

Dolores was born in Clay Center. When she was twelve her father passed away. Her brother, who was six years older and her mother, continued to raise her. "My mother had to be awfully strong when my dad died" Dolores says.

"After high school I went to nursing school in Kansas City, three years, and then I went and got my BSN in



nursing" Dolores says. "In those days you went 11 months a year, one month off." She worked in Kansas City for about seven years before she met and married Robert.

Robert was the youngest of five brothers and grew up near Ames. When they were older, each brother was given a farm by their father.

"I was the only one in my class, all the way through eighth grade" Robert recalls. At his country school, there were only about four students at any time.

Robert went to Clyde for high school. "I rode a bicycle to high school and I rode a bicycle while at college" he says. "They lived in the country so he had quite a little ride to high school" Dolores adds. Sometimes Robert even hitchhiked home from school.

In college, Robert studied soil conversation and earned his degree from Kansas State University. He joined the Army Air Forces and did soil testing for plane runways in Guam.

Robert and Dolores first met in their 30's. "A nurse friend was from Clay Center, and she knew his mother and aunt from high school in Clay Center" says Dolores. She'd sometimes ride to Clay Center with me. 'You've got to meet Robert.' I said, 'I'm not meeting anyone else', but I was there."

Robert and Dolores wintered in Arizona for 18 years. This worked out well because they had grandchildren in Gilbert and grandchildren back in Kansas. They loved watching them all grow up. Robert liked to fish and play golf. "I like to sleep now," Robert says with a laugh.
