight's Enham to Enham Alamein on the wave of post-war national sentiment. However, like many other items in this article, its origin will soon be lost, if it is not already.

Lest we forget.

TREE FEST

Tree Fest started with a talk to PAWS by James Morison of Forest Research entitled "How will tree planting help in the climate emergency?" We learned that:

Tree growth removes carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, so trees are obviously important. However, the role of trees in the climate is not just about carbon; there are many other benefits of planting trees, maintaining those we have and creating new woodlands, and also some potential problems. James described the role of trees in carbon and greenhouse gas balances, and briefly discussed some of the other contributions they make to our environment and to sustainability.



He emphasised the need to plant the right tree at the right time of year in the right place.

The official launch of the tree planting event was in October in centre of Pangbourne where volunteers signed up to plant a tree in the Thames Meadows. At the same time prizes for the PAWS summer tree quiz were awarded by Sir Brian Hoskins to five well-deserving youngsters.



By the time you read this, hopefully you will have planted a tree on the meadows as part of Pangbourne Parish Council's initiative and either sponsored, adopted or planted a tree in your garden! It has been great to work with the Parish Council, especially Peter McIver and Becky Elkins who have obtained 31 trees from the Woodland Trust and worked on clearing the undergrowth preparing the land for planting. The trees will need watering and looking after until they are established.

You can source trees through the Woodland Trust or grow fruit trees available from good plant nurseries. Apple trees do not have to be super large – you can buy dwarf plants and maintain height by judicious pruning.

By now we all understand the science behind tree planting as trees absorb CO2 which is the contributor to global warming, but we also plant trees and wild flowers to create a healthy biodiversity of plant and insect life. Without it humans cannot survive. The planet exists by virtue of interdependency of all species and the extinction of one species has a profound effect upon the life of others. We need our bees to fertilise our fruit trees and produce our apples. We have run an apple pressing day every year (except 2020) for ten years to ensure the fruit did not go to waste.

This year our Apple pressing day in September at the maze in Whitchurch was a great success. The beautiful weather and idyllic venue provided a peaceful setting for the hard work of chopping, crushing and pressing of apples brought by a good number of people. Some juice was taken home and a lot consumed on the day. After being unable to have apple pressing last year we all appreciated getting together, meeting new people and sharing in nature's bounty.

COP26

For this edition of the magazine we are focussing on the efforts of world leaders attending COP26 in Glasgow, chaired by our MP, Alok Sharma. This UN climate summit is happening at a time when the window of opportunity for action on climate change is shrinking rapidly. In recent months extreme weather has created havoc across the globe and in August, a landmark report by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change concluded that there is 'unequivocal' evidence that human activity is already changing the world in unprecedented and



irreversible ways. The UN chief Antonia Gutierrez described it as a "code red for humanity".



At the September meeting of the Parish Council, we were fortunate to have a presentation from the Deputy Chief Fire Officer at the Royal Berkshire Fire & Rescue Service. He gave us an update on the Fire Service's move to the new facilities on the A4 at Theale. The project is running ahead of time and the service is due to begin vacating the existing Fire Station on Horseshoe Road from the end of October. Thames Valley Police are also beginning their transfer to the same site during the Autumn.

The new building will be a triple service centre as it will also house SCAS (South Central Ambulance Service) and it is hoped that this new location should improve response times across the area and to the village.

Further information on the Fire Service's move can be found elsewhere in this edition.

The Parish Council is in discussion with RBFRS and other local organisations to find a suitable replacement site for the Defibrillator that is currently housed at the fire station.

20TH ANNIVERSARY

She will be a familiar face to many within the village.
